- The Nu Chapter at the University of Michigan presented a resolution honoring Trustee and IPP Marco Kcratovich II. (The full text of this resolution is available in Appendix #11.)
- 5. By unanimous consent, President Lee accepted this resolution.
- 6. President Lee introduced Kael Pelletier (Active Member, Epsilon Nu Chapter at the University of Massachusetts and Northeast District President) in light of his current role as chair of the National Committee on Ritual and Regalia.

- 7. Chair Pelletier presented remarks on the work of the National Committee on Ritual and Regalia. (The full text of the report of the National Committee on Ritual and Regalia is available in Appendix #12.)
  - a. During Chair Pelletier's remarks, President Lee clarified that, upon the manufacture of the pin for recipients of the J. Only prior recipients of that award will be eligible to purchase the pin, and such recipients will be vetted by the fraternity's National Headquarters staff to ensure their eligibility for the pin.

## SEPARATE SESSION #4

Friday, July 14, 2023

- 1. President Lee called the Separate Session back to order at 9:32 AM EST.
- 2. President Lee introduced Dr. Anthony Walker (Life Member, Eta Phi Chapter at Syracuse University) in light of his current role as chair of the Ad Hoc National Committee on Data and Assessment.
- 3. Chair Walker presented remarks on the work of the Ad Hoc National Committee on Data and Assessment. (The full text of the report of the Ad Hoc National Committee on Data and Assessment is available in Appendix #14.)
  - a. During Chair Walker's remarks, President Lee clarified that OPUS, the fraternity's new online membership reporting system, is ready to launch and will be operative and used by Brothers and Chapters during the Fall 2023 semester.
  - b. As part of his remarks, Chair Walker clarified that, to improve response rates for future surveys of the fraternity's members, he would recommend discussing the surveys during "Town Hall" meetings at District Conventions and distributing the surveys electronically earlier in the spring semester.
  - c. Chair Walker also clarified that the full results of the 2023 Biennial Climate Survey of the fraternity's members will soon be posted on the fraternity's national website.
  - d. Chair Walker and President Lee clarified that a 30% response rate for future surveys would be preferable, and they noted that one intended use of OPUS is to acquire better information on the demographics of the colleges and universities that our Chapters serve.
  - e. Chair Walker and President Lee also clarified that OPUS will be used to collect such demographic information in order to understand more clearly the needs of our Brothers.
- President Lee introduced Ken Corbett (Life Member, Zeta Chi Chapter at the University of South Carolina and PNP #32) in light of his current role as chair of the National Committee on Membership and Expansion.
- Chair Corbett presented remarks on the work of the National Committee on Membership and Expansion.
   (The full text of the report of the National Committee on Membership and Expansion is available in Appendix #15.)
- 6. President Lee introduced Michael Napolitano (Life Member, Kappa Upsilon Chapter at Marist College) in light of his current role as co-chair of the Ad Hoc National Sponsor and Director Task Force.
- 7. Co-Chair Napolitano presented remarks on the work of the Ad Hoc National Sponsor and Director Task Force. (The full text of the report of the Ad Hoc National Sponsor and

Director Task Force is available in Appendix #16.)

- President Lee introduced AABOD Chair Greg Boike to recognize the winner of the KK¥ Solo Concerto Competition and to outline a proposal from the KK¥ Alumni Association regarding a Jazz Composition Competition.
- AABOD Chair Boike recognized Zach Miller (Alumni Member, Theta Epsilon Chapter at the University of Kentucky) as the winner of the 2023 KKΨ Solo Concerto Competition and announced the winner's performance at the banquet concluding the 2023 National Convention.
- 10. AABOD Chair Boike also presented a proposal for a new Jazz Composition Competition to be administered by the KKΨ Alumni Association. Under this proposal, the works selected as the winners of this competition would be performed at future KKΨ National Conventions.
- 11. President Lee introduced Northeast District Governor Rassii Elliott in light of his current role as co-chair of the National Committee on Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Advocacy.
- 12. Co-Chair Elliott presented remarks on the work of the National Committee on Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Advocacy. (The full text of the report of the National Committee on Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Advocacy is available in Appendix #17.)
  - a. As part of his remarks, Co-Chair Elliott clarified that the National Committee on Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Advocacy will finalize its guidance on pronoun usage and that this guidance will be provided to Brothers and Chapters during the Fall 2023 semester.
  - b. Co-Chair Elliott also clarified that the Fraternity will seek to address diversity, equity, inclusion, and advocacy issues in the future while staying aware of the work of various universities regarding these issues.
  - c. During Co-Chair Elliott's remarks, President Lee clarified that any changes to the Fraternity's Rituals, particularly with regard to gendered language, will occur in 2027 and that conversations within the National Committee on Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Advocacy have already occurred on such changes.
  - d. President Lee also clarified that there are plans to include the National Committee on Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Advocacy in future planning regarding sites selected for National Conventions, while also noting the long timelines involved in National Convention site selection and planning and the difficulties involved in anticipating concerns regarding such sites during the selection process.
- 13. President Lee introduced Mary Elliott (Active Member, Iota Kappa Chapter at Boise State University and Western

District President) in light of her current role as chair of the Ad Hoc National Committee on Strategic Planning.

- 14. Chair Elliott presented remarks on the work of the Ad Hoc National Committee on Strategic Planning. (The full text of the report of the Ad Hoc National Committee on Strategic Planning is available in Appendix #18.)
  - a. During Co-Chair Elliott's remarks, President Lee

clarified the changes made to the Fraternity's Mission Statement, particularly regarding how the revisions broaden our conception of gender and expand upon our fraternity's pillars and goals.

15. President Lee recessed the Separate Session at 10:45 AM EST.

## SEPARATE SESSION #5

Friday, July 14, 2023

- 1. President Lee called the Separate Session back to order at 1:44 PM EST.
- 2. President Lee completes a roll call of delegates.
- 3. National Convention Parliamentarian Dr. Kirk Randazzo (Life Member, Zeta Chi Chapter at the University of South Carolina and PNP #38) confirmed the total number of eligible votes for the duration of this Separate Session was 227.
- 4. President Lee introduced Davis Vaughn (Active Member, Lambda Chapter at the University of Arkansas and Southwest District President) in light of his current role as chair of the Ad Hoc National Committee on Musicianship.
- 5. Chair Vaughn presented remarks on the work of the Ad Hoc National Committee on Musicianship. (The full text of the report of the Ad Hoc National Committee on Musicianship is available in Appendix #19.)
- 6. The Southwest District, at the direction of the Ad Hoc National Committee on Musicianship, moved to accept the 2023 arrangement of the Fraternity Song, as arranged by Midwest District Governor Denali Pearce-Alt and presented by the Ad Hoc National Committee on Musicianship, as the standard arrangement of the Fraternity Song.
  - a. <u>President Lee noted that the motion did not require</u> <u>a second because it was made at the direction of a</u> <u>National Committee.</u><sup>1</sup>
  - b. The Kappa Beta Chapter at Clemson University asked if the delegation could hear an audio recording of the new Fraternity Song arrangement.
  - i. President Lee responded that there was a recording and that she would set up equipment to play it for the delegation shortly.
  - c. The Theta Theta Chapter at the University of Alabama at Birmingham asked if the individual singing parts for the new Fraternity Song arrangement could be presented on projectors for the delegation.
  - i. President Lee responded that she would share access to a written copy of the proposed Fraternity Song arrangement via QR code with the delegation, and she asked for the projectors to be used to show this QR code.
  - d. The Nu Kappa Chapter at Georgia Southern University asked a question regarding the change in keys reflected in the new arrangement of the Fraternity Song and how that change achieved the goal of keeping the song arrangement uniform for older Brothers, as discussed in an earlier caucus of delegates

of the Southeast District.

- i. President Lee introduced Governor Pearce-Alt to address this question.
- ii. Governor Pearce-Alt responded that the new arrangement shifted the key from A to F to accommodate more singers who may lack traditional vocal training and to connect to the song's history of starting with the notes A, E, and A.
- e. President Lee shared via the projectors the QR code that permitted the delegation's access to a written copy of the proposed Fraternity Song arrangement.
- f. Governor Pearce-Alt presented an audio recording of a performance of the new Fraternity Song arrangement to the delegation.
- g. The Theta Tau Chapter at Fayetteville State University stated that, based on the playing of the audio recording and the accompanying singing of the Fraternity Song by Brothers in attendance, it appeared that everyone was able to perform the new Fraternity Song arrangement, which might align more closely with the version of the song that many already knew.
  - i. Governor Pearce-Alt responded that this familiarity was a goal of the new Fraternity Song arrangement, as was the ability of untrained vocalists to perform the arrangement well.
- h. The Gamma Omicron Chapter at Otterbein University stated that, beyond a few minor points, the new Fraternity Song arrangement seemed easier to sightread than the current arrangement, at least based on this chapter's experience.
- i. The lota Zeta Chapter at North Carolina Agricultural and Technical State University raised a concern regarding the modulation at the end of the new arrangement of the Fraternity Song and whether it would pose difficulties to singers, including alumni who are invited to chapter events and may want to sing.
  - i. Governor Pearce-Alt responded that this modulation was retained from prior versions of the Fraternity Song and that the melody for the song was written in larger notes to assist groups who cannot perform all of the written harmonies.
- j. The Rho Chapter at Tulane University asked for confirmation that the displayed version of the new arrangement would serve as the final version used for purposes of the Fraternity Song.
  - i. President Lee responded that the new arrangement of the Fraternity Song would be rendered in a more visually proper manner if adopted.

- k. The Eta Omega Chapter at Howard University asked if it is possible to hear the original version of the Fraternity Song.
  - i. President Lee responded that hearing the "original" version of the Fraternity Song was not possible because there are multiple versions considered "original" by different individuals and because recordings of these versions were not available at this time.
- I. The Beta Rho Chapter at the University of Toledo noted that the current version of the Fraternity Song is not accessible to singers who are vocally inexperienced and that the new arrangement of the Fraternity Song takes nothing away from prior versions.
- m. The Mu Pi Chapter at the University of Oregon noted that, when the new arrangement of the Fraternity Song was the version taught at a 2023 National Convention workshop, it was found to be easy to learn.
- n. The Zeta Xi Chapter at Tyler Junior College asked whether a motion to call the question could be made.
  - i. National Convention Parliamentarian Randazzo clarified that calling the question must be approved by unanimous consent. However, a motion to move the previous question can instead be made and requires only a simple majority to end debate and proceed to a vote on the previous motion.
  - ii. President Lee asked the seated delegation if there would be any objection to calling the question, and at least one delegate indicated such objections.
- 7. The Eta Pi Chapter at the University of Northern Iowa moved the previous question.
  - National Convention Parliamentarian Randazzo clarified that a motion on the previous question does not require a second, but does require passage by a simple majority.
     The motion passed.
- 8. President Lee asked Chair Vaughn to restate the current motion: The Southwest District, on behalf of the Ad Hoc National Committee on Musicianship, moved to accept the new 2023 arrangement of the Fraternity Song, as arranged by the Ad Hoc National Committee on Musicianship, as the standard arrangement of the Fraternity Song. **The motion passed.**
- 9. The North Central District moved to place a ten-year moratorium on the standard arrangement of the Fraternity Song.
  - a. <u>Evan Thompson (Life Member, Zeta Chi Chapter at the</u> <u>University of South Carolina and PNP #46) seconded</u> <u>the motion.</u>
  - b. The Nu Mu Chapter at Kennesaw State University requested clarification on what a moratorium would mean for the Fraternity Song.
    - i. President Lee responded that the moratorium

would prevent any changes to the standard arrangement of the Fraternity Song until the 2033 National Convention.

- c. The Beta Rho Chapter at the University of Toledo noted the need to preserve the importance of the Fraternity Song.
- d. The Psi Chapter at the University of California, Los Angeles asked whether it is mandatory for Brothers to sing the Fraternity Song in its new arrangement.
  - i. President Lee responded that, as with prior arrangements of the Fraternity Song that served as its standard arrangement, use of the nowapproved new arrangement of the Fraternity Song is mandatory.
- e. The Epsilon Rho Chapter at Grambling State University asked if a shorter moratorium regarding the standard arrangement of the Fraternity Song would be possible.
  - i. President Lee responded that such a shorter moratorium would be possible, but a ten-year moratorium is consistent with the moratoria customarily placed on the Fraternity Rituals following their revision..
- f. The Gamma Omicron Chapter at Otterbein University asked if it would be possible for the National Chapter to decide at a later point to lift this moratorium before the full ten years had lapsed if the National Chapter now adopted a ten-year moratorium.
  - i. National Convention Parliamentarian Randazzo stated that it would not be possible for a later vote of the National Chapter to lift this moratorium early.
- g. The Beta Chi Chapter at the University of Virginia opined that a moratorium would not be wise at this time and that such a moratorium could instead be debated and adopted next biennium, as adopting a moratorium now would bar the opportunity to alter the now-approved standard arrangement of the Fraternity Song if issues were later identified with it.
- h. The Mu Sigma Chapter at Lincoln University (Pennsylvania) indicated agreement with the point made by the Beta Chi Chapter at the University of Virginia.
- i. The lota Phi Chapter at the University of New Hampshire opined that the work by the Ad Hoc National Committee on Musicianship over the last two years should be relied upon as the National Chapter evaluated the current state of the newly adopted arrangement of the Fraternity Song.
- j. The Eta Omicron Chapter at James Madison University noted that one of its Brothers served on the Ad Hoc National Committee on Musicianship and that this Brother indicated that any minor deviations from the standard arrangement of the Fraternity Song at this point would be made on a Chapter-by-Chapter basis.
- k. The Beta Lambda Chapter at Eastern New Mexico University noted that conversations about revising the arrangement of the Fraternity Song had persisted over several biennia.

- 10. The Beta Rho Chapter at the University of Toledo moved the previous question.
  - a. <u>President Lee noted that the motion did not require a</u> <u>second.</u><sup>2</sup>
     The motion passed.
- President Lee restated the current motion: The North Central District moved to place a ten-year moratorium on the standard arrangement of the Fraternity Song. The motion passed.
- 12. President Lee introduced Crosbee Lisser (Active Member, Eta Chapter at The Ohio State University and North Central District President) in light of her current role as chair of the National Committee on Jurisdiction.
- 13. Chair Lisser presented remarks on the work of the National Committee on Jurisdiction. (The full text of the report of the National Committee on Jurisdiction is available in Appendix #20.)
- 14. Chair Lisser presented the recommendations of the National Committee on Jurisdiction regarding changes to the National Constitution with their accompanying rationales. (The full text of these recommendations of changes to the National Constitution is available in Appendix #21.)
- 15. The North Central District moved to adopt the following changes to the National Constitution:
  - Removal of Section 6.106 regarding "membership advisement" status and appropriate renumbering of subsequent sections.
  - Removal of Section 4.105 regarding the scheduling of National Intercollegiate Band rehearsals.
  - Revision of Section 5.104 to refer to Section 1.116 (rather than Section 1.118).
  - Revision of Section 3.707 to eliminate the requirement for in-person meetings of the National Committee on Nominations and to state that the National Vice President for Professional Relations is selected by the National President (rather than the National Council).
  - a. <u>President Lee noted that the motion did not require</u> <u>a second because it was made at the direction of a</u> <u>National Committee.</u><sup>3</sup>

#### The motion passed.

- 16. The North Central District moved to adopt the following changes to the National Constitution:
  - Addition of new Sections 6.526, 6.527, and 6.528 to clarify the authority of the National Council regarding disciplinary status and to add a procedure for membership renouncement.
  - a. <u>Based on President Lee's prior statement, no second</u> was made for this motion.<sup>4</sup> **The motion passed.**
- 17. The North Central District moved to adopt the following change to the National Constitution:
  - Addition of new Section 6.515 to codify current practice for reinstatement of Inactive Members as Alumni Members and appropriate renumbering of subsequent sections.
  - a. <u>Based on President Lee's prior statement, no second</u> was made for this motion.<sup>5</sup>
  - b. The Gamma Omicron Chapter at Otterbein University opined that Inactive Members, at present, have their reinstatement requests subject to votes of approval by their Active Chapters, which makes reconnections between the Inactive Members and their Active Chapters more difficult.
  - c. The Eta Chapter at The Ohio State University requested clarification on the current process on reinstatement of Inactive Members as Alumni Members.
  - Evan Thompson (Life Member, Zeta Chi Chapter at the d. University of South Carolina and PNP #46) clarified that the proposed constitutional revision reflects the current process for reinstatement of Inactive Members as Alumni Members and merely codifies that process, as the process is not currently described in the National Constitution. PNP #46 Thompson further clarified that the KKΨ Alumni Association had proposed that requests for reinstatement of Inactive Members as Alumni Members should be approved by KK<sup></sup> Alumni Association Board of Directors, but this proposal was rejected by the National Committee on Jurisdiction because the National Council is the supreme authority on all status changes of Fraternity members. PNP #46 Thompson explained that, under the recommended revision, if the Active Chapter does

not exist at the time the reinstatement request is made, then the request will be subject to approval by the National Council.

### The motion passed.

- 18. The North Central District moved to adopt the following changes to the National Constitution:
  - Revision of Sections 2.102, 3.102, and 3.210 to remove the AABOD Chair as an ex-officio, non-voting member of the National Council and to add the AABOD Chair to the National Board of Trustees as an ex officio, nonvoting member.
  - a. <u>Based on President Lee's prior statement, no second</u> was made for this motion.<sup>6</sup>
  - b. The Kappa lota Chapter at the University of Nebraska at Omaha indicated displeasure from Alumni Members regarding this measure in light of the relationship between Active Members and Alumni Members and explained that the importance of communication among the leadership bodies is significant, as recognized through the the National President's new role as an ex-officio, non-voting member of the KKΨ Alumni Association Board of Directors.
  - c. The Kappa Upsilon Chapter at Marist College requested clarification on the proposed constitutional revision.
    - i. Dr. Malinda Matney (Life Member, Nu Chapter at the University of Michigan, Trustee of the National Board of Trustees, and PNP #41) indicated that this proposal was submitted by the National Board of Trustees in light of a desire for the KKΨ Alumni Association to be a key part of decisions by the National Board of Trustees about the liability of the Fraternity and its capital campaigns.
  - d. The Gamma Zeta Chapter at Lamar University asked if it would be possible for the AABOD Chair to be an ex officio, non-voting member of both the National Council and the National Board of Trustees.
    - i. Dr. Jack Lee III (Life Member, Delta Sigma Chapter at the University of Texas at Arlington, Vice Chair of the National Board of Trustees, and PNP #45) indicated that change would make the AABOD Chair a member of all three of these bodies within the National Leadership Team and would require a great deal of work on the part of the AABOD Chair to contribute to the operations of all three governing bodies.
    - ii. Adam Cantley (Life Member, Omicron Chapter at West Virginia University, Trustee of the National Board of Trustees, and PNP #43) indicated that communications between the KKΨ Alumni Association Board of Directors and the National

Council have benefited from the addition of the National President as an ex officio, non-voting member of the KKY Alumni Association Board of Directors.

- e. The Delta Pi Chapter at Mississippi Valley State University asked if there is a plan to keep the AABOD Chair involved with the work of the National Council.
  - i. President Lee indicated that she has held monthly National Leadership Team meetings that included both the National Council and the AABOD Chair and noted that there are other means of keeping different bodies and leaders within the National Leadership Team connected and advised as to their different activities.
- f. The Gamma Omicron Chapter at Otterbein University reiterated that the National President (or their designee) would have a voice within the KKY Alumni Association Board of Directors.
- Evan Thompson (Life Member, Zeta Chi Chapter at g. the University of South Carolina and PNP #46) noted that Active Members do not have a voice in alumni affairs through representation on the KKY Alumni Association Board of Directors and that, while the original rationale for including the AABOD Chair as an ex officio, non-voting member of the National Council was to provide Alumni Members with a voice when the National Council votes on issues related to alumni affairs, there is not overlap in the missions between the National Council and the KKΨ Alumni Association Board of Directors. Past National President Thompson stated that, if this revision is not adopted, then a better system for alumni representation on the National Leadership Team would need to be considered.
- 19. The Northeast District moved the previous question.
  - a. <u>President Lee clarified that a motion on the previous</u> <u>question does not require a second, but does require</u> <u>passage by a two-thirds majority vote.</u><sup>7</sup> **The motion passed.**
- 20. President Lee restated the previous motion: The North Central District moved to adopt the following changes to the National Constitution:
  - Revision of Sections 2.102, 3.102, and 3.210 to remove the AABOD Chair as an ex-officio, non-voting member of the National Council and to add the AABOD Chair to the National Board of Trustees as an ex officio, nonvoting member.
     The motion failed.
- 21. President Lee recognized the Western District.

- 22. The Western District noted that, while passions may be inflamed, we need to treat each other with respect as Brothers.
- 23. President Lee recognized the Northeast District.
- 24. The Northeast District requested for further committee reports to be displayed on the projector screen at the front of the room.
  - a. President Lee agreed that further committee reports

will be displayed in this manner.

- 25. The lota Gamma Chapter at Washington State University asked for clarification on whether to clarify if the failed amendment can come for a vote next biennium
  - a. President Lee clarified that the failed amendment can be considered at the next National Convention
- 26. President Lee recessed the Separate Session at 3:11 PM EST.

### SEPARATE SESSION #6

Friday, July 14, 2023

- 1. President Lee called the Separate Session back to order at 3:22 PM EST.
- 2. President Lee introduced Dusty Butler (Active Member, Gamma Delta Chapter at Wayne State College and Midwest District President) in light of her current role as chair of the National Committee on Ways and Means.
- 3. Chair Butler presented remarks on the work of the National Committee on Ways and Means. (The full text of the report of the National Committee on Ways and Means is available in Appendix #22.)
  - a. Dr. Jack Lee III (Life Member, Delta Sigma Chapter at the University of Texas at Arlington, Vice Chair of the National Board of Trustees, and PNP #45) reviewed the 2023-25 National Fraternity Budget proposed by the National Committee on Ways and Means at a high level. PNP #45 Lee noted how the National Fraternity Budget required adjustment due to our decrease in membership over the course of the biennium, outlined how the budget is funded, remarked on the adjustments to our national revenue due to affinity program losses, and discussed how the Fraternity's fiscal year is structured. PNP #45 Lee also mentioned the proposed budget's decrease in costs regarding computer services due to the completion of the first phase of OPUS development.
  - b. PNP #45 Lee noted that cuts in expenditures in the proposed budget are concentrated in the salaries of the Chapter Field Representatives and in the anticipated travel expenses of the National Council and the Chapter Field Representatives. Past National President Lee stated that no cuts were made to anticipated travel expenses of District Governors and that increases were made to the allotments provided to each District from National Fraternity funds.
  - c. PNP #45 Lee highlighted that increases in our liability insurance rates are not due to member misbehavior, but are instead linked to market forces.
  - d. PNP #45 Lee projected that there may come a time when National Convention registration fees are higher for Alumni Members and lower for Active Members, as Active Members pay for some National Convention costs through their annual dues.
  - e. PNP #45 Lee explained that, in the version of the proposed budget that includes a \$10 increase in Active Member annual dues, Active Member initiation fees, and Honorary Member initiation fees, there is a deficit of only one-tenth of one percent. PNP #45 Lee further explained that, in the version of the budget that includes a \$15 increase in Active Member annual dues, Active Member initiation fees, and Honorary Member initiation fees, and Honorary Member initiation fees, with the proposed budget with a smaller \$10 increase, with the exception that the \$15 increase

allows for the restoration of funding for the Chapter Field Representatives. PNP #45 Lee noted that, in this way, the \$15 increase in Active Member annual dues, Active Member initiation fees, and Honorary Member initiation fees allows the Fraternity to maintain two Chapter Field Representatives in the 2023-25 biennium.

- f. PNP #45 Lee indicates that Tau Beta Sigma is moving forward with a \$15 increase in dues and fees similar to the increase offered as an option for our Active Member annual dues, Active Member initiation fees, and Honorary Member initiation fees. PNP #45 Lee noted that it is up to the Active Members in the National Chapter to determine whether parity in dues across the two organizations will be maintained.
- 4. President Lee entertained a motion to approve the proposed 2023-25 budget. (The full text of the proposed National Fraternity Budget for the 2023-25 biennium is available in Appendix #23.)
- 5. The lota Gamma Chapter at Washington State University moved to approve the proposed National Fraternity Budget for the 2023-25 biennium with a \$15 increase in Active Member annual dues, Active Member initiation fees, and Honorary Member initiation fees.
  - a. <u>Gamma Kappa Chapter at Northern Arizona University</u> <u>seconded the motion.</u>
  - b. The Lambda Chapter at the University of Arkansas indicated support for the \$15 increase in Active Member annual dues, Active Member initiation fees, and Honorary Member initiation fees due to a desire to keep parity with Tau Beta Sigma's dues and fees.
  - c. The Nu Kappa Chapter at Georgia Southern University indicated that, in its extensive discussion with the Ways and Means Committee, it feels that the adoption of the \$15 increase in Active Member annual dues, Active Member initiation fees, and Honorary Member initiation fees is the correct decision, that Tau Beta Sigma would make a similar position if our situations were reversed, and that the Chapter Field Representative program should continue to receive financial support.
  - d. The Western District indicated that the \$15 increase in Active Member annual dues, Active Member initiation fees, and Honorary Member initiation fees is essential to the success of the Western District due to the need for Chapter Field Representative visits to help support the work of the Western District Council, which might otherwise be limited in light of the geographic reach of the Western District.
  - e. The lota Chapter at the Georgia Institute of Technology noted that, if there is a disparity in dues levels between Kappa Kappa Psi and Tau Beta Sigma, then Tau Beta Sigma would be hurt.

- f. The Eta Omega Chapter at Howard University asked how much money has been allocated from the Fraternity's General Fund to its Trust over the last 10 years and whether it would be possible to return that money to the General Fund.
  - i. Dr. Jack Lee III (Life Member, Delta Sigma Chapter at the University of Texas at Arlington, Vice Chair of the National Board of Trustees, and PNP #45) responded that it is not common for money to move from the Fraternity's General Fund to its Trust, as the money from the Trust is devoted primarily to the National Intercollegiate Band. PNP #45 Lee noted that the Fraternity as a whole has not moved money into the Trust as a rule, but instead maintains the General Fund and the Trust in separate accounts, thereby allowing money to be available for the Fraternity quickly in the event of emergency. PNP #45 Lee also noted that the Fraternity also maintains limitations on how funds in its Trust can be used.
- g. The Mu Chi Chapter at the University of Texas at Rio Grande Valley asked why the budget materials only report on the Fraternity's finances through December 2022.
  - i. PNP #45 Lee responded that issues related to the transition from our past National Headquarters Accountant have caused a delay in the full accounting of the Fraternity's funds. PNP #45 Lee stated that the Fraternity and its National Headquarters staff are partnering with an accounting firm to complete financial reconciliations for the end of the 2021-2023 biennium. PNP #45 Lee also stated that the Fraternity and its National Headquarters staff also partners with an independent accounting firm on a yearly basis to review its financial reports and ensure the security of its funds.
- h. The Lambda Lambda Chapter at Indiana State University opined that, while it can see the merit of retaining parity in dues and fees with Tau Beta Sigma, it is unsure whether that goal should be a determining factor in the Fraternity's decision.
- i. The Nu Nu Chapter at the University of Alabama indicated its belief that the \$15 increase in Active Member annual dues, Active Member initiation fees, and Honorary Member initiation fees is appropriate at this time.
- 6. The Gamma Kappa Chapter at Northern Arizona University moved the previous question.
  - a. <u>Based on President Lee's prior statement regarding</u> <u>motions on the previous question, no second was</u> <u>made for this motion.</u><sup>8</sup> **The motion passed.**
- 7. President Lee restated the previous motion: The lota

Gamma Chapter at Washington State University moved to approve the proposed National Fraternity Budget for the 2023-25 biennium with a \$15 increase in Active Member annual dues, Active Member initiation fees, and Honorary Member initiation fees.

## The motion passed.

- President Lee introduced Jesse Jackson (Active Member, lota Zeta Chapter at North Carolina Agricultural and Technical State University and Southeast District President) in light of his current role as chair of the National Committee on Chapter Leadership.
- 9. Chair Jackson presented remarks on the work of the National Committee on Chapter Leadership. (The full text of the report of the National Committee on Chapter Leadership is available in Appendix #24.)
  - The Theta Tau Chapter at Fayetteville State University indicated that allowing Chapter finalists for the William A. Scroggs Founder's Trophy to provide a ten-minute presentation would be preferable and allow those Chapters to describe their work and efforts more thoroughly.
  - b. The lota Gamma Chapter at Washington State University noted that, in its experience as a Chapter finalist for the William A. Scroggs Founder's Trophy, it did not feel able to answer questions adequately in its responses submitted to the National Committee on Chapter Leadership and would have instead appreciated a question-and-answer session with the committee.
  - c. The Epsilon Xi Chapter at Miami University asked whether there are plans for the next biennium to allow additional time for Chapter finalists for the William A. Scroggs Founder's Trophy to submit materials for consideration by the National Committee on Chapter Leadership.
    - i. VPP Savoy indicated that he would pass this recommendation to the next VPP.
- The Eta Omicron Chapter at James Madison University moved to reconsider the approved National Fraternity Budget for the 2023-25 biennium with a \$15 increase in Active Member annual dues, Active Member initiation fees, and Honorary Member initiation fees.
   President Lee ruled this motion out of order.
- 11. President Lee introduced VPP Savoy, Midwest District President Dusty Butler (Active Member, Gamma Delta Chapter at Wayne State College), North Central District President Crosbee Lisser (Active Member, Eta Chapter at The Ohio State University), Northeast District President Kael Pelletier (Active Member, Epsilon Nu Chapter at the University of Massachusetts), Southeast District President Jesse Jackson (Active Member, Iota Zeta Chapter at North Carolina Agricultural and Technical State University),

Remember these numbers until they come up again. Though right now there is none, the meaning behind them is... beautiful.

Brothers,

It's by no accident that we find ourselves here together again in a shared space. Though we're all different, and come from widely different backgrounds - we all share AT LEAST one thing in common: The sacred lessons of our Ritual, and by that- the promise we made to service for college bands. By going through our 3rd Degree, we became agreeable to the work in which we love. By attending Chapter Meetings, District Conventions, and National Convention- you've proved your enthusiasm - and by continuing to do so, by putting your heart into it no matter how difficult it gets - you've shown what it means to be unswerving.

As I'm sure many of you can relate to, myself and my chapter have gone through growing pains, trial and error, and change. Change- the word alone can be a scary thing to navigate. As we've all felt in the past 3 years, the world is ever-changing. Even today, we still are feeling the effects of the pandemic and how it has shaped our Fraternity. Despite this- we've grown. We've navigated the change, learned how to maneuver through difficult times, and we've helped push our organization in a positive direction. Whether you come from a chapter of 50 or a chapter of 5, this work does not go unnoticed.

I'll be the first to admit that for a while, I felt like my spark was fading. I didn't have a place within the Fraternity, my District, or even my Chapter. I was "existing", but simply that. Nothing more than an extra-nerdy band kid showing up to meetings when need-be. Top this with chapter conflict, music major fatigue, and.... You know... a global pandemic, it was pretty easy to feel unconfident with my role as a Brother. On the harder days, I felt as though the

highest I was striving for was not high enough. I was not living up to the "standard" precedent in which my chapter had set before. It took isolation to realize this was untrue.

It took courage to stand up for the change we needed. It took love and fellowship to work with my Brothers and embrace the needed changes. These changes included implementing a different and stronger Strategic Plan. We met at our annual summer retreat, and worked through our goals as a chapter and what we wanted to accomplish. We had difficult conversations, and admitted to our faults- how to fix them, too. We revitalized our focus on the pillars, remembering our foundational purpose. We answered the call to service that our university bands desperately needed, recovering from the pandemic norms of the year before.

We agreed, collectively, to take a step back and reflect.

We re-ignited our spark for Kappa Kappa Psi through enthusiastic projects and events. We unswervingly promised to be better.

This is how we maintained our charge to be better- it worked. And whether you've already done so, whether you're planning to do so- or whether you don't realize it yet, every single one of you is capable of maintaining the charge of our Fraternity.

Every single one of you belongs in the seat you're sitting in. I'll say it one more time- Every SINGLE one of you, BELONGS in the seat you're in. By simply showing up, representing your chapter, your district- you are doing the work. Sometimes showing up is the hardest part, we can all agree on that depending on the day. Brothers, you're filling the space that we're all sharing, and you were meant to do so. Whether you're a district officer, a chapter delegate, an alumni, life member, chapter officer, or an Active Brother here in attendance you AGREED to be here and kept that promise to show up and do the work. Continue setting that example for others, and encouraging Brothers to do the same. You were meant to do this.

By showing up, participating in conversations, meeting Brothers and Sisters this week, you're showing the love and enthusiasm that we carry for ourselves every day. Take a look around the room, behind you, in front of you- anywhere. You never know who may need that extra "hello" or enthusiastic high five to get them through the day. Brotherhood is so much more than going to events and meeting requirements- it's being there for others and it's extending our lessons from the Ritual in our own lives. Maintain the charge by being the enthusiastic Brother who decided to come to National Convention. (Hint: You're already doing it!)

On the days that feel more difficult... remember our lessons. Remember what we were taught in all three degrees, and ask yourself: Why do I keep going? What is my Kappa Kappa Why? Despite the THOUSANDS of miles that separate so many of us, our answers may not be as different as we think. And that is a beautiful, unswerving sentiment. Our differences may separate us as human beings and as individuals - but they also create a fantastic blend of Brotherhood, Fellowship, and Love.

We all share one common goal: To serve college bands. We're all servant leaders. We're all musicians. We are all Brothers- this is what connects us. Though the work in which we do is everchanging, the love in which we have for each other and for band is sacred.

I want all of you to take a moment and answer these prompts for yourself....

Think of your favorite service project. Who was with you? Who did you serve? Did you feel fulfilled in doing so?

Think of your favorite musical moment. What was the piece? What emotions did you feel? Think of your favorite leadership moment. What happened? What did you learn? Now, think of your favorite example of Brotherhood. Who was there? What were you doing?

The fact of the matter is, in that short time frame, most of you were probably able to answer these questions. These questions that directly correlate with our four pillars. Though I'm sure there was a wide variety of answers- we all shared a moment of community. You all proved that we as Brothers maintain the charge even in the simplest of ways, in a moment of shared silence. Take this moment and run with it. Take your ideas and sprint- ask questions, talk about these experiences, learn from others. Be a role model to others around you and demonstrate the pillars in which we learn about from day one. Something I've learned during my time as an Active brother is that our pillars don't end. The promise to uplift others and be a servant leader has no deadline, no timeframe. Maintaining the charge is a life-long journey. Not every single person will breathe Kappa Kappa Psi for as long as they live- and let me be clear: That is perfectly okay. Whether or not you continue to move forward with the Fraternity, or you move on with life in other avenues, being a Brother never stops. Be agreeable, by being a friend and advocate. Always.

Be enthusiastic, by showing up and loving what you do.

Be unswerving, by remembering our pillars. Remember our lessons.

Think of the change YOU can create; Ask yourself why you agreed to do this; Reflect on what keeps you going.... Now think back to the numbers from the beginning.

To the Brothers of Kappa Kappa Psi:

It is my honor and pleasure to present the 2023 Nominations Committee report. This is the fourth edition of the preconvention nomination process. This is pursuant to sections 3.708 and 3.709 of the National Constitution that outlines the election process to be reviewed and completed prior to National Convention. This is to allow chapters, delegates and members more time to review and deliberate the recommendations of the committee.

The committee's charges from the National Constitution (3.708):

- 1. Investigate and evaluate candidates for national office.
- 2. Ensure that all candidates are constitutionally qualified for office;
- 3. Working with the National Headquarters Staff, prepare and distribute by April 15 an election newsletter.
- 4. Meet in person to decide on a slate of candidates;
- 5. Announce and publish at least 30 days prior to the start of National Convention a recommended slate of candidates.

#### THE COMMITTEE WORK:

The committee began its work immediately with online meetings via Zoom and creating group goals and expectations. The committee also created a group chat on the GroupMe app for more informal communications.

Six candidates submitted information packets by the January 15th constitutional deadline. There was one submitted packet for the office of National President, two submitted packets for the office of National Vice President for Membership and Expansion, and one for the office of National Vice President for Student Affairs. There were two submitted packets for the two open positions on the Board of Trustees. All six candidates were determined to be constitutionally qualified. Relevant portions of their submitted packets were posted to the National Convention website for public review by all members of the fraternity. Additionally, National Headquarters produced the "Kappa Kappa Psi Elections Newsletter" that contained each candidate's information.

The Nominations Committee believed in full transparency in its work this biennium. After deliberation, the committee decided to publish the full Nominations Committee interview with each candidate. This would be the first time in Kappa Kappa Psi history that the work of the committee would be fully open, and Brothers would have the opportunity to watch each interview and hear what the committee heard before making their decisions. All candidates agreed to this new process.

The committee reviewed the submitted packets and scheduled online interviews with each of the six candidates. The interviews

were conducted via the Zoom app. Each interview was recorded and posted to the committee's secure Google Drive for further review by committee members. All interviews were scheduled and completed in February 2023. The committee created general questions for all candidates, questions specifically relating to each position, and questions for each individual candidate based on review of their packet. The interviews ranged from 45 minutes to one hour.

The committee met in Stillwater Oklahoma May 19-21, 2023 to decide a slate of candidates to recommend to the National Chapter. We collectively agreed to the challenge of identifying the strongest candidate for each office and assembling the strongest possible team for the national leadership based on qualifications, ideas and skill sets. Candidates were made aware of the in-person meeting and told if the committee had additional questions, the chair would organize another interview or call them directly.

#### THE SLATE RECOMMENDED BY THE COMMITTEE:

For NATIONAL PRESIDENT the committee recommends BANG CO (Alpha Zeta). Bang will be the second brother from the Alpha Zeta Chapter from Indiana University to be elected National President of Kappa Kappa Psi (Jones '49-51). Bang's fraternity service, professional experiences and training have prepared him to serve as the fortyninth National President of Kappa Kappa Psi. Within Brother Co's submitted election materials, he highlights his "Kappa Kappa Why" approach which will provide Brothers a fresh and innovative means to identify their continued commitment to Kappa Kappa Psi. He recognizes the importance of communication from the National Council, Alumni, and Active Members, and will strive to create open dialogue. His focus on long-term vision by continuing strategic planning and the short-term action items guiding the fraternity through the new OMRS "OPUS" system demonstrates his overall great attention to detail. The committee enthusiastically recommends Bang Co to be the next National President.

For NATIONAL VICE PRESIDENT FOR MEMBERSHIP AND EXPANSION the committee recommends NICHOLAS RORRER, PHD (Eta Beta). The committee believes that Dr. Rorrer's experience and goals meet every expectation needed to be successful as VP for Membership and Expansion. His professional experiences writing grants will be an invaluable assist to the council. Dr. Rorrer's service as a District Governor and Chapter Sponsor has given him direct interactions with the student voice and experience, which are prevalent in his vision. His experience as Chair of the Alumni Board of Directors shows his strong leadership skills and his ability to work with others. The ability Dr. Rorrer possesses to listen to all sides of debate and work towards a positive direction will help the National Council make the best decisions for the fraternity.

#### For NATIONAL VICE PRESIDENT FOR PROGRAMS the Committee recommends DANIEL MILLER (Omicron). Daniel sought a position on the Board of Trustees and presented a strong candidacy for that position. Upon review, the

Committee believed Daniel's ideas, platform, and qualifications were suited for the National Vice President for Programs position. Daniel possesses a thorough understanding of fraternity programs and how they work. His experiences as Chair of the Alumni Board of Directors and Chapter Sponsor have greatly prepared him to be a member of the National Council. The Committee believes that Daniel will do a tremendous job as VP for Programs and feels that he will contribute to creating the best National Council team for our fraternity.

For NATIONAL VICE PRESIDENT FOR STUDENT AFFAIRS the Committee recommends TAR-SHAE` ODOM (Zeta Eta). The committee believes Tar-Shae' returning to the National Council as VP for Student Affairs will be beneficial. Brother Odom expressed during the interview process a humble leadership approach that revolves around listening and mentoring. These ideas are important with his continued direct interactions with our active membership. Brother Odom stepping up and being appointed as VP for Student Affairs this biennium while finishing his undergraduate degree is an example of his dedication to KKPsi.

For the BOARD OF TRUSTEES (2 seats open) the committee recommends EVAN THOMPSON (Zeta Chi). The Committee believes Evan will do an outstanding job as a member of the Board of Trustees. Evan has experience as a Past National President, District Governor and Past CFR; which will bring important corporate knowledge to the board. The committee was very impressed with Brother Thompson taking time away from fraternity leadership to establish his teaching career as a music educator. As a result, he was recently recognized as Teacher of the Year, a recognition that is considered a high honor in any school district.

For the second seat of the BOARD OF TRUSTEES, the committee has voted NO SLATE. Section 2.109 of the National Constitution clarifies the authority given to the National Council to appoint a member to the Board of Trustees, should there be a vacancy left after the National Convention.

#### CHARGES/ RECOMMENDATIONS FROM THE COMMITTEE:

- The Committee recommends the NATIONAL PRESIDENT and NATIONAL COUNCIL consider creating a National Recruiting and Mentoring Committee.
  - Rationale: The Nominations Committee believes that the low turnout of candidate packets could be improved upon if a committee was created specifically to focus on the long-term leadership development of future National Council and Board of Trustee members. This committee would take multiple biennium's to develop but the reward would create opportunities for mentorship of members willing to serve someday.
- 2. The committee charges the NATIONAL PRESIDENT to review the resources provided to the Nominations Committee.
  - Rationale: Members of the Nominations Committee were surprised to discover that there are no clear

guidelines or requirements for national leadership outside of the National Constitution. The committee believes better descriptions of positions and process will eliminate any confusion and allow the committee a clearer path to do their work.

- 3. The committee charges to the NATIONAL PRESIDENT and EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR to revise the submission requirements to include the candidate's date of birth.
  - Rationale: One of the committee's responsibilities is to determine the eligibility of each candidate. One of the requirements is confirming age. The committee recommends adding "Date of Birth" on the election fact sheet questionnaire when candidates submit their packet. Additionally, the committee recommends adding a question if candidates are open to consideration for other positions than they are running for.
- 4. The committee charges the 2025 NOMINATIONS COMMITTEE to consider how much information from the candidate packets should be released.
  - Rationale: The committee discussed the release of all information included in submitted candidate packets online but did not come to a consensus. The 2025 Nominations Committee should review the confidentiality impact of releasing that information.
- 5. The committee recommends to the NATIONAL PRESIDENT to facilitate a partnering session with the 2023 and 2025 Nominations Committees.
  - Rationale: The committee believes a meeting between the immediate past chair and current chair or both committees would be helpful for the 2025 Nominations Committee to have a great kick-off to their work.

#### CLOSING REMARKS:

The committee would like to thank all six Brothers who presented themselves as candidates for national office. We all applaud your efforts and willingness to serve the fraternity at the highest level. We appreciate your cooperation in scheduling interviews and your commitment to a fair, transparent election process. While not all candidates will be successful in obtaining one of these selected positions, the committee appreciates your ambition and hope it does not end at this moment.

On behalf of the committee, I would like to thank the National Headquarters Staff, led by National Executive Director Steve Nelson, for all the assistance throughout the process. All questions and concerns were met with courtesy and professionalism. Additionally, we the committee thank National President Jessica Lee for the faith, guidance, and confidence she placed in all of us to be part of this committee.

Lastly, I would like to thank the members of the Nominations Committee. We had a very important job for the fraternity, and you all met that challenge with detail and efficiency. All Brothers took this work seriously and the work was smooth because of how prepared and dedicated each of you were. It was an honor to serve as the chair of this committee of Brothers. I am confident that the National Chapter will benefit from our work.

The purpose of the Programs Committee is to provide support for current national initiatives for its members through assessment, development, and promotion. During the biennium, the Programs Committee will focus on the promotion and assessment of the Founder's Circle Leadership Development program and the fraternity's National Awards Program.

## <u>Number of Meetings:</u> The committee had a total of 14 meetings during the 2021-2023 biennium.

#### Programs Committee Charges:

- 1. Provide support to chapters by answering questions via the <u>programs@kkpsi.org</u> email in a timely manner (within 72 hours).
- 2. Launch the Founder's Circle Leadership Development program by doing the following:
  - i. Review and update the online materials (if needed)
  - ii. Create a plan for "relaunching and reeducating" students on the program
  - iii. Post materials on the national website for access
  - iv. Determine how students will become credentialed in the levels of the program
  - v. Launch an application process for a new pool of speakers
  - vi. Explore ideas on how chapters can request a Founder's Circle Leadership speaker
- 3. Assess chapters participation in current programs and awards to make an informed decision as to viability of the programs and identify changes that may need to be made.
- 4. Create and send out media (emails, social media posts, etc) to all chapters, including Directors of Bands and Chapter Sponsors, educating members on national programs and awards, how the awards are selected/ nominated, and when the programs and awards take place/ are due.
- 5. Explore ideas to celebrate service as one of our core

ideals.

- 6. Explore ideas on how we can better implement the pillars of Kappa Kappa Psi (Musicianship, Leadership, Service, and Brotherhood) at our conventions, in our membership education program, on our social media/ website, or in other ways.
- 7. Prepare a report for each quarter of the committee's work to be shared with the National Council and posted on the National Website.

#### **Committee Accomplishments**

William Scroggs Trophy

- Created and reviewed a form for chapters to submit optional supplemental information for The Founders' Trophy
- Created a scoring guideline to formally evaluate eligible chapters for the 21-23 biennium that included review of submitted reports required through the national headquarters and optional supplemental information.
- Based on the review of members of the Programs Committee, the committee ratings were provided to the National Council for review. The National Council reviewed and presented to the fraternity 19 chapters that serve as finalists for the William Scroggs Trophy.
- Recommendations were provided to Vice President of Programs (VPP) Ed Savoy to continue the scoring guidelines to ensure equitability.

#### Founder's Circle Relaunch Plan

- The Programs Committee created sub committees to evaluate and assess the state of the Founder's Circle and develop a plan of action to make the program more accessible to the fraternity.
- The subcommittees focused on the relaunch process and recruitment of leadership speakers to facilitate sessions.
- The result provided the following:
  - Relaunch plan timeline and guidelines to provide to the fraternity, including a social media campaign designed to promote the relaunch of The Founders' Circle in the fall of 2022.
  - The development of an application and launch schedule to call for leadership speakers to facilitate sessions.
  - A plan for an evaluation process to see benchmarks for the Founder's Circle and recommendations for enhancement for future brothers.

#### Awards Promotion and Assessment

 A subcommittee was created to provide recommendations on how to promote awards and programs for the fraternity. The result was creating a timeline to promote awards throughout the biennium and a how-to manual on promoting awards. Our thank goes out to our committee advisor, Dr. Kirk Randazzo, and our subcommittee chairs from over the biennium: Molly Kuchan, Jennifer Besler, Russell House, Melissa Bannon, Josie Minor, and Byron Bryson. Without you, and without the work of every member of the Programs Committee, we could not have recognized the efforts of our outstanding Brothers of Kappa Kappa Psi.

#### Scope of work:

- 1. Tracking and reviewing membership calendars:
  - a. The <u>tracker</u> for chapter calendar submissions had several iterations. During this biennium, instead of re-creating the entire tracker document, new sheets were created for each semester. This allowed the committee, as well as the rest of the National Leadership Team, to easily track data for each chapter
  - b. For the next biennium, several changes were made to the tracker, to include noting both a chapter's recruiting and membership education time, as well as space for NLT and Committee members to make notes when they contact a chapter. This should make it easier for team members to work together
- 2. Launching public VPM resources <u>folder</u>, hosted within the Curriculum Committee Shared Drive:
  - a. This folder contains approved activities, chapter Vice President of Membership training support, Fraternity History, VPM Summit Materials, Road to Wisdom Google Slides, Ritual Dedication Video, and a Google Doc that hosts links for various other resources.
    - i. Work should continue to build out these resources during the next biennium with an increased emphasis on recruitment and retention
    - The activity bank will need monitoring to ensure no documents with any personally identifiable information was inadvertently left on the documents in their bank
- 3. Our Diversity Matters Lesson:
  - a. This new lesson, entitled Our Diversity Matters, was one of the major charges given to the Curriculum Development Committee. This lesson focuses on helping chapters develop an understanding of correct terminology, an overview of Fraternity history through the lens of diversity, and create a space in where Brothers and Membership Candidates can explore their own biases and discuss them in a safe space.
  - b. This lesson was created in collaboration with the DEIA committee. Members from both the DEIA and Curriculum Development committee recommend this lesson be re-visited in the next biennium to make an appropriate changes and/or updates.
  - c. One item that Curriculum Development Committee charges to our next National Council is to work with the Fraternity's legal team to help understand how chapters may need support on presenting the information

d. Understanding the time constraints some chapters face during their membership intake process, the Curriculum Development Committee recommends chapters use this lesson as a supplemental lesson to the current Road to Wisdom lessons, or as a Continuing Membership Education Program (CMEP) lesson.

#### 4. Our Sisters Matter Lesson:

- a. While not originally a charge given to the Committee, multiple members of the Committee were passionate about making sure Kappa Kappa Psi chapters that did not have a Tau Beta Sigma chapter on their campus were well-informed as to what the Sorority entails.
- b. Working with the Tau Beta Sigma Vice President for Membership & Expansion and the Chair of the Tau Beta Sigma Curriculum Committee, the Curriculum Development Committee worked to create a lesson that was accessible to all Brothers, regardless of whether Tau Beta Sigma is a presence on their campus or not.
- c. Our Sisters Matter includes information on the overview and structure of the Sorority, the values and programs of Tau Beta Sigma, and exploration of the Bond between the two organizations.
- d. This lesson was shared with the Tau Beta Sigma Vice President for Membership & Expansion and the Chair of the Tau Beta Sigma Curriculum Committee after our last meeting on June 25, 2023 and therefore has not been officially sanctioned by Tau Beta Sigma (yet).
- e. Understanding the time constraints some chapters face during their membership intake process, the Curriculum Development Committee recommends chapters use this lesson as a supplemental lesson to the current Road to Wisdom lessons, or as a Continuing Membership Education Program (CMEP) lesson.
- 5. Several online workshops were held during the biennium, as well as some workshops that were presented at district events, including district convention. Due to lack of financial resources, committee member travel was not supported during the biennium, which made it a difficult 'sell' to district presidents to have workshops presented by committee members at their conventions, unless a committee member was already attending in a different capacity.
- 6. Proposed changes for the 2023-2025 biennium were sent to the Publications Manager during the 2023 spring semester, and can be found <u>here</u>. NOT FOR PUBLIC RELEASE: It should be noted that these changes were only completed by Ken Corbett, and not discussed in a meeting, despite the Chair asking for proposed changes at all meetings. Some proposed changes are inaccurate or do not clearly explain to our new Publications Manager what the changes are supposed to be (for example, on page 17 of the VPM guide, it just states "update" under information about Google Classroom, and this should be removed from the RTW completely).
- 7. All quarterly reports were submitted to National President

Jessica Lee in a timely manner, and can be found here.

#### Proposed changes for the 2023-2025 Curriculum Development Committee:

- 1. Include all District Vice Presidents of Membership as automatic members of the Committee. This will make communication between the committee and the six districts easier, as well as allow the committee to address any needs or concerns in a timely manner.
- 2. Continue to edit personally identifiable information (PII) from approved activities as they are submitted and approved.
- 3. Continue to edit and refine the Our Diversity Matters Lesson.
- 4. Create appropriate Google Slides resources for both new lessons, Our Diversity Matters and Our Sisters Matter, as well as other appropriate support materials for chapter Vice Presidents of Membership. Focus on recruitment and retention in support of the Strive for 5 program.
- 5. Continue to solicit feedback from Brothers about changes and improvements to the Road to Wisdom materials.
- 6. Host online workshops to support chapter Vice Presidents of Membership.

- 2. Create resources to assist chapters with various aspects of chapter operations and post them on the national website.
- 3. Review the chapter officer handbooks, and make edits, revisions, or other changes so that these materials will be utilized.
- 4. Create a training plan for the following officer positions:
  - i. Chapter President
  - ii. Chapter Vice President of Service / Service Chair
  - iii. Chapter Treasurer
  - iv. Chapter Secretary

- v. Chapter Historian
- 5. Prepare a report for each quarter of the committee's work to be shared with the National Council and posted on the National Website

The Committee consisted of the following individuals:

After our first meeting, which occurred on October 12, 2021, following the appointment of the committee, our group determined that we would meet the second Tuesday of each month at 7:00 pm NHQ time via ZOOM. Skipping only the Januarys of 2022 and 2023, and May of 2023 due to subcommittees meeting to finish preparations for our national convention assignments, the full committee met a total of 18 times during this biennium. Despite setting up online polling at the end of each 6-month period for what future meeting times would (and should) be, our timing remained the same throughout the biennium.

Below, I will address our work on each of the charges to which were assigned.

1. Provide support to chapters by answering questions submitted to the committee email address within 72 hours.

At the beginning of the biennium, we elected to split the committee into various subgroups to help better deviate our work. Each team assigned a 'contact' who would be responsible for answering student questions received via the group email. Unfortunately, we did not receive many inquiries over our two year period; however, the ones we did receive got timely responses from the members of our team most in tune with the area of their question.

2. Create resources to assist chapters with various aspects of chapter operations and post them on the national website.

The CFRs had dedicated time during each of our meetings to help guide the committee on what chapters' major needs were so that we could accommodate our work accordingly. Their guidance was vital to the committee's work throughout the biennium, and we would like to extend a special 'thank you' to both Kennedy Struck and Jake January for being more than just ex-officio members of our committee. At each meeting, we had discussions about how to be a better resource for what chapters' immediate needs were, including paperwork, relationship challenges, and re-engaging post-COVID were all hot topics that were discussed at length. Much of these discussions helped to guide the work that will be detailed in the next section, as several 'one-pager' style resources were created to help guide chapters on several routine processes. With the transition of graphic design staff at headquarters, the finishing touches of this project hit a snag, but we are confident that the content created will be ready for publishing as soon as a trained, paid eye sees it and can ensure conformity to the fraternity's branding standards.

3. Review the chapter officer handbooks and make edits, revisions, or other changes so that these resources will be utilized.

During Fall of 2021 and the Spring and Summer of 2022, the committee's first major project was to review existing resources for chapters and chapter officers that were specific to operations. Upon review of the current materials, we found that, overwhelmingly, most needed to be simplified into documents that would be more easily consumed by the current active membership of our Order. In order to do this, the committee split into six different subgroups, which allowed our team to more thoroughly review the current materials. The result was the creation of 'one pager' style resources that could be shared on the current website and hopefully, in the future, shared on OPUS for chapters to more easily access. It is our hope that the simplification of these resources will increase usage moving forward.

- 4. Create a training plan for the following officer positions:
  - i. Chapter President
  - ii. Chapter Vice President of Service / Service Chair
  - iii. Chapter Treasurer
  - iv. Chapter Secretary
  - v. Chapter Historian

After much discussion, the committee chose to create trainings for each of the above chapter leader positions, and discussed the possibility of a VP of Membership training and mental health / conflict resolution track. We received guidance from National President Lee, Past National President Randazzo, and Past National President Cantley on the overall direction of some of these resources and would like to extend a special 'thank you' for their time and effort on this project. Ultimately. We focused our work on the above positions while also adding alumni communications to a 'communicators' track, two general training sessions aligned with the 'Founders Circle' leadership development program and were instructed to leave Vice President of Membership training and materials to the National Curriculum Committee. We are pleased to share that two presentations were created during the second half of the biennium for each of these chapter officer training tracks; one with key information of substantial importance to the role, and the other as a supplemental workshop to help further educate chapter leaders on the potential growth of their roles and their chapters. It is our hope that, upon successful demonstration of these resources and the receipt of feedback following this national convention, that these presentations will be available for use at future district and national level leadership development programs or days, with gualified alumni able to give each of these presentations for the benefit of the active membership.

5. Prepare a report for each quarter of the committee's work to be shared with the National Council and posted on the National website.

Each quarter of the biennium, the committee submitted a report of the group's work to the National Council by the respective deadline.

We would like to charge the 2023 - 2025 National Chapter Operations Committee, should it be appointed again, with the following:

- Actively solicit feedback from stakeholders able to guide conversations about the active memberships' most immediate needs related to chapter operations.
- 2. Ensure resources that meet branding standards are posted on OPUS and the national website for easy access by the active membership.
- 3. Pursue the creation of more 'one page' resources that can be easily consumed by chapter members
- Review paperwork standards, deadlines, and reports for their viability and necessity and make recommendations for any changes at the 2025 National Convention to the National Council and the Jurisdiction Committee, if necessary.

I would like to extend a special thank you to National President Lee for entrusting me to lead this committee over the last two years, Nicole Brooks for the many 'after hours' hours she committed to ensuring this group's success, Jacob Welper for his leadership as Committee Vice Chair, and to the following committee members for stepping up to provide leadership to subgroups and ensuring the overall success of our group across multiple levels:

- February & March of 2023 I met personally with each district council to discuss district convention planning, and finalizing the end of the year of items.

## Ken Corbett Most Improved Award

Prior to the 2023 National Convention, the Student Advisory Committee met to develop an application process and assess the nominations for the Kenneth Corbett Most Improved Chapter Award. The committee created a list of six questions to ask each nominee, which are as follows:

- 1. What has been your biggest challenge this biennium? How have you tried to overcome this challenge?
- 2. How would you describe the change of your chapter's unique identity within the past two years within your band program and within the fraternity at large?
- 3. How have you improved past chapter programming to become more effective?
- 4. What does your chapter do to stay engaged on the District and National level?
- 5. How has your chapter incorporated DEIA into its operations over the past two years?
- 6. What goals do you have for your chapter in the next biennium?

To assess the chapters, the committee developed the following process:

• Each chapter was asked to submit a presentation (no longer than five minutes) to the Committee by July 3, 2023. The

presentation could be in any format (ex. poster, video, slideshow) that explained the chapter's growth over the past biennium. This year's committee wanted to allow each chapter to showcase who they are without any reservations.

- The Committee also asked each chapter to register for an interview prior to the 2023 National Convention. The interviews lasted no longer than one hour, and chapters could bring no more than three Active members or recent graduates (Class of 2023) to share their chapter's story. The Committee asked questions #1 through #6 (shown above) in each interview. If the committee had any follow up questions for the chapter they could do so.
- After reviewing each chapter's presentation and reflecting on their interview, the Committee then assessed each chapter based on the following criteria. It was our goal that this rubric would not be taken in the spirit of percentages of a point separating winners from losers, but rather be a tool from which we could discuss tangible aspects of our finalist chapters' presentations and interviews. In the event of discussion being unsatisfactory to determine a winner, we used the numerical ranking system to quantitatively separate chapters from each other. The categories were each assessed from a growth perspective and considered the effectiveness and depth of the chapter's approach to each topic. Each category was scored from 1 (unsatisfactory) to 4 (exceptional). The categories were as follows:
- Growth from 2021 to 2023
- Commitment to Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion
- Brotherhood Development
- Leadership Development
- After discussing feedback and the performance of each Chapter, the Committee met to determine the winner of the Ken Corbett Most Improved Chapter Award, which will be announced at our banquet.

## Assigned Charges to the 2021-2023 Student Advisory Committee:

The 2019-2021 Student Advisory Committee would like to present the following charges to the 2021-2023 Student Advisory Committee:

1. Listen: The Student Advisory Committee is composed of

active brothers holding district offices around the country. For many, this will be your first and clearest exposure to the national level of the Fraternity. We charge you to listen, both to the words and actions of the national officers, and to the experiences you have as a SAC member. Your journey as an officer is predicated on your ability to listen to lessons both spoken and unspoken, and to translate those words and actions into knowledge. Work with your council to find time to actively engage with our national officers and national programming.

- 2. Learn: The Student Advisory Committee is a great source of leadership training in the fraternity, both in the explicit and the implicit. As you absorb the lessons and messages given to you during your time on the Committee, we charge you to absorb all that you can, and bring these lessons back to your districts and chapters. Every guest speaker, national officer, and brother of the fraternity brings you knowledge, whether in their attendance or in their absence. Even those who do not speak are teaching you volumes in their choices, and it is your duty as the bearer of the student voice to recognize these lessons and learn from them. Work with the National Vice President for Student Affairs to build in time during your SAC meetings to discuss these lessons with one another.
- 3. **Speak**: You have been given a platform and a voice: Use it. Your voice is the fuel under the fire of this fraternity; without active brothers and active leadership, we would cease to exist. Nothing is more important than the active experience, because that is what binds us all together. Your districts elected you, and chose you to be the mouthpiece of their needs and experiences. Carry with you always the gift of Speech, and use it to blaze your path in this fraternity. Work with the National Council to identify consistent meeting times to share your thoughts and feedback.
- 4. Award: Finally, the 2019-2021 Student Advisory Committee charges the 2021-2023 Student Advisory Committee to work with the National Vice President for Programs and National Vice President for Student Affairs to select the 2021-2023 Kenneth M. Corbett Most Improved Chapter Award recipient at the 2023 National Convention in Orlando, if applicable.

#### Assigned Charges to the 2023-2025 Student Advisory Committee:

Utilize the SAC to bridge the national-chapter, district-chapter and chapter-chapter gap. The SAC demonstrably serves as the most effective means of distributing and clarifying information from the National level of the Fraternity for student leaders. Committee members should actively and indiscriminately incorporate questions and concerns from their District's chapters into the discussions of the SAC for the benefit of said chapters.

Continue to develop as leaders through the SAC. The SAC provides its members with an excellent opportunity to grow and learn, as prior charges also assert. Committee members

should continue to focus on growth and learning while serving on this committee.

Use the SAC flexibly. At the end of the day, the SAC has a lot of pursuable avenues to strengthen chapters and student leadership. Moreover, the committee shouldn't be afraid to pursue these avenues. The committee ought to experiment with internal programming, work with District Councils, and work with other National leadership.

# Assigned Charges to the 2023-2025 Vice President for Student Affairs

NVPSA should work to incorporate National leadership ranging from Governors to the National President and including Headquarters staff to help bridge the gap between our student leadership. This will give our students the opportunity to learn and grow from different experiences from our National Leadership Core.

Continue the use of meeting time polls. While not all student leaders can likely meet at once, encouraging use of the meeting time polls will ensure that meetings meld with as many schedules as possible.

Encourage non-business SAC meetings to socialize and build brotherhood. We're lucky to build bonds in-person during National Convention, but in the middle of a biennia it's likely that district officers will interact with their counterparts seldomly in a non-business setting. Let's be friends across the nation and let brotherhood shine bright from sea to shining sea.

#### Meetings:

In the 2021-2023 biennium, the Ritual Performance and Education committee met 20 times. These meetings primarily focused on the committee's charges of developing Ritual-based workshops, reviewing the Inner Circle, and providing chapter support.

The workshops developed/maintained by the committee included: utilizing the Inner Circle; Virtual Degrees background presentations; Preparation and Debriefing of the Ritual; and Accommodations for the Ritual. These workshops were presented at various district events and at this national convention. There are plans to continue refining them and developing further material to guide chapters where necessary.

The Inner Circle was also heavily scrutinized by the committee for the entire later half of the biennium, and a list of recommended changes has been provided to the 2023 Ritual and Regalia Committee. This took place between the summers of 2021 and 2022 and includes changes regarding grammar, content, safety concerns, and overall format. In the next biennium, the committee plans on working with National Headquarters to update the Inner Circle with all approved changes.

In addition to the committee's assigned charges, we also began working towards the two goals of Ritual accommodation materials and a Spanish translation of the ritual. This began through a fraternity-wide survey, which helped us develop specialized focus groups. While we were not able to get a Spanish translation group assembled this biennium due to lack of availability, we were able to meet two times with a group of Brothers with disabilities or who have worked on accommodation materials. At this time, we currently have an accommodations workshop that focuses on assisting chapter leaders with addressing accessibility in the Ritual and have plans to develop an accessibility handbook for chapters over this next biennium, which will be run through the DEIA committee and our focus groups. Work towards a Spanish translation and accommodations for the Ritual will continue into the next biennium and we encourage all brothers who have the desire and passion to assist with these topics to reach out to our committee by either completing the fraternity volunteer google form, or by emailing us at ritualeducation@ kkpsi.org.

#### Final Status on Assigned Charges:

<u>Charge</u>: Provide support to chapters by answering questions via the ritualeducation@kkpsi.org email in a timely manner (within 72 hours)

<u>Progress Update</u>: The committee continued to provide support to chapters via the ritualeducation@kkpsi.org email address. This support included virtual degrees, reviewing of chapter ceremonies, accessibility concerns, Ritual clarifications, and Ritual Equipment.

Charge: Develop a set of workshops that the RPEC can facilitate

both virtually over zoom and or in person at conventions. Topics should include:

- Performance of the Ritual
- A workshop over each degree
- A workshop over the implementation of the Inner Circle
- Other workshops, as deemed appropriate by the committee

<u>Progress Update</u>: The committee created and maintained workshops regarding the Inner Circle, Virtual Degrees, Preparation and Debriefing of the Ritual, and Accommodations for the Ritual.

<u>Charge</u>: Evaluate the use of all activities within the Inner Circle and develop any recommendations for changes to the Inner Circle to be approved by the 2023 Ritual and Regalia Committee.

<u>Progress Update</u>: The committee has reviewed the Inner Circle and provided recommendations to be provided to the 2023 Ritual and Regalia Committee, this took place between the summers of 2021 and 2022 and includes changes regarding:

- Grammar
- Content
- Safety Concerns
- Overall Format

<u>Charge</u>: Serve as Ritual Performance consultants for all district conventions and the 2023 National Convention

<u>Progress Update</u>: The committee was available for all conventions and provided workshops/Ritual assistance when requested.

<u>Charge</u>: Prepare a report for each quarter of the committee's work to be shared with the National Council and posted on the National Website (redacted if needed)

<u>Progress Update</u>: The committee worked to provide reports to the National Council throughout the Biennium.

WHEREAS, Brother Krcatovich served as Kappa Kappa Psi Alumni Association Chair (2013-2015), National Vice President for Programs, 2015-2017, National Vice President for Colonization and Membership, 2017-2019, National President, 2019-2021, Board of Trustees 2019-2023, Data Review Chair, 2015, Curriculum Development 2017-2019, Centennial Committee 2017-2019; and

WHEREAS, during Brother Krcatovich's six years serving on the National Council, he started his Presidency in 2019 when in March 2020, the COVID-19 pandemic caused massive disruption for the National Fraternity, the National Council was able to adopt Pivot, a virtual chapter operations guide, conduct district events and national meetings virtually, induct members securely through a virtual environment. The 2020 and 2021 District Conventions were all held virtually with the 2020 season including "DC Al Coda" a day of workshops and fellowship. In addition to Pivot, the national fraternity continued to address important operational issues and projects in spite of the pandemic, including a revision of National Headquarters Human Resources operations, a longterm property management plan, the purchase of the HQ Annex, sale of the Duck Street Property that formerly housed the Chapter Field Representatives, appointing a Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Advocacy task force, and adopting formal changes to financial operations and new agreements with Tau Beta Sigma for the operations of the organization. Despite these challenges, the Fraternity ended the biennium in a positive fiscal position and adopted major structural and operational changes including updated risk management policies; and

Brother Krcatovich, the 45<sup>th</sup> National President ended the 48th biennium featuring the 2021 National Convention held in Grand Rapids, Michigan, in front of more than 1,000 sisters, brothers, and guests, the first in person event since March 2020. The 2021 National Intercollegiate Band performed SUSPENDED by Alex Shapiro, conducted under the baton of Cynthia Johnston Turner. The 2021 National Convention featured the Boston Brass, a celebration of CBDNA and the 75th Anniversary of the Founding of Tau Beta Sigma, the adoption of a major series of revisions to the National Constitution, and a memorial service to Sarah Fitzgerald, Northeast District Governor, who passed away while in service to the Fraternity; and

WHEREAS, Brother Krcatovich became a Life Member in 2010 and was granted a Life Membership in the National Chapter on July 16, 2021; and

WHEREAS, Brother Krcatovich will be retiring from the Board of Trustees after four years of service on the Board, and thirteen years of national and district leadership service to Kappa Kappa Psi; and

WHEREAS, his love for and desire to serve Kappa Kappa Psi over the last thirteen years is to be commended and has had

a significant and indelible influence on the future of Kappa Kappa Psi; and

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the National Chapter of Kappa Kappa Psi expresses its sincere appreciation for his devoted service and honors Brother Krcatovich for his record of fraternity service and dedication; and

# APPENDIX 13 - REPORT OF THE Committee on Ritual and Regalia

To the Brothers of Kappa Kappa Psi here assembled,

It is my honor to present the Report of the 2023 National Ritual and Regalia Committee.

The Committee was charged with the following:

- 1. Review the accessibility work from the Ritual Performance and Education Committee that was completed this biennium and provide feedback.
- 2. Review the changes and updates to The Inner Circle Ritual Education Program from the Ritual Performance and Education Committee and provide feedback.
- 3. Consider the creation of a pin for the J. Lee Burke student achievement award and provide ideas for a possible pin design.
- 4. Review the report and charges from the 2021 Ritual and Regalia Committee listed below. These were not addressed during the biennium. Based on the charge recommendations listed in the report, create an outline of

#### jewelry recommendations.

Starting on June 10th, all Committee members asynchronously reviewed the work on accessibility and The Inner Circle. as well as resources on our jewelry rules and customs provided by President Lee. The Committee members also reviewed the purpose, honors, and iconography associated with the J. Lee Burke Student Achievement Award.

On June 12th, the Committee first discussed the work on accessibility in the Ritual and the work on The Inner Circle Ritual Education Program. The Ritual Performance and Education Committee provided a preliminary guidebook for accessibility in the Ritual as well as a list of typographical and content edits for The Inner Circle. Our Committee unanimously voted to support the direction, completion, and implementation of this work. We believe that the work requires no further feedback at this time. However, we stipulate the proviso that further accessibility work should be completed with the counsel of the DEIA Committee.

The Committee proceeded to discuss the current resources which outline jewelry rules and customs. The Committee determined that the rules and customs require extraordinary effort in order to find. Additionally, no resource presents the rules and customs in an accessible format. To this end, the Committee recommends the creation of a rules and customs document that Brothers can easily access through the website. The Committee stipulates that this document must primarily communicate its expectations visually. In tandem, the Committee reviews and summarizes the rules and customs.

The Committee unanimously approved the creation of a recognition pin for the J. Lee Burke Student Achievement Award after minimal discussion. The Committee then specified the reasonable symbolism and critical design components to include in the design process. The Committee decided to emphasize leadership and distinction as the core tenets of the design. Brother Hadley Deputy of the Nu Rho Chapter, who studies graphic design at Old Dominion University, drafted conceptualizations based on these specifications. We've appended Brother Deputy's work to this report. Brother Deputy's work will prove invaluable in communicating the intended design of the Committee; she deserves particular recognition on behalf of her work.

[We intend on presenting a preliminary design for acceptance. We will discuss the rationale behind the recognition pin design when we move for its acceptance.]

To the 2023-2025 Ritual Performance and Education Committee, we charge the following:

- 1. Complete the Ritual Accessibility Guide with the recurring counsel of the DEIA Committee; iterate on the content of the Guide.
- 2. Incorporate the proposed changes into the next edition of The Inner Circle Ritual Education Program.
- 3. Design and digitally publish a Rules and Customs document for jewelry which describes the full extent of the rules and

customs in a visual format.

To the 2023-2025 National Council, we charge the following:

We recommend the creation and sale of a recognition pin for the J. Lee Burke Student Achievement Award; to alter the design, in collaboration with the National Jeweler, if necessary to ensure the durability and feasibility of the pin; to coordinate with other officers, committees, and organizations as necessary.

  - Financial Transparency overview of students' dues, as well as the biennial budget

- Land acknowledgement for Stillwater Station and the Annex
- Committees page, which include committee list, contact information, and reports
- Working with the DEIA Committee to post DEIA resources
- Working with the Programs Committee to post the Founders' Circle Leadership Development Program
- Other website updates as needed
- Work with National HQ staff to assist with the rollout and implementation of OMRS 2.0 (Salesforce) through email support, virtual workshops/walk through videos, and other support documents.
- Create, launch, and analyze a biennial climate survey to better understand the work of our chapters
- Compile and review fraternal historical data, including membership data, and provide a membership overview to the National Chapter as part of the 2021-2023 biennial report.
- Prepare a report for each quarter of the committee's work to be shared with the National Council and posted on the National Website.

As this was the first biennium as a national committee, our charges ranged from website updating, survey creation and analysis, and software support. Overall, I greatly appreciated the time spent by the Brothers in this committee towards these various charges through virtual meetings and our slack channels. This biennium, the committee convened virtually 4 times. Unfortunately, select changes and events affected the progress of our committee such as, leadership changes and of most consequence, delayed launch of the OMRS 2.0/OPUS. Below are sections documenting progress and comments related to each charge.

## DATA@KKPSI.ORG

Minimal emails were sent to this address across the biennium. Unfortunately, many of these emails also did not pertain to the duties of the committee (e.g., award eligibility, @kkpsi.org email support). Senders were connected with the appropriate recipients or information. This highlights a need for an informational directory for inquiries.

## UPDATES TO THE NATIONAL WEBSITE

The committee worked with the newly hired National Headquarters Publications Manager as necessary.

During the first two quarters, the committee drafted a land acknowledgement statement for Stillwater station and the Annex. This has since been posted on the national website under the "about" drop-down. Committee information can currently be found on the national website under the "about -> Leadership" dropdown. A financial report for budget transparency is currently drafted with NHQ awaiting final updates and approvals.

## <u>OMRS 2.0</u>

Committee progress related to OMRS 2.0/OPUS consisted mainly of testing by the chair and vice chair as it is not fully implemented and available to students for use. For this reason, the committee could not yet create documents and media to support the rollout. This should be a focus for the next biennium as OPUS launches.

### **CLIMATE SURVEY & ANALYSIS**

As of 6/26/2023, the climate survey results consisted of 343 responses. A ~5% response rate based on the active membership numbers. Launched on June 6th 2023, the survey consisted of topics related to: Demographics, Communication, National Programs/Initiatives, Membership Education, Sense of Community, Commitment to Values, Operations, and General Member Experience. As this is the first attempt at creating such a survey, future committees should aim to 1) increase response rates and 2) refine questions for overall efficiency and effectiveness. Survey responses will be reviewed at the 2023 National Convention and results will be posted publicly once thoroughly analyzed.

## **COMPILATION & OVERVIEW OF FRATERNAL DATA**

Due to the delay of OMRS 2.0/OPUS, this data was not available for the committee to review and present. This should be a focus for the next biennium as membership data becomes accessible in OMRS 2.0/OPUS.

The committee charges the 2023-2025 National Data & Assessment Committee with the following:

- Provide support to chapters by answering questions via the data@kkpsi.org email in a timely manner (within 72 hours).
- Work with the National Headquarters Publications Manager to complete updates and changes to the National Website, as directed by the National President.
- Work with the National HQ staff to support the rollout of OPUS through email support, workshops, walkthrough videos, and other documents/media.
- Launch and analyze an <u>updated</u> biennial climate survey.
- Compile and review fraternal historical data, including membership data, and provide a membership overview to the National Chapter as part of the 2023-2025 biennial report.
  - 1. Work with the DEIA committee to analyze membership demographic data to better understand efforts towards recruitment and retention.
- Prepare a report for each quarter of the committee's work to be shared with the National Council and posted on the National Website.

A document outlining FAQs has been created; you can find it at <u>this link</u>. Aaron Moore and Steve Nelson have also put this link to the FAQ on the Sponsor/Director Task Force webpage. We have also made adjustments on the page concerning how chapters can manage virtual operations, should that be necessary. As needs and FAQs arrive, we edit the page as a committee, which anyone can view.

• Create a PowerPoint and record a workshop for new Directors/Sponsors entitled "Best Practices in Chapter Support and Oversight" that details the work of the Director and Chapter Sponsor.

Myself, Arupa Gopal-Campbell, and Mike Napolitano recorded a roundtable discussion entitled "Best Practices in Chapter Support and Oversight." It is up and running on the Sponsor/Director webpage and covered several topics. These included general information, overview, understanding the role of Kappa Kappa Psi, being aware of the membership education process and the ritual, and resources available to Sponsors and Directors. We were pleased with how this turned out and are excited about how this could be helpful for new Sponsors and Directors of Bands.

Create and implement a communication plan for how often the national leadership should communicate with Directors/Sponsors, detailing the method of communication and content that should be included. This could be a newsletter or video format.

In our discussions about this, we determined that a communication plan is outlined in the opening paragraph on the Sponsor/Director webpage. We encourage people to read the information on that page, as well as in the FAQ and then email us should there be any additional questions. That is the route that all of the committee members would take, and it makes sense that other professionals would do the same.

Determine ways that Kappa Kappa Psi can continue to support Directors and Chapter Sponsors in their work with college bands, including exploring possible events the fraternity should be represented at, the promulgation of the work of college bands, or other ideas.

During the District Convention season, the Task Force presented at almost every Convention across the country. We provided ideas and resources to many students, which we hope they will utilize on their campuses. Furthermore, we presented a session at the recent 2023 CBDNA Athletic Band Symposium, sharing our resources with several collegiate educators. We also answered questions and assisted those directors who had specific questions and needs on their campuses.

• Prepare a report for each quarter of the committee's work to be shared with the National Council and posted on the National Website.

This document serves as a successful accomplishment of this charge.

Looking ahead to the 2023-25 Biennium, we give the following charges to the Sponsor/Director Task Force:

- 1. Provide support to Directors of Bands/Chapter sponsors by answering questions via the sponsorsdirectors@kkpsi. org email in a timely manner (within 48 hours).
- 2. Continue to develop resources for the Director of Bands/ Chapter Sponsors. The majority of this includes updating the FAQ section of the website and adding topics as new issues are made aware to the Task Force.
- 3. Determine ways that Kappa Kappa Psi can continue to support Directors and Chapter Sponsors in their work

with college bands, including developing what the standard should be in how the Task Force is represented at various events throughout the country.

4. Prepare a report for each quarter of the Task Forces' work to be shared with the National Council and posted on the National Website.

In addition, we have some charges for the National Council as well:

- Begin discussions that would promote this Task Force to becoming recognized as a full-standing committee. We have learned over the last two years that this group is necessary for the advancement of our organization and is providing a vital resource for students, Sponsors & Directors.
- 2. Find a way to increase funding for the committee so that there is an opportunity to connect with more people in this capacity across the country.

# APPENDIX 17 – REPORT OF THE DEIA Committee

To the Headquarters Staff, Board of Trustees, National Council,

Present and Past National Officers, Brothers, and Friends of Kappa Kappa Psi, we greet you on behalf of your DEIA committee. For the 2021-2023 Biennium the National Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Accessibility Committee was charged with the following:

- Ask tough questions and have tough conversations about what Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Advocacy issues
   Kappa Kappa Psi is currently facing and provide feedback and input to the National Council that can be utilized in the fraternity's national strategic plan and/or given to other committees to review and implement.
- o Complete all phases of the PFA DEIA Initiative
- o Review documents or programs as directed by the National President, and provide feedback through the lens of DEIA regarding bias or other viewpoints.
- o Develop workshops the DEIA committee can present both virtually and at district and national conventions.
- o Work with the Curriculum committee to add an "Our Diversity Matters" lesson to the Road to Wisdom that highlights both our history and growth as an organization over time, as well as the current variety of chapters and brothers throughout the nation.
- o Create a DEIA curriculum and/or training that the national fraternity can implement with both the national leadership and our active members each year as part of required training.
- o Compile DEIA resources that can be posted on the national website for chapters to utilize and access.
- Work with the National Communications team to celebrate our diversity and provide input on social media programming and initiatives.
- o Work with the National Council to hold listening sessions to hear and share concerns of active membership.

To better accomplish the task of executing on the charges for the biennium we divided the charges into smaller subcommittees. The subcommittees were Document Review & Workshop Subcommittee; Curriculum and Resources Subcommittee; and the DEIA Communications Subcommittee.

While the concept of DEIA has gained significant attention and traction in recent years, it has roots in various historical movements and initiatives. Many of those historic events include...

**Civil Rights Movement:** The Civil Rights Movement in the United States during the 1950s and 1960s played a pivotal role in advocating for equal rights and opportunities for marginalized communities, particularly African Americans. The movement aimed to combat racial segregation, discrimination, and promote social justice.

**Women's Rights Movement:** The Women's Rights Movement emerged in the 19th and 20th centuries, advocating for gender equality and women's suffrage. The movement fought for equal rights in areas such as employment, education, and political participation.

Disability Rights Movement: **The Disability Rights Movement** gained momentum in the 1960s and 1970s, inspired by the Civil Rights Movement. Activists called for equal treatment, accessibility, and an end to discrimination against individuals with disabilities. This movement led to the passage of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) in 1990 in the United States.

**LGBTQ+ Rights Movement:** The LGBTQ+ Rights Movement has fought for the rights and recognition of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer individuals. It has aimed to combat discrimination, secure legal protections, and promote inclusivity and acceptance.

**Inclusive Education and Accessibility:** Efforts to promote inclusive education and accessibility for individuals with disabilities have been ongoing for decades. Legislation like the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) in the United States and the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD) have played significant roles in ensuring equal access to education and accommodations.

**Social Justice Movements:** Various social justice movements, such as the Black Lives Matter movement, have highlighted systemic racism, police brutality, and inequalities faced by marginalized communities. These movements have emphasized the need for diversity, equity, and inclusion in all aspects of society.

Although the DEIA Taskforce was formed in the 2019-2021 Biennium and continued as a full committee in this Biennium, Kappa Kappa Psi has been doing the work to aspire to live up to our values. From the first HBCUs chartered in 1957 to the first woman initiated in 1977, Kappa Kappa Psi has been incorporating Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Accessibility into our national fabric. We still have work to do.

The DEIA Committee's outline for the "Our Diversity Matters" lesson focuses on defining major issues relating to DEIA, celebrating the fraternity's history of diversity, celebrating the fraternity's DEIA successes, and recognizing that although the fraternity still has a long way to go we have already made significant progress. Membership Candidates and brothers will learn how diversity strengthens relationships between brothers, builds stronger chapters, and allows the fraternity to have a greater impact in our bands and communities. Additionally, the subcommittee has created a pronouns Do's and Don'ts aid to assist brothers with the use of pronouns. We found as a committee that the use of pronouns is not widely understood nor discussed. This resource should assist brothers with understanding the "how" and "why" regarding the use of pronouns.

The committee was able to utilize the District Convention/ National Council Town Halls to solicit and provide feedback on chapter and district challenges with DEIA. We were also able to host a virtual DEIA town hall to provide helpful information on DEIA to the brotherhood.

The National DEIA Committee endeavored to establish a sound

foundation for the fraternity for the bienniums to come. The right Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., reminded us in his speech "Remaining Awake Through a Great Revolution." speech given at the National Cathedral in Washington, DC that "the arc of the moral universe is long, but it bends toward justice." Change takes time, but it does happen.

Our Committee Charges the next DEIA Committee and National Council to do the following:

- Find more ways to promote member outreach and further understand the ways that we can improve the impact of our work on an individual/chapter/district level.
- Be more proactive in National event safety, security and equity protocol through policy.
- Make efforts to reach out to other organizations that are more skilled in DEI efforts to help guide our goals, practices, and procedures (i.e. the Human Rights Campaign etc.)
- Continue to have discussions with active members on their experiences and expectations when it comes to diversity. Perhaps working with VPSA on some programs and workshops to accomplish this.
- Make the "Our Diversity Matters" chapter in the road to wisdom a core part of the Road to Wisdom curriculum.

HUGE Thanks to all the members of the committee. This work is not easy, thank you all for being present, emotionally available and even vulnerable at times. We learned so much from our work together.

Thank you to Jessica for having faith and confidence in this committee. Your speech as president elect served as the cornerstone of our work this biennium.

# APPENDIX 18 - REPORT OF THE AD HOC Committee on Strategic Planning

Brothers of Kappa Kappa Psi,

The 2023 Strategic Planning Committee was charged with the following:

- 1. Review the proposed strategic plan and offer comments, suggestions, and ideas to the plan.
- 2. Review the new mission statement of Kappa Kappa Psi.

During our first meeting, the Strategic Planning Committee went over the goals of the committee and how our work directly shapes the future of the Fraternity. The purpose of our work is to review the strategic plan and provide direct student feedback for our National Leadership Team to consider, coming up with specific recommendations, questions, and items to consider when finalizing the plan. Though the committee is not presenting anything to be voted on, the work in which we did is still crucial for the continuity of our organization, focusing on the health of the Fraternity within a five-year timeline.

Upon review of the Strategic Plan, the committee came up with a two-page document containing recommendations for all five priorities listed in the Strategic Plan. The priorities of the Strategic Plan are as follows:

- 1. Leadership
- 2. Musicianship
- 3. Service
- 4. Brotherhood
- 5. Fraternity

Underneath each priority were a set of objectives, with a subset of strategies in order to obtain or execute the objectives. The committee successfully identified recommendations for every priority and its objectives and strategies. [Strategic Plan - Specific Recommendations] The overall theme of the committee's recommendations revolved around clarity and tangible implementations for our programs. The committee did a fantastic job in reading every single strategy and conversing over how it affects our organization, and the membership within.

In addition to the Strategic Plan, the committee also reviewed the new mission statement for the Fraternity and purpose behind doing so. The new mission statement is as follows:

Kappa Kappa Psi is a diverse fraternity dedicated to advancing college and university bands for the benefit of its members and society through:

## Meaningful musical experiences and enrichment

Transformational leadership development

Purposeful service to bands and support to band members

## Lifelong fellowship and community

The purpose of changing our mission statement is to reflect the current direction in which our Fraternity is moving, to be more inclusive and forward-thinking on a societal level. The new mission statement removes outdated language such as co-educational, recognizing that there are more than two genders. It also acknowledges the diversity of our Fraternity, and speaks to ALL four pillars with the addition of the final clause.

The committee charges are as follows:

# The 2023 Strategic Planning Committee charges the 2023-

# 2025 National Council with the following:

- 1. Explore accessibility within National Convention, such as virtual means of attending workshops, videos of speeches given, or the workshop cafeteria being provided to all membership.
- 1. This will allow Brothers who financially or physically can't attend NatCon to still reap the benefits of the workshops from a comfortable setting

# The committee charges the 2023-2025 National President with the following:

- 1. Provide new resources that give a broad overview of what the National Council and Board of Trustees do in their positions, such as a shadowing program or utilization of our website.
- 1. There is a lack of understanding for many Active brothers on what the roles of the National Council and Board of Trustees are - this would be educational for members to understand the difference and know how the positions work

## The committee charges the 2023-2025 Vice President for Programs with the following:

- 1. Look into the creation of a service project survey and pinpointing what service projects have been beneficial for chapters across the country.
  - b. With the possibility of surveying chapters and seeing what service projects have been successful, this will provide direct resources for chapters struggling to do service, and tangible options for places to start
- 2. Determine a budget for the Founder's Circle in regard to its infrastructure, specifically regarding OPUS integration or website development.
  - As it currently stands, the Founder's Circle is only incentivized to individuals; the committee recommended a chapter incentive, such as online modules or something similar to keep track of this progress
- 3. Explore a marketing and promotion strategy for the NIB, specifically creating dialogue between the Conductor, Director, and necessary levels of the National Leadership Team.
  - 1. Simply put, this will help promote the NIB and help utilize it in more ways than one performance
- 4. Assess the feasibility of creating a Month of Service, Month of Leadership, and Month of Brotherhood in addition to Month of Musicianship, such as what that timeline would look like.
  - In order to be equitable among all districts, this initiative should look into the workload and amount of time allotted depending on district convention times, and other programming
- 5. Consider the creation of a Community Service Award, to be given at National Convention to a top chapter in

regards to service.

1. This is a way to push chapters to do more service and be recognized for their dedication through a national award given at NatCon

#### The committee charges the 2023-2025 Alumni Association Board of Directors with the following:

- 1. Create and publish more tangible resources directly pertaining to Active members about to go into Alumni status.
  - 1. This will directly target those active members who are close to graduating, in order to pull more members into the Alumni Association
- 2. Provide specific objectives to alumni for ways they can stay involved and develop their leadership skills after graduation.
  - 1. Having more specific items for alumni to digest could help with retention in the Alumni Association, and participation as a whole

### The committee charges the 2025 Strategic Planning Committee with the following:

- 1. Be an active participant, and strive to work collaboratively with your other committee members.
  - 1. This work is pertinent to the future of Kappa Kappa Psi and requires various student perspectives in order to fully represent our organization and student needs
- 2. Utilize at least one or two virtual meetings before Convention starts.
  - 1. The Strategic Plan can be extensive, so preconvention work may be necessary to alleviate the workload and not use as much meeting time during convention

## Brothers of Kappa Kappa Psi,

The 2023 National Musicianship Committee met to discuss the new arrangement of the Fraternity song, as well as other music-based initiatives we would like to see in the following biennium. Much thought, deliberation, and debate went into the business we discussed, and none of it could have been done without the awe-inspiring work of a superb group of musicians.

The 2023 Musicianship Committee was charged by the National President and the 2021 Ritual and Regalia - Sub Committee on the Fraternity song with the following:

1. Review the proposed arrangement of the Fraternity Song, which was created as charged by the 2021 Ritual and Regalia Committee, and recommend/decline adoption of this arrangement.

- 2. Review and discuss charges 2 4 from the 2021 Ritual and Regalia sub committee on the Fraternity Song.
- 3. Draft ideas on how to revitalize and sing the Fraternity Song in the national fraternity.
- 4. Arranging, or finding someone to help arrange, the Fraternity Song, to the following specifications:
  - 1. Written for all voices, S/A/T/B
  - 2. Written in a range that is more easily sung by novice singers
  - 3. Limited part-writing so it is easier to sing
  - 4. Can be sung with older versions of the Fraternity Song
  - 5. Consider adopting a sheet music format mimicking that of the Fraternity Hymn
  - 6. Consider the addition of optional piano accompaniment
  - 7. Consider creation of a flex-band arrangement
  - 8. Create rehearsal, performance, and promotional materials to encourage chapters to rediscover their connection with the Fraternity Song
  - 9. Present their work to the the assembled brotherhood at the 2023 National Convention

When the committee met, our conversations largely revolved around slight changes to the proposed arrangement of the fraternity song until we became satisfied with the final product. Our conversation topics largely revolved around ensuring equitability between vocally trained and vocally untrained chapters, as well as transitioning from a TTBB arrangement to an SATB arrangement. We unanimously voted to recommend the approval of this song at the 2023 National Convention in order for chapters to begin using it throughout the biennium. We then discussed how to ensure chapters had the resources necessary to learn this new arrangement, regardless of vocal capabilities. Our conversations then shifted to new musical projects, such as a new national joint song/hymn and an idea for a competition to be held to find a worthy student or alumni composer for such a project. Though our ideas may be bold, we know the fraternity is ready to become more musically active on the national level.

# The 2023 Musicianship Committee charges the National Council with the following:

- Create a virtual-choir-like project of the new arrangement of the Fraternity Song, culminating in a country-wide video of different districts singing the Fraternity Song to be posted on the Kappa Kappa Psi Youtube Channel.
- 2. Write a preface for the Fraternity Song regarding the history of the song.
- 3. Create additional materials for the Fraternity Song

performances, including but not limited to optional piano accompaniment and a flex-band arrangement. These would help different sizes of chapters to program this piece in different settings within their chapter.

- 4. Record sectional workshop videos for the Fraternity Hymn and the Fraternity Song and post them to the Kappa Kappa Psi Youtube Channel and National Website. This will help the active membership to know how best to teach fraternity music to one's own chapter.
- 5. Hold a "Joint Musical Endeavor" competition within the next biennium. The purpose of this competition would be to charge students/alumni to compose a new joint hymn/song in the next biennium to be voted upon at the 2025 National Convention.

#### The 2023 Musicianship Committee charges the following Miscellaneous Committees with the following:

- For the Curriculum Committee: update the Road to Wisdom with the new Fraternity Song arrangement and rehearsal materials, as well a link in the Our Musicianship Matters lesson to the National Website and/or Youtube channel. The committee also recommends implementation of education regarding appropriate times/places to perform different fraternity music.
- 2. For the Board of Trustees: ensure the fraternity music and its arrangements are properly copyrighted.
- 3. For the Communications Committee: create social media posts with submissions from each district singing different lines of Fraternity Song during the National Month of Musicianship. Also, ensure that the proper materials for learning the Fraternity Song and Fraternity Hymn are well advertised on Social Media and made more visible/accessible on the National Website.
- 4. For the Chapter Operations Committee: craft a music chair handbook to assist chapter music chairs with education and strategies for learning fraternity music.
- 5. For District Presidents: encourage individual chapters within districts to begin learning the new arrangement of the Fraternity Song.
- 6. For the Vice President for Professional Relations: create informative programs for graduating seniors going into graduate school for music to assist their transition and ensure their continued musical success.

I would like to thank our advisors, Tony and Denali, for their pivotal help and expertise within the musical world. Our committee will forever be grateful for your passion and kindness. I would also like to thank every member of the musicianship committee. Your input and ideas are the lynch-pin that will help this fraternity crescendo to a brand new dynamic. Your value to this committee has been monumental, and I cannot thank you enough.

And to the active brothers: please continue to keep a fiery musical fervor within your chapters and within your hearts.

Though we may look to it as one of our most crucial principles, oftentimes, we get so distracted by chapter policies and being effective and efficient that our music gets sidelined for things that are necessary to keep our chapters afloat, like fundraisers and recruitment events. # APPENDIX 20 - REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON JURISDICTION

## Brothers of Kappa Kappa Psi,

The 2023 Jurisdiction Committee was given the following charges from the National President, Jessica Lee:

- 1. Review the submitted recommendations for changes to the National Constitution.
- 2. Review any recommended changes to the National Constitution from other committees at the 2023 National Convention as they are submitted to you.
- 3. Review the National Constitution for any needed adjustments discovered by this committee.

For the first charge, the committee examined every proposed change to the National Constitution that was submitted to us through the National Convention website. We received multiple proposals for similar topics, and chose to discuss those collectively instead of individually.

Of the proposals that the committee discussed, these are the ones we do not recommend action on at this time:

• Giving Life Members a vote for the Board of Trustees

• Creating a new status to replace membership advisement

• Changing the process of how Conditional Status is granted

Of the proposals that the committee discussed, the ones that we do recommend the Fraternity adopt are:

- The amendment of the language for the Nominations Committee in 3.707 by removing the requirement for an inperson meeting for the National Nominations Committee.
- The amendment of the language in Vice President for Professional Relations selection in 3.707 to reflect the current practice that the National Vice President for

Professional Relations is appointed by the National President, not the National Council.

- The removal of the language of Membership Advisement Status from the National Constitution in 6.106 as the status is not being used by the National Council.
- The removal of the language in 4.105, that the National Intercollegiate Band cannot practice during regular business meetings of the fraternity, as it does not reflect current practice.
- The addition and amendment of the language of National Council authority for individual membership status in 6.526 to clarify the authority of the National Council in the area of disciplinary action, and the addition of language to create a procedure for membership renouncement for extraordinary circumstances that create moral, ethical, or religious needs to terminate affiliation.
- Amending language in 2.102, 3.102, & 3.210 to remove the Alumni Association Board of Directors Chairperson from the National Council as an ex officio, non-voting member and move to the Board of Trustees as an ex officio, non-voting member.
- The addition of the language to codify current practice related to inactive reinstatement.

For the second charge from the National President, the committee did not receive any recommended constitution changes from other Committees at convention.

For the final charge from the National President, we reviewed the National Constitution and found an error in section 5.104 of the constitution.

Our 2023 Jurisdiction committee charges the following:

- 1. The Jurisdiction Committee recommends sending the Life Member Vote for Board of Trustees proposal back to the Alumni Association Board of Directors, Board of Trustees, and National Council and charges them to address concerns related to implementation and logistics, legal liability and governance, parliamentary procedure, and equal representation
- 2. The Jurisdiction Committee charges the National Council to explore programming and tools that can support chapters with lower membership numbers.
- 3. The Jurisdiction Committee charges the National Council to investigate and explore how Conditional Status is voted on and utilized around the country because not all chapters use the same process for granting this status.

I would now like to read the names of all members of the 2023 National Jurisdiction Committee so they can stand and be recognized.

## APPENDIX 21 – PROPOSALS THE REMOVE/AMEND SIMPLE LANGUAGE FROM CONSTITUTION

Author: Crosbee Lisser, Eta, Chair Presented: July 14, 2023

Remove 6.106 - Membership Advisement - and renumber accordingly.

6.106 Membership Advisement. Every chapter must have a membership size sufficient to properly serve the band program, perform Ritual and Ceremonies, and represent the band program. Chapters with a membership that falls below seven (7) active or associate members for more than one (1) academic year will be placed on membership advisement to address membership recruitment, education, and retention.

#### Rationale

The National Council has tools to monitor and reach out to Chapters with lower sizes without the need for a specific status. This status has not been applied during the 2021-23 biennium and the committee is charging the National Council to explore a replacement status or programming.

#### Remove 4.105 - NIB rehearsal scheduling

4.105 No activity of the National Intercollegiate Band shall be scheduled so as to conflict with the regular business meetings of the Fraternity.

#### Rationale

The National Chapters will always have both their Joint and Separate Opening sessions during the final NIB rehearsal slot. Forcing the band to not rehearse that afternoon or moving the convention's opening to accommodate is unreasonable. If a musician in NIB is sitting as delegate, an alternate can sit for the Opening Separate and can be put in for the next seating.

#### Amend 5.104 to refer to section 1.116, not 1.118.

5.104 Each District having four (4) or more chapters shall have its own constitution, which must be reviewed and approved by the National Executive Director and the National Council prior to its taking effect. The district constitution shall in no way conflict with or receive priority over this constitution except as provided in Section 1.116.

#### Rationale

This correction was overlooked following previous amendment and adjustment to the constitution. The previous section 1.118 is now section 1.116

#### Amend 3.707 - Requirement for in-person Nominations Committee meeting and VPPR Selection

The National President, with the approval of the National Council, shall appoint a Committee on Nominations by October 15th of the year prior to National Convention. The membership of the *Committee shall be composed of the following representatives* of the fraternity: one member of the Board of Trustees whose term of office is not expiring in the current biennium; up to 4 district officers; up to 3 district governors; up to 2 alumni from a list of recommendations by the Kappa Kappa Psi Alumni Association Board of Directors; up to 3 members of the Fraternity with exemplary knowledge, experience and service to the Fraternity with at least 4 active or associate members as part of the committee. The National President shall be an ex officio member of the committee. The committee membership should be representative of the fraternity in geography and diversity. The President shall name one member of the Committee to serve as Chairperson. The Committee is charged to investigate and evaluate candidates for the National Council and the National Board of Trustees, except the Vice President for Professional Relations. The Committee will review all potential candidates

who have submitted applications by January 15 of the convention year. The Committee will ensure that all candidates are constitutionally eligible for office. The Committee, working with National Headquarters staff, shall prepare an election newsletter to be distributed at district conventions and mailed to all chapters by April 15. The newsletter shall provide a general introduction of all eligible potential candidates. The Nominations

Committee may conduct its business, including the interviewing of candidates, using technological means but shall meet in person prior to deciding the slate. At least 30 days prior to the start of National Convention, the Committee shall announce and

publish a recommended slate – one (1) candidate for each office of the National Council and the Board of Trustees, except for the National President, which will be filled by succession by the Vice President for Membership and Expansion with a simple majority

vote, and the Vice President for Professional Relations which is appointed by the National Council President. The announcement and publication of the slate should be accompanied by a report briefly explaining the basis for the slating decisions. This report should also be distributed at the National Convention. Candidates slated by the Committee on Nominations shall automatically be placed in nomination during the election process. Other nominations may be made from the floor from those eligible candidates who timely submitted nominations material to the Committee.

#### Rationale

This proposal eliminates the verbiage "but shall meet in person prior to deciding the slate". This verbiage could potentially be limiting in circumstances where, either financially or logistically, it is not advisable or not necessary for the Nominations Committee to meet in person. Eliminating this language does not bar the Nominations Committee from meeting in person, but simply allows for other meeting options if the Committee sees fit.

The current Constitution specifies in 3.209 that the VPPR is appointed by the National President. The current verbiage in 3.707 states "the Vice President for Professional Relations which is appointed by the National Council". This is a contradiction that we would need to remedy, which I have done by clarifying here that this appointment is done by the National President.

#### Proposal for Added Language for National Council Authority and Membership Renouncement:

Add proposed language for new section 6.526, 6.527, and 6.528 - Clarifying the authority of the National Council regarding disciplinary status and adding a procedure for Membership Renouncement

6.526 In accordance with 1.109, the National Council shall have the authority to take disciplinary action against any district, chapter, or member found to be in violation of policy.

6.527 Membership status in Kappa Kappa Psi may not be terminated by the member through resignation. However, as stated in 6.521, 6.522, 6.525, and 6.526, a member may be suspended or expelled for due cause by the chapter of their affiliation or the National Council. 6.528 In the event an Alumni, Life, or Inactive member of the Fraternity has a moral, ethical, or religious need to disassociate from the Fraternity, they may request of the National Council to renounce their membership status. This request will be granted following a favorable vote of seventy-five (75) percent of the National Council.

#### Rationale

The first two sections of this proposal were submitted on advice of legal counsel by the National Council and reflect current practice.

On membership renouncement, members cannot resign their membership, but extraordinary circumstances do arise that create moral, ethical, or religious needs to terminate affiliation. These circumstances should not be subject to punitive action by the National Council. Terminating affiliation with the fraternity can be done using this tool/procedure proposed instead of expulsion.

# Proposal for Inactive Reinstatement from National Headquarters:

Add proposed language for new section 6.515 codifying current practice for Alumni Reinstatement for Inactive Members and renumber subsequent sections of section 6.5

6.515 Inactive members who wish to seek privileges of membership as an alumni member must request, in writing, alumni reinstatement. Upon review of the written request, the inactive member must receive approval from the chapter President, Sponsor, and Director of Bands and shall satisfy all financial obligations to the Fraternity in order to be granted privileges of membership. In the case where a chapter is not active, the inactive member must receive approval from the National Council and shall satisfy all financial obligations to the Fraternity in order to be granted privileges of membership.

#### Rationale

*Reflects current practice of National Council and National Headquarters.* 

#### Proposal to move AABOD Chair to Board of Trustees:

Amend sections 2.102, 3.102, 3.210 removing AABOD Chair as an ex officio, non-voting member of the National Council and adding to the Board of Trustees as an ex officio, non-voting member.

2.102. The Corporation shall be represented in all matters by a Board of Trustees comprised of six (6) voting members; five (5) members at large, and the Immediate Past National President. The current National President and the current Chairperson of the Alumni Association Board of Directors are ex officio, non-voting, members of the Board of Trustees.

3.102 The administrative body of the Fraternity between regularly called conventions shall be the National Council. The National Council consists of all National Officers, the Immediate Past National President (ex officio, non-voting), and the Chairperson, Board of Trustees (ex officio, non-voting), and shall be absolute in power between conventions except as noted in Section 3.103. 3.210 The Chairperson of the Kappa Kappa Psi Alumni Association Board of Directors (AABOD) shall be selected by the AABOD and confirmed by a majority vote of the Board of Trustees. The AABOD Chairperson shall serve a term of two (2) years, and shall be an ex officio, non-voting member of the Board of Trustees.

#### Rationale

The role of the AABOD primarily serves alumni, and has as one responsibility the financial underpinnings of the future of the Alumni Association. The work of the AABOD aligns more closely with the work of the Board, which is the oversight component of the Fraternity. The AABOD's work has matured and grown over the past decade to the point that they will serve as tremendous partners in regular work of the Board. Likewise, their work is not in alignment with work of the Council, which is focused on the dayto-day operations and support for students and active chapters.

#### Hi Y'all,

The 2023 Ways and Means Committee was charged with the following:

#### By the National President are as follows:

- 1. Review the 2021 Ways and Means Committee Report and the following charges from that report.
- 2. Review the Quick-Pay App and Banking Guidelines Document that was prepared by the 2021 Ways and Means Committee and check for any additions or revisions.
- 3. Update the Fundraising Ideas Document for any additions or revisions.

4. Review the proposed budget for the 2021-2023 biennium.

5. Discuss the current financial status of the fraternity and provide any ideas or recommendations for alternative funding sources.

#### By the 2021 Ways and Means committee are as follows:

- 1. Review the 2021 Ways and Means Committee Report.
- 2. Review the proposed budget for the 2023-2025 biennium.
- 3. Review the Quick-Pay App and Banking Guidelines Document that was prepared by the 2021 Ways and Means Committee and check for any additions or revisions.
- 4. Update the Fundraising Ideas Document for any additions or revisions.
- 5. Review the automatic dues increase of \$5.00 and discuss

the need for the policy.

I would like to begin this report with, the fraternity is in good financial standing. We are not in any risk of closure or dire financial strain. I believe this report should be as concise and transparent as possible.

We began our committee discussion on July 12th, 2023 during the first committee/workshop block of the 2023 National Convention. The first item of business was reading through the 2021 National Convention Ways and Means Committee Report. Reading this report was the starting point for our committee and gave us a sense of direction.

We began our discussions over the Fundraising Ideas Document and possible needed revisions. We recommend revision of language to ensure that there is minimal confusion and clarity on possible fundraising general projects.

Moving to reviewing the Quick-Pay App and Banking Guidelines Document, we found this document to be in good standing.

The committee then began to unpack the National Budget, which our spending is not fully known since it covers through December 2022. The budget itself is missing a quarter of the previous biennium's spending. This spending is estimated by multiplying the actual spendage by 1.25 to give an idea of what numbers might look like.

After heavy consideration, the committee has decided to reallocate how much Districts get from membership dues. Currently, it was \$4 going to the district's total, but we are increasing this to \$5. We will follow a similar breakdown of \$4 going directly to the district and \$1 going into the pool that districts split evenly. This will result in more financial resources being provided directly to our districts and to our active members.

In this budget, it included a proposed membership dues increase. We walked through several different versions of the dues increase to have a full scope of what could possibly be changing within our fraternity.

The first proposal was a dues increase of \$5 as set by the precedent of the 2015 Ways and Means Committee and then the National Chapter. This \$5 increase would result in current programming being cut from our repertoire as the \$5 would barely cover the cost of rising insurance prices.

Possible programming that could be facing budget cuts include, but are not limited to; scholarships, decrease in leadership development, increase in convention costs, and the possibility of not being able to finance the CFR program for the entire biennium.

The next proposal was a dues increase of \$10. This increase would result in continuation of the current programming as is. With an exception of the Chapter Field Representative program, as this program would take a pause.

The final proposal was a dues increase of \$15. This increase would ensure the retention of our current programming including Chapter Field Representatives.

The majority of our committee time was spent discussing the proposed 2023-2025 biennium budget. There is an absolute necessity for a minimum increase of \$5. This increase would only cover the projected rising costs of Risk Management Insurance. Our insurance provider, Holmes Murphy,, is projecting a 15% insurance price increase which would amount to roughly \$4 per each member's dues.

We are proposing two versions of the budget to be decided by the delegation. The first version of the budget would be with the \$10 increase. This increase to \$10 would allow for our organization to healthily stay in-line with rising inflation costs. As stated before, this proposal would allow our current programs to run as usual. The second version of the budget would be with the \$15 increase. Also stated previously, this increase would allow current programs to run as usual and give additional funds to the Chapter Field Representative program.

#### The committee charges the following:

The 2023 Ways and Means Committee charges the National Council with the following:

1. Evaluate the possibility of the implementation of a Membership Dues Payment Plan.

# The 2023 Ways and Means Committee charges the National Headquarters with the following:

- 1. Create and publish a breakdown of the expenditure of membership dues.
- 2. Ensure publication of the Fundraising Ideas Document and Quick-Pay App and Banking Guidelines Document are of easy access to the membership.

#### The committee charges the 2025 Ways and Means Committee with the following:

- 1. Begin Committee work a minimum of two weeks before the beginning of National Convention 2025.
- 2. Review the 2023 Ways and Means Committee Report.
- 3. Review the proposed budget for the 2025-2027 biennium.
- 4. Review the Quick-Pay App and Banking Guidelines Document that was prepared by the Ways and Means Committee and check for any additions or revisions.with an emphasis on additional cyber security measures
- 5. Update the Fundraising Ideas Document for any additions or revisions.
- 6. Review the automatic dues increase of \$5.00 and discuss the need for the policy.

For recommendations, the committee would like to advise the National Council and National Headquarters to ensure transparency when discussing budget matters. Members of the committee have expressed frustration with the poor timeliness of receiving budget materials. According to Section 3.403 in the National Constitution, "A one hundred twenty days (120) day written notice prior to the dates of all regular conventions [...] will include [...] all available and pertinent information concerning the issues to be considered at the convention of the National Chapter".

We received no indication prior to National Convention that we would be discussing the larger programs being affected such as the Chapter Field Representative program. We understand that this was an unusual process of events due to staff changes. We want to express there are no hard feelings.

I would like to thank the members of the Ways and Means Committee for all of the hard work. I greatly appreciate all of your perseverance and patience throughout this process. I would like to give a special thank you to Rose Rush. She graciously took meeting minutes to aid the process of the 2023 Ways and Means Committee. A big shout out to Danny George and Jack Lee - our "seasoned adults" - that were in the room! We greatly appreciate all of your guidance and spice. I am grateful for this opportunity to be able to serve our fraternity in this capacity.

The committee met on Wednesday and Thursday to observe the chapters 5-7 minute presentations on why they should receive the Williams Scroggs Founders Trophy, the highest honor a chapter can receive. The presenters were tasked with answering a series of questions which included topics on emerging through the Covid-19 pandemic, addressing the fraternity pillars, addressing Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Advocacy, and advice to offer other chapters about strength and resilience during times of adversity. All 18 presentations were very well done and they truly showcased why they are finalists for this award. I was honored to be given the opportunity to chair this committee as a member of the most recent winning chapter. I do appreciate being given the opportunity to hear what great work so many chapters have done over the past biennium and I hope they serve as an example for all of us.

In terms of improvements to the process, the Committee felt that expanding the amount of time for presentations from 5-7 minutes to 6-8 minutes may be worthwhile, as many Chapters didn't have time to finish presenting all of their work for the biennium. As the Committee did hear a virtual, recorded presentation, the Committee did briefly discuss whether or not Chapters should be required to attend National Conventionn to present in person in order to present for The Founders' Trophy. However, we decided against making that as a recommendation, because it would create potential inequities in who gets to present for Founders' Trophy, as there are a variety of reasons why a Chapter may not be able to attend National Convention. Instead, we recommend that more clear guidelines for virtual or recorded presentation should be so that Chapters that need to take advantage of this deliver a terrific presentation that stays within clear guidelines.

# The 2023 Chapter Leadership Committee charges the Vice President of Programs with the following:

- 1. Ensure that each chapter follows the criteria given by the Vice President of Programs and the Chapter Leadership Committee
- 2. Create the presentation questions based on the four pillars and DEIA and steer away from Covid-19 topics
- 3. When creating the written submission topic question, make sure the ties to the Convention theme are clear and allow Chapters to showcase the totality of what they have accomplished over the biennium.
- 4. Create and distribute guidelines for virtual or recorded presentations for Chapter Leadership Finalists.

- 1. Review the submitted materials for the William A. Scroggs Founders' Trophy
- 2. Select the recipient for the William A. Scroggs Founders' trophy

# APPENDIX 25 – REPORT OF THE NATIONAL PRESIDENT

Brothers:

In August of 2003, I walked into the band room at Lock Haven University of Pennsylvania for the very first time. As I walked into the room, a guy walked towards me wearing a Kappa Kappa Psi t-shirt, a Kappa Kappa Psi hat, and he was carrying a Kappa Kappa Psi bag - basically, a walking talking billboard for Kappa Kappa Psi. He came up to me with a smile on his face and said, "Hi, my name is Ed Savoy. We went to rival high schools! I am so glad you're here." And so began my journey with the fraternity.

Let me be clear - I am not the best musician. I'm a drummer, not even really a percussionist. I did band because I genuinely love music - it was my outlet from everything else in my life. And when the opportunity was presented to me to join Kappa Kappa Psi - there was something about this idea of family that spoke to me on the deepest level. I can honestly say that being initiated on November 22, 2003 fundamentally changed the course of my life.

Two years ago, as I was preparing to become National President at this pivotal rebuilding point in our history, my message to the delegation was simple: we must unite and ReCHARGE the Brotherhood. I had outlined specific goals and tasks that we would engage in as a National organization, to do 2 things: 1. Reignite a love for service to college bands and engagement in Kappa Kappa Psi in our Brothers and 2. Use the values found in the charge to center the brothers, activities, and initiatives of our organization on our beliefs.

Here is a summary of what we accomplished as a national fraternity this biennium.

# <u>OPUS</u>

When I was a student, I remember when our fraternity reports were all on paper - they had to be physically mailed to headquarters, the district governor, and the district president. Past National President Derrick Mills had a vision for a digital system for our paperwork and reporting and he was instrumental in bringing the OMRS to life nearly 15 years ago. With technology advances, we knew we could take the next step in our management system to provide a higher quality user experience for students. The creation and launch of OPUS as our Online Personnel User System will allow the fraternity to collect digital signatures, simplify forms, and disaggregate data collected in the system. Eventually, we will also be able to post courses in the system for students to access, such as the Inner Circle Ritual Education Program. I am excited for this upgrade and I am looking forward to helping support the launch this fall.

## National Committees

It was important to me this biennium to provide and expand opportunities for both active and alumni members to serve Kappa Kappa Psi and engage in the work in the fraternity. I launched an application that solicited information from Brothers to help appoint Governors, Committee Members, Petitioning Group Advisors, and Investigators.

In addition to the Curriculum Committee, the Ritual Performance and Education Committee, the Communications Team and the DEIA committee, the following additional committees were appointed this biennium: the Chapter Operations Task Force, Programs Committee, Sponsor/Director Task Force, Data & Assessment Committee, and Expansion Committee. These opportunities, as well as the Nominations Committee, totaled 350 Brothers who served Kappa Kappa Psi over the biennium in some capacity. Brothers, if you served on a National Committee this biennium, please stand so we can recognize your service to the fraternity.

Because of the service of these Brothers, we were able to accomplish the following goals:

- The Curriculum Committee, in consultation with the DEIA committee, created the Our Sisters Matter and Our Diversity Matters lessons to be added to the Road to Wisdom. They also created the Chapter VPM training, in consultation with the Chapter Operations Committee.
- The Data and Assessment Committee wrote and added a land acknowledgment for Stillwater Station and the Annex, which is posted on the website. Additionally, they created and launched the climate survey, which will help provide guidance for National Leadership about how we can best support our membership.
- The Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Advocacy Committee hosted a DEIA panel, and drafted the content for the Our Diversity Matters lesson of the Road to Wisdom. They also consulted on the joint statement that was released to Brothers and Sisters prior to National Convention. Additionally, the committee provided ideas on how to support our LGBTQIA Brothers during the National Convention, including the "I am my Brother's Keeper" pins and stickers that have been here at convention.
- The Sponsor and Director Task Force created a landing page for sponsors and directors on our website, which now houses resources such as the Best Practices in Chapter Support and Oversight for these individuals. They also met with folks at conferences and provided support via email and zoom calls to directors and sponsors.
- The Ritual Performance and Education Committee created an accessibility training and guidebook for Brothers to utilize to accommodate for the needs for any and all Brothers to access our ritual.
- The Expansion Committee created a rubric to review petitioning group applications, a survey for new chapters to complete, helped create resources for training petition

group advisors, and also created a list of institutions to target for possible expansion.

- The Chapter Operations Task Force created officer training for the following offices: Chapter President, Chapter Service Officer, Chapter Communicators, Chapter Treasurer, and Chapter Parliamentarian training sessions, which were unveiled at this convention.
- And at this Convention, through committee work, we have recommended the creation of a J. Lee Burke Student Achievement Award pin and adopted a new arrangement of the Fraternity Song.

#### **Increased Support for Chapters**

Coming out of the pandemic, I wanted to ensure that chapters and Brothers had access to people to help support them as we learned how to "chapter" again. Former Chapter Field Representative Nicole Brooks continued on at Headquarters as Chapter Support Coordinator, assisting chapters with paperwork, completing constitution reviews, providing workshops, and more. Additionally, three governors in each district were appointed to help provide more individuals to guide chapters and answer questions, as well as work with Brothers on returning back to the familiar tasks of in person chapter meetings, membership education, ritual service, and fundraising. It is my hope that this additional support, along with an in person CFR visit, has helped countless chapters get on their feet. We have worked hard to ensure each chapter gets a CFR visit - currently, 174 chapters have been visited in the last two years. By the end of the 2024 school year, all chapters will have received an in person visit.

#### Strategic Planning

Over the course of the last 2 years, various members of the National Leadership team have been engaged in a 6 year strategic planning process. Following the COVID 19 pandemic, I felt that it was critical that we assess our organization and create a foundational plan to help us move forward. Our work has resulted in the creation of a draft strategic plan, which was presented at this convention to an ad hoc committee to review and provide critical feedback from students. Additionally, we also updated our Mission Statement to better reflect the Brotherhood today.

#### Leadership Development

As one of the speakers, the Founders' Circle Leadership development Program is something that I believe will make both Brothers and Band members Better. This biennium, the Programs committee has worked to post The Founders' Circle Leadership Development Program on the National website. Additionally, every district convention this season had a Founder's Circle Keynote presentation, and this National Convention featured 5 Founders' Circle presentations. Moving forward, new speakers will be selected and trained and the resources will be updated. Incoming National President Co has asked me to lead this work next biennium as Immediate Past President, to continue to strengthen leadership development for both students and alumni.

#### <u>Tau Beta Sigma</u>

Our relationship with Tau Beta Sigma is an important one. We are two organizations that have similar ideals, but the one thing that we share unequivocally is our dedication to college and university bands. Kappa Kappa Psi is stronger and better because of our relationship with Tau Beta Sigma, and I am proud to be a Sister. Our partnership with Tau Beta Sigma is vital to the success of college bands across the country, and this biennium, we have worked with Tau Beta Sigma on several projects, including OPUS and the creation of a recognition certificate, which was used (as an example) to recognize bands that participate in Battle of the Bands or Allentown Collegiate Marching Band festival. I firmly believe that we are stronger together, and better because of our sisters.

#### **Transparency & Representation**

Two years ago, I stood before you and said "In my place of privilege, I must create the seats at the table." I did not want this to be a performative statement, but rather a commitment to be better than we were before. To that end, I did the following:

- When presented with candidates to fill the National Vice President for Student Affairs position, I advocated for TarShae to hold this position because he represents STUDENTS from HBCUs and that are LGBTQUIA - as a student. He is the first active member to hold this office.
- I appointed a diverse core of governors, from a variety of backgrounds, to work with our chapters.
- I ensured every national committee had representation from each district, as well as HBCU chapters, active members, alumni, and life members.
- I connected with Brothers who needed support by giving out my cell phone number and email, as well as hopping on a zoom call with Brothers when needed, including hosting an HBCU presidents call.
- I ensured every committee seated at this national convention had representation from each district, as well as HBCUs.
- We focused on creating accessibility for Brothers related to the ritual, as well as making accommodations available at conventions.
- We held panel discussions throughout the biennium related to HBCUs, Brothers of Color, including AAPI, women, DEIA, and
- The National Vice President for Programs for both Kappa Kappa Psi and Tau Beta Sigma worked to revamp the audition and selection process for the NIB, using a diverse pool of adjudicators. Intercollegiate Band
- In the last 4 years in roles as National VPCM and President, we have chartered or recharted 9 HBCU or Minority serving institutions: Miles College, Florida A&M University, Jackson State University, Hampton University, Livingstone College, Valdosta State University, Savannah State University, Florida Memorial University, and

#### Tennessee State University.

In addition to this work with chapters and Brothers, I also created transparency by posting quarterly committee reports on the national website as well as hosting monthly leadership team meetings. These meetings were regular meetings that included the National Council, Board of Trustees, Governors, AABOD directors, Headquarters Staff, and even from time to time, district officers. This work was important in ensuring that we were always moving forward as one, united team.

Brothers - let me again acknowledge - we don't always get it right. There have been moments in Kappa Kappa Psi history where we have gotten it wrong, and on behalf of the organization, I am sorry. I hope that the work we have done this biennium to elevate the voices of Black and Brown Brothers, of LGBTQUIA Brothers, of Brothers who attend HBCU institutions, and of our Brothers with disabilities. As the mother of a child with Autism and a child with dyslexia and ADHD, I am so proud of work in the area of accessibility. Brothers - Kappa Kappa Psi must be a place that people see themselves in, if we want to continue to attract new members. I am proud of tangible steps that we have taken, and I am excited to be a part of the steps we will continue to take next biennium.

#### Appreciation & Acknowledgements

First, I want to thank our National Headquarters staff. Steve, Lisa, Aaron, Nicole, TJ, Thomas, Kennedy and Jake - thank you for being the backbone of Kappa Kappa Psi. Our organization would not function without the hard work of all of you. I want to send out a special shoutout to Nicole Brooks, my ITB, who has been an incredible source of support for me over the last 4 years. Nikki Bricks, half of the time, when I need something - you have already read my mind and started working on it. Thank you for being someone I could depend on unequivocally. To the CFRs - Jake and Kennedy (AKA #6) - yall have done fantastic work on behalf of Kappa Kappa Psi and you have made the CFR position and chapters better because of your work. Lance - What I saw in us, I see in our District Presidents today. Thank you for your belief in me and in Kappa Kappa Psi. It has been an honor of a lifetime to be selected to serve.

Brothers -

I stand before you today grateful for the trust you have placed in me to serve as your next National President; mindful of all the love and hard work that each of you and so many others have poured into Kappa Kappa Psi; and humbled by our rich history and long JOURNEY as a National Fraternity for the past 103 years. Today, we gather, not to indicate the end of something and the start of something new. We are here to celebrate the continuation of our JOURNEY on The Road to Wisdom as Brothers of Kappa Kappa Psi. We celebrate our commitment to the promises that we've made, the purposes that we learned about, and the people and programs that we serve. We celebrate our connection with Brothers across time and distance through our Ritual and our traditions, but also our shared vision for the road ahead. We've gathered once again, to remind each other and to show the rest of society that, We, the brothers of Kappa Kappa Psi, believe that service to the college or university band program fosters responsibility, loyalty, and leadership; that a spirit of brotherhood is enhanced by

the participation in a band program; that music is a universal language and truly the greatest of the arts; and that through fraternal participation, each member will strive for the highest. Brothers, this is the AEA way. This is what we believe. This is who we are. And this is what we must translate into action to ensure that this JOURNEY, OUR JOURNEY...the one that we so lovingly call Kappa Kappa Psi, continues on for another 100 years.

The Kappa Kappa Psi JOURNEY, which started in 1919, was born by a shared passion for the collegiate band activity and the dream of one day having a unified Brotherhood that would instill the pillars of Musicianship, Leadership, and Service in our society. Our Founders envisioned a world that understood the invaluable benefits of being a band member and had greater respect and desire for band music. To put it simply, they wanted to share their love for music, band, and fellowship with the rest of the world, but in a unique and special way. In the AEA way. And I am proud to say that in 2023, 103 years later, thousands of Brothers have treaded on this shared pathway and that countless lives have been positively impacted by our work. Our JOURNEY, though, has not been an easy one and we have faced many daunting challenges along the way. We have traversed many peaks and valleys in our quest to carry on this legacy that was gifted to us. And we have made many errors along the way and have stumbled upon our path to strive for the highest. There has been a lot of pain and heartache throughout the years. From World War II to COVID-19, nearly crippling our organization, to the social justice reckoning of then and now, forcing Brothers to face hard truths that go beyond band and deeper than people may have been ready for. But the hardest part about all of this is that, on top of everything that is happening in the world, we see our own Brothers inflicting this sort of pain and hurt on each other. Time and time again, throughout my four years on the National Council, I have seen our members tear each other down over frustrations, chapters crumble into chaos over differences, and the Brotherhood fall into discord and shift away from our goal of creating harmony.

Brothers, when I think about the next two years...when I think about our future...our JOURNEY ahead, I am nervous and I am scared. I am scared for myself. For my health and my sanity. I am scared for all of you and your safety and well-being. I am scared for the existence of Kappa Kappa Psi and whether or not we will make it to our 200th year. There is a lot wrong with the world right now. People are being attacked for being different. Students are afraid to go to school. People are both figuratively and literally in hiding. People are struggling to get by. Hate is being spewed and divisions are being created. People are simply traumatized and tired because fear has a stranglehold on us every single day. Brothers, I will be honest with you all today: I think about quitting each and every day. I so badly want to give up and quit this so-called JOURNEY that I fell in love with as a student and that I made a commitment to be a part of because I am exhausted, I am scared, and I feel lost. As VPSA, I had people call up my place of work to tell my employers that I am a racist and that I should be fired. I had people commenting hateful things on social media whitewashing me, twisting my identity, and questioning my

values. And I would like to say something to those folx: thank you. Thank you for helping me reflect on my experiences and how it informs my decisions as a leader in this organization. Thank you for forcing me to reassess myself, my beliefs, and my actions. And thank you for pushing me to make a hard decision: rather than resigning, you motivated me to take that next step in my fraternal JOURNEY and solidified my KKWhy, my reason why I do what I do, which is to strive to be a support and guiding light for Brothers who are lost their way and who are or have given up on the Fraternity.

I recognize that there is still a lot of hurt and mistrust in the Brotherhood and there have been for years. It would be delusional to say that we will resolve our issues within the next two years. But I am hopeful that we will take steps in our healing journey as a Brotherhood and as individuals. At this convention, we were reminded time and time again that while the clouds of adversity often darken the pathway, when we work together, aligned in our mission and values, and clear in our goals, we are living out our Founders' Vision in the AEA Way. In our 103 years, there is so much to celebrate and be proud of. Right here right now, there is so much to be proud of. Take a moment to think about all the heart, work, and hours you have put in, multiply that by the hundreds of Brothers in this room and across the nation, and think about the impact you are having as an individual and as a Fraternity. On the other hand, if each of us adds to the chaos, multiply that by the thousands of Brothers, and think about how that not only hurts us as an organization but the college band movement as a whole. Brothers, you may not always remember this, but each of you holds a lot of power in this relationship and in this organization. Each of our actions, no matter how small, creates a ripple effect for the rest of the Fraternity. When we actively choose to violate our policies, work against our values, and hurt each other, Kappa Kappa Psi will cease to exist. The organization may still function, but we will have lost our way and started on a new journey. One that doesn't uplift college band programs and our pillars of Musicianship, Leadership, and Service. Remember, "History demonstrates that all great achievements have been the result of coordinated endeavor and that those who have arrived at success have marched there shoulder-to-shoulder with loyal comrades." Look around right now, hundreds of individuals came together from different corners of the country, in the face of adversity and conflict, to make this all happen. Our HQ team of 8 people came to Orlando early to set this up. Over 100 musicians came together to make the NIB concert possible. And hundreds of Brothers came together to learn, fellowship, and rekindle their passion for Kappa Kappa Psi. My point in all of this is, we can make some amazing shit happen. Sorry mom. And this is awesome and something to be proud of! We know this. But it is easy to do this when everything goes our way. But how do we as individuals act when things don't go our way and when things get hard. Do we talk behind each other's backs? Do we go straight to the national council to get our way? Do we threaten to sue the Fraternity to scare folx into submission? Do we trash the organization on social media but then turn around and wear our letters? These are powerful decisions that each of us has to make. I can't tell you

what to do, but I would like to invite you to work alongside me and the rest of the National Leadership Team, with your DOBs and Sponsors, and with each other to move us forward out of the shadows of fear and discord, and into the light of growth, Brotherhood, and Harmony.

Now, in my four years in National Leadership, I have heard a lot of feedback about a whole lot of things. There are Brothers out there who believe that they could do a better job, and I personally believe that this is true. Our Brotherhood is full of bright and talented people and I fully believe that there are Brothers who could do a better job. But the issue is that many of these folx have given up on the Fraternity or have been deeply hurt in their Fraternal journey. I would like to make a call for those folx to give Kappa Kappa Psi another chance. I invite these folx to continue their Kappa Kappa Psi journey. So to all those folx, I look forward to your application for the 2025 National Election. In the meantime, I invite you to complete our National Volunteer Interest Form. I would love to partner with you to help us strengthen the Kappa Kappa Psi experience for our students!

It is not lost on me the weight and privilege of this station and the opportunity that lies ahead of us in these next two years. However, leading Kappa Kappa Psi forward on this JOURNEY is not something that can or should be done by a single person. As the 49th National President of Kappa Kappa Psi, I stand before you, not simply as an individual, but as an extension of a long line of leaders who have worked tirelessly to keep the spirit and dream of our Founders alive throughout our JOURNEY as Kappa Kappa Psi. To the 48 incredible Brothers who have laid the foundation for me to step into this role, I thank you and look forward to your continued support and guidance. Past National Presidents, please rise to be recognized. On behalf of the Brotherhood, I salute my predecessor, President Lee, for her many years of service to the Fraternity and for helping us RECHARGE Kappa Kappa Psi. Please help me thank President Lee. Of course, no National President would be able to do what they want to do without the hard work and support of our Headquarters. To all of our HQ staff members, I thank you and look forward to our many meetings and phone calls throughout the next biennium. Please stand to be recognized. I also thank all the hundreds of Brothers in attendance this week and the thousands of Actives and Alumni for helping us continue the Kappa Kappa Psi JOURNEY.

# APPENDIX 29 - REPORT OF THE NATIONAL VICE PRESIDENT FOR MEMBERSHIP AND EXPANSION

Brothers of Kappa Kappa Psi -

It is with great honor and humility that I prepare this final report to share with you the work I have undertaken in the 2021-2023 biennium as your National Vice President for Membership & Expansion. It has been an arduous and turbulent journey, but I am forever grateful for this incredible opportunity to serve in this capacity. While I had originally planned to move aggressively on membership recruitment and chapter expansion, I quickly realized at the beginning of the biennium that many chapters were focused on relearning the basics. In addition, my conversations with students and directors centered on the benefits of having a Kappa Kappa Psi chapter and how it could be a part of the rebuilding process for the band program. Rather than moving forward with my original plans, I redirected my focus to stabilizing the decline in membership and chapter closures. In the following pages, you will find an account of my work in this office and all the activities that have led to the successes and failures of my term as NVPME.

## Membership Education

One of my first priorities as the NVPME was to familiarize myself with The Road to Wisdom and the chapter calendar/activities submission process. With the help of Derek Stoughton and Ed Savoy, I was able to complete the training alongside the new members of the National Curriculum Committee early in the biennium. President Lee ensured that this committee had

enough members to complete the work needed for reviewing and approving chapter calendar submissions. The committee started out well at the beginning of the biennium, but as time went on, more and more members stopped reviewing calendars and the work fell on 2-3 members. I had to step in several times to review nearly 50% of the calendars to ensure that chapters could move forward with recruitment. Due to the long delays in this process and the overall relearning needed after the pandemic, I intentionally chose to pause any conversations about implementing disciplinary actions on chapters that didn't submit a calendar on time. I do believe that this is something we need in order to hold our chapters accountable but now is not the time. Until we have a more consistent and reliable system in place, my suggestion is that we focus on teaching our chapters about our process and providing support in the meantime. At least for another biennium.

While I had my frustrations with the committee, I am truly grateful for the leadership and service of the Chair and Vice-Chair, Tammi Ramsey, and Brianna McKinzie, respectively. In addition to reviewing chapter calendars, the committee was charged with creating two lessons to add to The Road Wisdom: "Our Diversity Matters" and "Our Sisters Matter". Looking forward, I believe it is important that this committee focuses on refining the curriculum and strengthening our membership recruitment and retention strategies and tools next biennium. With that being said, I had several meetings to discuss possible changes, including who will be responsible for chapter reviews. My first meeting (06/08/23) was with Nicole Brooks, TJ Tooley, Jake January, Kennedy Struck, and Lizzi Pineiro to discuss the idea of shifting chapter reviews to District Governors. My second meeting (06/14/23) was with Tammi Ramsey, Paula Kyser, Ayleen Sanchez, and Nicole Brooks. My last meeting (07/03/23) was with the entire Governor Corps to hear their feedback. Since Governors are already working closely with their chapters, the goal is to have them take on chapter calendar reviews while the committee focuses on creating support programs and resources for chapters. It was simply too much for these volunteers to take on both chapter calendar reviews and creating content for The Road to Wisdom. For more information about the committee's work, please refer to their report, which is included in these minutes.


#### **Membership Metrics**

After the pandemic shutdown, the Fraternity experienced a significant decline in membership. Compared to the 2019-2020 academic year, the 2020-2021 academic year had a 10.5% decline in membership. Fortunately, the rate of decline plateaued and resulted in a -1.4% membership change in 2021-2022 and a -4.1% membership change in 2022-2023. Ideally, we would see a membership decline of less than 1% in the 2023-2024 academic year.

For the first year of the biennium (2021-2022), we had a starting class of 4,010 Active members. Chapters brought in 513 Fall Initiates and 1,221 Spring Initiates for a total of 1,734 Initiates. With a total of 5,744 Active members and 1,445 Graduating Seniors, our membership declined to 4,299 members. However,


in the second year of the biennium (2022-203), chapters only reported a starting class of 3,823 Active members. This means we lost 476 members who went Inactive or were not reported, resulting in a loss of \$54,740 in revenue. In the 2022-2023 academic year, chapters brought in 589 Fall Initiates and 1,097 Spring Initiates for a total of 1,686 Initiates. This is a decline of 48 Initiates compared to the following year, which is a loss of \$6,480 in revenue. On average, the Fraternity had an average (2013-2023) of 475 Fall Initiates and 1,250 Spring Initiates. In addition, the Fraternity usually started each school year with an average of 4,348 Actives and ended the year with an average of 6,079 members.

Overall, the Fraternity experienced a decline in membership due to a few key factors: larger graduating classes, a decrease in new initiates, higher rate of members going Inactive. Expecting a graduating class of 1,500 for the 2022-2023 academic year, this would result in a starting class of around 4,000 Actives. The highest number of initiates (2,001) brought in was during the 2017-2018 academic year. If chapters can bring in at least 1,700 new members in the 2023-2024 academic year, the Fraternity will be in a much better financial position. Ideally, through the Strive for Five initiative, the Fraternity will experience positive growth next biennium.




# Dues Paying Members (Avg = 4,348)

Table 1: Dues Paying Members (2013-2023)




# Fall Initiates Confirmed (Avg = 475)

#### **Expansion**

With all the work that my predecessor, Jessica Lee, did to update the petitioning process in the 2019-2021 biennium, I focused on testing out her changes in the Fall 2021 semester. After the first two petitioning groups were installed as chapters, I met with our National Membership & Expansion Coordinator, TJ Tooley, biweekly to assess and adjust the process to shorten the process and ensure a stronger focus on chapter operations. We made the following changes:

- Removed all references to colonization or other outdated terms related to colonization in all our materials, including the website, marketing pieces, and handbook;
- Updated the "Starting a Chapter" page on the website to reflect our "Expansion" efforts, added an interest form, and removed outdated information;
- Worked with TBS NVPCM Siobhan Wilkes-Bratcher to update the standard set of questions (created by Jessica Lee and Erika Pope) to vet applications by meeting with the Director of Bands and Chapter Sponsor prior to starting the petitioning process;
- Expanded the advising team to five (5) diverse individuals (with at least one District Governor), from different schools, districts, and backgrounds, to guide and support the new petitioning group through a more well-rounded and holistic approach;
- Provided a calendar template (similar to the membership education calendar) to help the Petitioning Group keep on track, prepare their finances, and ensure that they met all requirements prior to installation;
- Provided training and resources for advising teams prior to starting the petitioning process, so they were equipped to educate and guide the groups; and
- Publicized new petitioning groups and chapter installations on social media and the national website.

#### **Charges**

- Work closely with the District Leadership Teams and Chapter Field Representatives to identify "at-risk" chapters that should be prioritized for hands-on support. A review should take place by August 1 of each academic year and a meeting with the key stakeholders should occur before the start of band camp season.
- 2. Work closely with the National Curriculum Development Committee to re-shift their focus on strengthening the Strive for Five program to ensure that chapters have all the tools and resources they need to effectively recruit new members and retain current members.
- 3. Meet with the Expansion Committee to develop a communication and outreach strategy and plan for college programs that have expressed interest in starting a chapter. Review the current list of leads that have already been created and work with the National President and National Executive Director to make initial contact before the major annual conferences. This should take place before the end of September of each academic year.
- 4. Collaborate with the National President, National Executive Director, and Chair of the Alumni Association Board of Directors to plan out a call for "membership reclamation" to help Brothers who graduate in "Inactive" status to reclaim their membership with the Fraternity. This should happen after the recruitment season for Actives but before the end of the calendar year.
- 5. Re-evaluate the Chapter Field Representative Program with the National President and National Executive

Director to ensure that the program is adapting to the needs of the chapters and is financially effective. This should happen with the voices of the current and a task force of past CFRs. This should take place before January 2024.

## **Closing & Gratitude**

After a two-year journey of many ups and downs, I am incredibly proud of where we are as an organization and the work that we have done together. The NVPME position is not one to be taken lightly and demands perseverance, patience, and positivity. ## Introduction

While all of our Brothers are worthy of honor, I have noted that, in the past, the J. ## **A. Frank Martin Awards**

Convention, would receive the A. Frank Martin Award and assist in making it happen. Her work in the MWD and for the Kappa Kappa Psi Alumni Association has been considerable, so I am glad to have played a part in making sure that she was well and justly honored.

## **Distinguished Service to Music Medals**

#### The William A. Scroggs Founders' Trophy and Kenneth M. Corbett Most Improved Chapter Award

One of the most important roles of the VPP is organizing the process by which finalists for The Founders' Trophy are selected. Below is a rough timeline of the actions I've taken to make sure this process is as streamlined, fair, inclusive, and equitable as possible:

- September-December 2022: Downloaded reports from eligible Chapters and uploaded them onto Google Drive
- September 2022: Twice e-mailed the directors, sponsors, and Chapter officers of all Chapters who were, at that point in time, eligible to be a finalist for Chapter

Leadership (defined as having completed all Chapter Personnel, Fall Activity, and Chapter Summary reports on time and not having been placed on any form of Chapter discipline status over the course of the biennium) to remind them to submit their 2022 Chapter Personnel Update

- October 2022: Finalized a rubric (which can be found in Appendix 3) based on the work of past National President Marco Krcatovich, to evaluate Chapters and finalized an optional submission form (sent through Jotform, the text of which can be found in Appendix 9) that eligible Chapters could fill out to give the Programs Committee the best possible information to evaluate Chapters. My thanks to the Programs Committee on their feedback on both the rubric and the optional submission form.
- November 2022: Twice e-mailed the directors, sponsors, and Chapter officers of all Chapters who were, at that point in time, eligible to be a finalist for Chapter Leadership inviting them to fill out the optional submission form and to remind them to submit their Fall Activity Report
- December 2022/January 2023:
  - o Received and downloaded the optional submissions of 39 Chapters
  - Anonymized over 1500 pages of reports of the 81 eligible Chapters, removing references including, but not limited to: Chapter name, band name, university name, individual name, District name, athletic conference name, identifying locations or cities, or other information that may allow a reviewer to identify a specific Chapter

This was done to ensure that reviewers of materials were not able to rely on any biases in reviewing Chapters

- o Finalized assignments of Chapters to reviewers, accounting for potential conflicts of interest that reviewers may have including, but not limited to, Chapter affiliation, employment affiliation, known personal connections, and District affiliation.
- o Distributed these materials to the reviewers on the Program's Committee so that they could grade Chapters according to the above rubric.

My thanks to Carrie Anderson, Byron Bryson, Bradley Hammett, Reilly Hesseltine, Teddy Howell, Russell House, Molly Kuchan, and Darin Martin for agreeing to review Chapters here

o Distributed these materials to the District Governors so that they also could have the ability to evaluate the Chapters whom they are closest to.

#### Keynote Speech

Given the biennium's theme of ReCharging the Brotherhood, I was able to work with President Lee on devising the following theme for our Keynote Speech:

"Agreeable, Enthusiastic, and Unswerving: Maintaining the Charge". Our membership in Kappa Kappa Psi means that we lead our college bands in ways that are agreeable, enthusiastic, and unswerving. As Brothers and as Chapters, fulfilling our charge as Brothers means being charged up as Brothers, and embracing that work every day. How are you and your Chapter living the charge and relighting the spark that makes this Fraternity work? How are you working to reCharge Kappa Kappa Psi to be fully powered and demonstrating our values of Musicianship, Leadership, Service, and Brotherhood?

With this theme decided, I worked with our Communications Team and Aaron Moore to promote this to my Brothers, and further worked to promote this at our District Conventions. As a result, we received 10 applications for the Keynote Speech, all of which showed thought for and love of Kappa Kappa Psi. The rubric used to judge these speeches can be found in Appendix 4 of my report. I was pleased that the National Council chose Mary Elliott from the lota Kappa Chapter to deliver our Keynote Speech. This will be a fantastic start to our National Convention, and I look forward to Mary sharing her passion with the Brotherhood.

#### **Upcoming Awards and Scholarships**

At the 2023 National Convention, we are set to give out four A. Frank Martin Awards, two Distinguished Service to Music Medals, and one J. Lee Burke Student Achievement Award. After Convention, we will also be awarding an additional A. Frank Martin Award along with five AEA Scholarships. I'm excited for these recipients to learn of how they are being honored, and all are incredibly worthy of this honor.

## Joint Work To Improve The Process for Academic Achievement Awards

I am blessed with a terrific counterpart and colleague in Tau Beta Sigma VPCR Allison Leeman, who brought up to me a desire to streamline the academic awards shared by Kappa Kappa Psi and Tau Beta Sigma in a way that will make it easier to apply, give students greater privacy in not sharing their grade reports with other students, and overall make this program more central to both organizations. Through mutual review and feedback, we were able to work with Aaron Moore at National Headquarters to get this awards process updated.

#### Joint Work To Codify Our Travel Policy

Verifying that we, as National Leadership Team members, are responsibly using the money that our students pay is incredibly important. This is why, in collaboration with Tau Beta Sigma VPSP Leslie Gartin, we worked towards establishing and codifying a joint travel policy that the Leadership Teams of both organizations could abide by. This policy established a meal per diem for National Leadership Team members in addition to setting clear guidelines on when a leader needed to pursue additional approvals for more expensive travel. It is my hope that this work can be built upon in future biennium to ensure that our organization's expenses remain reasonable.

#### **Month of Musicianship**

In 2021, Thanks to some excellent collaboration with the Communications Committee, we were able to program messaging throughout the month of November encouraging people to #strikeupthebands while focusing student thoughts and activities around the overall themes of Tone, Articulation, Beauty, Duration, and Harmony. At my request, the Communications Committee also included a specific focus on the W. Francis McBeth Student Musicianship Award, which included their interviewing for the Kappa Kappa Psi Presents podcast past McBeth Award recipients Dylan Shadoan and Andrew Weliver. This was in furtherance of my goal to promote awareness of this award, as it has not been utilized as well as it might over the award's history.

In 2022, I invited Brothers to think about the following question during this month:

- As we finish a membership class or start to think about recruiting a new one, how can we use music to showcase Kappa Kappa Psi as an organization that people will be eager and proud to join?
- As we come closer to the end of a semester and, for many, a marching band season, how can we bring our music to its greatest height?
- As we look at our fellow band members and our band directors, how are we helping them build a program that will produce music for years to come?

Seeing the responses of Brothers on social media, under the hashtag #strikeupthebands, was never anything less than inspiring, and my gratitude goes out to all Brothers who participated in whatever way they were able to.

I was also able to promote the Month of Musicianship via the Kappa Kappa Psi Presents Podcast; my thanks to Ryan Smith for putting this together. In addition, I was honored to be asked by Dino Cardenas, Communications Director of the Southwest District Alumni Association and Jayar Brenner, North Central Vice President for Communication, to provide separate written reflections on the Month of Musicianship for publications that they manage. Both of these were wonderful opportunities that I participated in for the purpose of promoting our enduring focus on music.

During both of these months, I also had a focus on online panels with outstanding Brothers which will be discussed further below.

#### **Awards Panels**

Throughout the biennium, a priority of mine has been to feature the experiences of our outstanding Brothers, which I attempted to do through the hosting of seven panel discussions focused on Chapters and individuals who were recipients of our awards. Several of these panels were concentrated during the Month of Musicianship, as they offered an opportunity to both feature outstanding Brothers and outstanding musicians.

On November 14th, 2021, I moderated a panel entitled "Musicianship in Your Chapter" with presenters from the lota Zeta Chapter at North Carolina Agricultural and Technical State University, who did a fantastic job highlighting how they incorporate music in their Chapter's day to day activities. This was in furtherance of my goal to highlight Chapters who have been awarded by the Fraternity and highlight their experiences so that they can teach their fellow students better ways of serving their bands.

On November 19th, 2021, I moderated a panel entitled "Music

Professionals Panel" in which I had alumni music professionals speak to their passion for the great art that dominates our Brotherhood, how it has impacted their lives, and what tips they have to share with students today. My thanks to Dr. Amy Bovin, Dr. Donald Lee, and Dr. Derek Stoughton for their participation in this panel.

In order to further my goal of promoting awards and utilizing the experiences of past award winners, I moderated a panel on December 11th with past winners of the J. Lee Burke Student Achievement Award. This was a great discussion that showcased a variety of perspectives on what student leadership means and how perspectives can develop. My thanks to Mackenzie Darby, Mia Harvey, Will Johnston, and Laurenté Oby for participating in this panel.

On August 28, 2022, I highlighted the work of the Nu Upsilon Chapter at Ball State University, who were the recipients of the 2019-2021 Kenneth M. Corbett Most Improved Chapter Award. This was a lovely session where the Brothers of Nu Upsilon shared their story and how they are committed to perpetual improvement as a Chapter. My thanks to Lillia Marble for her assistance in making this a reality.

On September 14, 2022 I featured some of the most recent winners of the J. Lee Burke Student Achievement Award. In my continuing efforts to make sure that our students are aware that this is not just an award for District Officers, but for any outstanding leader in our Fraternity, half of the panel were not current or former District Officers. This was another wonderful opportunity for Brothers to learn from their peers on how to be a leader in our organization. My thanks to the panel participants, Cameren Calhoun, Jay Chapa, Kristen Davis, and Ben Jones.

The panel conducted during the Month of Musicianship on November 6, 2022, featured past recipients of the A. Frank Martin Award who are currently professionally engaged in music. The purpose of this panel was both to celebrate our past award winners while giving them an opportunity to share their professional expertise with other Brothers. My thanks to the panel participants, Dr. Craig Aarhus, Denali Pearce-Alt, Tony Falcone and Amy Heavilin.

My last panel, in April 2023, consisted of Brothers from four of our Chapter Leadership Finalists, which were Epsilon Psi, Zeta Omicron, Theta Tau, and Nu Gamma. This was an excellent panel, and I think that the participating Brothers were able to share with each other and with the Fraternity as a whole how excellence is achieved. My thanks to Jackson Dampier, Samonte Jennings, and Madison Thompson (Epsilon Psi), Kai Falcone and Camryn Silk (Zeta Omicron), Jayden Johnson, Shawn McNeill, and Antini Richardson (Theta Tau), and Cade Skuse and Mary Swope (Nu Gamma)

#### **Professional Fraternity Association Work**

We are honored as an organization to be a part of the Professional Fraternity Association, which gives us the opportunity to apply for awards for our members. In 2022, I collaborated with TBSigma VPCR Allison Leeman in a nomination for Melvin Miles for the PFA Career Achievement Award Awards, a nomination which was successful and I was honored to assist in the presentation of.

At the request of President Lee, I prepared an additional nomination in 2023 for a Brother for the Career Achievement Award for the Professional Fraternity Association. As I write this report, I do not know if this individual will receive this award, but it is my hope that the PFA chooses to recognize this Brother, who has had a great impact on Kappa Kappa Psi and who will continue to be one of the leading lights of our organization.

#### The Founders' Circle

After the "soft launch" of The Founders' Circle during the 2022 District Conventions, at which point all materials of the Founders' Circle were online, I was quite happy we were able to carry out a full launch of The Founders' Circle during the fall of 2022. This involved, among other actions:

- Personal promotion during every SAC meeting in the lead up to the re-launch
- Organizing a podcast interview with Dr. Kirk Randazzo to speak about the program
- Working with the Founders' Circle Relaunch Sub-Committee on a social media calendar to promote the program and executing that calendar.
- Upon the advice of the Founders' Circle Relaunch Sub-Committee, working with Aaron Moore to get this a place of prominence on the kkpsi.org website, both in the banner of the site and as one of the announcements

My thanks to Founders' Circle Relaunch Sub-Committee Chair Russell House and committee members Carrie Anderson, Adam Connolly, Andrew Pearson, and Reese Valdez on making this a reality.

Post launch, I worked a great deal with Darin Martin, the chair of the sub-committee in charge of the review of the Founders' Circle, on how best to evaluate the status of the roll out and the adoption of the program. We found in this process that data analytics on this part of the website had not previously been enabled, meaning we missed out on being able to measure how many hits the site was getting during the launch period. However, analytics are now enabled, so we will be able to use this information to track adoption going forward.

Work that is near completion, but not at a finished stage, is the work of recruiting new speakers for The Founders' Circle. Jennifer Besler and Molly Kuchan have done great foundational work in plotting out the process, communication tools and schedule by which we can recruit new speakers. However, at this point, that launch is pending discussion from the current Founders' Circle team on what a training plan for new speakers will look like. I'm disappointed we could not push this to the finish line, but I have no doubt that my successor will be able to build on our work.

## **Chapter Elections Guide**

Having seen many Chapter election procedures go awry in my time as a Brother, the way we structure these elections to select the best candidates, but cause harm to the least candidates is something that I care deeply about. As a result, I drafted the document that can be found in Appendix 2 of this report, and provided this as a resource to the Chapter Operations Committee. It is my hope that this work can be used to create a new baseline for what we expect from the elections our Chapters conduct.

## **Awards Guide**

One of my passions as a Brother is developing greater resources for other Brothers. It was in this spirit that I drafted the document in Appendix 1, which will ultimately serve as a single resource for Chapters on how to successfully apply for awards. I regret that I did not have an opportunity to roll this out more thoroughly, and next steps on this will be indicated in my charges to the next VPP.

#### **Awards Calendar**

One of the things that any good VPP needs to have is a plan to promote the awards of the organization and, in order to do that effectively, it is important for them to have a promotional plan from the start. In order to assist future VPPs in how to structure how they promote awards, I charged a sub-committee of the Programs Committee, led by Byron Byson, to draft up a calendar. It was a pleasure collaborating with Bryron on this, and I think it serves as a starting point to assist the next VPP. More information regarding this calendar can be found in Appendix 8.

#### Work with the Data and Assessment Committee

It was a pleasure to work with Mark Bradbourne and Dr. Anthony Walker as the advisor for the Data and Assessment Committee. The Climate Survey was a big achievement on their part, and it was a unique pleasure of mine to support them in their work through suggesting additional questions, editing existing questions for clarity, and assisting in final rounds of edits to make sure the Climate Survey was ready to go live. My thanks to Mark and Anthony and all those on the committee for making this survey a reality.

#### Work with the Programs Committee

The work of the Programs Committee is more thoroughly covered in that committee's report, so I will touch on it only lightly here. However, I will say that I would not have been able to be as successful as VPP without the great work of this committee, and, in particular, my co-chair Teddy Howell, who challenged me in all of the best ways to be the best representative of all of our students that I could be. Their influence, advice, and work ethic can be seen in almost all of my projects during the biennium, and I am grateful to them for that.

#### Work with the Curriculum Committee

While I transitioned from my work with the Curriculum Committee during this biennium, I still served as a resource for them in improving the JotForm submission process. In addition, at the request of VPME Co, I undertook a project to remove personal identifying information (PII) from activity reviews from the previous biennium so that they would be able to be posted publicly as a resource for Chapters to take advantage of. I was happy to participate in this work, and thank you to VPME Co for trusting me in it.

#### **Travel: Non District Convention**

Representing the Fraternity is not an honor to be taken lightly, and, throughout the biennium, I endeavored always to represent the Fraternity in worthy ways. I had the honor of representing Kappa Kappa Psi at the following events over the course of the biennium:

At these sessions, along with our Winter and Summer Council meetings throughout the biennium, I took appropriate notes and endeavored to make sure that meeting participants were clear about what had been done and had access to materials presented at these meetings.

## **Review of District Officer Election Guidelines**

A long standing issue for our organization has been with our election of District Officers. I am a passionate believer in the District Officer program, as it has had a transformational impact on my life, and I am proud of the people who pass through this program. However, too often, we leave District Conventions without full District Councils, which can impede their progress in the work of the District, and, at times, we are not as empathetic to our candidates as we could be. In addition, the very different requirements from District to District on who can qualify to be a District Officer can create issues of equity.

To attempt to provide a framework to discuss these issues and arrive at a unified solution, I have drafted the document in Appendix 5. It is my hope that the next National Council can continue this conversation on how to improve access, equity, and empathy in our District Council elections.

## **District Convention Reflections and Resource**

Our District Conventions were uniformly excellent but, as with any event or process, there are always opportunities to improve. While attending District Conventions throughout this biennium, I have observed areas where we may be able to develop better resources as an organization. This includes such topics as:

- Ensuring our District Council elections are as empathetic as possible
- Ensuring our District Convention business is both as efficient and as comprehensible to our Brothers as possible
- Ensuring that our preparation for Ritual puts us in the best mindset as possible

To try to codify some of the best practices we've seen from District Conventions over time, and to give District Councils and Governors the best possible resources, I drafted a "guide" that covers many of the common activities of Convention. This guide is included in Appendix 6 of this report. It is my hope that future National Councils can use this in consultation with our Districts to make sure that our Conventions are as efficient and productive as possible. This work was heavily informed by conversations that I had with VPME Co and SWD Governor Piniero, so my thanks to them for their insights and the quality of our discussions.

#### **Meeting and Project Coordination**

As the VPP is the person who takes the minutes of the Council and, as a result, needs to be keyed into every portion of every meeting that they attend, I saw an opportunity to transform the position into one that better helps the Council track their projects and better helps distribute follow-ups and updates to the National Leadership Team, thus providing greater help to the National President. In this effort, I can report partial success.

Where I wish I had succeeded more is in assisting the Council in tracking projects. While I had drafted a project tracker for the Council with scheduled e-mails reminding them about action items that we had planned, I did not have as much capacity to update this tracker as I had hoped. I still think this is a worthy goal for the VPP to pursue, but perhaps there are more effective ways to do so that allow the office to pursue its other duties.

More successful, in my view, were my efforts to follow up with the National Leadership Team on action items and to-dos. After each National Leadership team meeting, I distributed a condensed version of my notes that were organized to highlight action items (and who they belonged to), reminders, and to-dos, in addition to providing appropriate links that may have been in separate e-mails. The feedback I received from such efforts was positive, as Brothers seemed to appreciate a consolidated message that updated them, and this takes work off the plate of the National President. I encourage the next VPP to continue taking on this role, as I think it's an asset to the organization.

#### Charges

- To the 2023-25 National Vice President for Programs
  - Roll out the awards guide so that Chapters can have more information on how to access our suite of awards
  - Actively solicit awards applications, using recommendations from National Leadership, identify the best people to submit those nominations, and

follow up as often as you can to make sure we are honoring the best in bands

- o Re-focus on the Francis W. McBeth Student Musicianship Award, as we have great opportunities to honor great musicians
- Seek to improve the project tracking of the organization, so that you can help assist the National President with the competing initiatives that come their way
- o Continue distributing post National Leadership Team meeting write ups, so that people are clear on what's discussed, clear on the National Council vision, and clear on next steps
- o Continue seeking out individuals and Chapters for awards panels, so that they can share their experience with other Brothers and forge new connections.
- o Continue seeking out all Brothers, particularly Brothers who are not District Officers, for recognition for the J. Lee Burke Student Achievement Award
- o Continue seeking ways to track the projects of the Council in a sustainable way, and distribute updates after each National Leadership Team meeting to relevant stakeholders so all can be updated on what the plans of the organization are.
- o Work with Brothers who are veterans of the U.S. Armed Forces to see what can be done to revitalize our Gold/Blue/White/Silver Star program.
- o Complete the work of recruiting new speakers for The Founders' Circle, in addition to continuing to work on its promotion and adoption by students.
- To the 2023-25 National President: Continue discussions on improving our District Officer program, using the provided recommendations as a starting, though not an ending, point.
- To the 2023-25 National Council: Consider creating and codifying best practices for Chapter elections using Appendix 2 as a starting, though not an ending, point.

## Appendix A: Awards Guide for Chapters

## **Brief Overview of Awards**

The Second Purpose listed in the Preamble of the Constitution of Kappa Kappa states how we aim to honor outstanding band members. As a result, Kappa Kappa Psi believes in recognizing the outstanding Brothers, educators, alumni, and band supporters in our midst. To do so, we have a series of awards and recognitions. More information on them, including past recipients of these awards, can be found on <u>https://www.kkpsi.org/awards/</u>. This is intended as a brief overview.

#### **Student Awards and Recognitions**

All of these awards can be awarded to active, associate, or conditional Brothers of our Fraternity

#### J. Lee. Burke Student Achievement Award

This award honors Brothers who have made outstanding contributions to the college bands and the Fraternity. It is the highest award that a student in our organization can win, and honors contributions made on all levels of the Fraternity.

#### W. Francis McBeth Student Musicianship Award

This award honors Brothers that exemplify the highest standards of musical achievement.

#### **AEA Scholarship**

This scholarship, which is for up to \$2,000, can be applied for for the fall and spring semesters so long as the applicant has a GPA of at least 3.5 on a 4.0 scale.

## Top Chapter Scholar

The Top Chapter Scholar Award is presented to the active member from the chapter with the highest GPA for a given academic term.

## **Outstanding Academic Achievement**

The Outstanding Academic Achievement Award is given to active members of the chapter who achieve a 3.5 GPA (on a 4.0 scale) for a particular term.

## **Professional Awards**

All of these awards can be awarded to individuals who have made a mark in their professional career. Unless otherwise noted, there is no requirement for any of these awards that the individual be a Brother of Kappa Kappa Psi.

## A. Frank Martin Award

This award recognizes regionally known band directors and supporters who have made contributions to the band field.

## **Distinguished Service to Music Medal**

This award honors outstanding individual contributions to bands on a national level. The areas of recognition include: composition, concert band, marching band, instrumental music education, artist performer, industrial research and progress, contributing laymen, alumni achievement, and fraternity service. It is the most prestigious award that Kappa Kappa Psi offers.

## **Outstanding Sponsor Award**

This award honors a sponsor who has shown outstanding service and dedication to Kappa Kappa Psi or Tau Beta Sigma. This Sponsor must be a supportive resource to the students on their campus offering growth and development through guidance and assistance.

## **Bohumil Makovsky Memorial Award**

This award honors outstanding conductors in the college bands.

## **Stanley G. Finck Memorial Award**

This award honors those individuals who exemplify the spirit of joint cooperation. Recipients for this award would be members of Kappa Kappa Psi or Tau Beta Sigma.

## **Awards Given to Chapters**

These awards are given to one Kappa Kappa Psi Chapter each per biennium.. Both of these awards also have finalists who are announced publicly and are also deserving of honor.

## William Scroggs Founder's Trophy

This award is given out to the most outstanding Chapter in the nation.

## Kenneth Corbett Chapter Improvement Awards

This award is given out to the most improved Chapter in the nation.

## **Awards Given By Chapters**

All of these awards can be applied for and awarded by

#### Chapters.

#### The Silver Baton Award

This award is given to individuals for service to bands for noteworthy longevity and continuous quality, typically on a local level. This service can include supporting bands as a director, an administrator, a staff member, a composer, or a volunteer.

## Citation of Excellence

This award recognizes outstanding achievement by junior and high school band members during summer camp activities and to help create an awareness of the national organizations.

#### F. Lee Bowling Musical Excellence Award

This award honors outstanding students in high school and junior high school music programs. It recognizes those students who have demonstrated excellence in their respective band program

#### National Convention Awards

All of these awards are given out once a biennium at our National Convention.

## F. Lee Bowling Participation Award

This award is given to the College or University with the largest amount of members in the National Intercollegiate Band.

#### **Delegate Distance Award**

This award is given to the delegate who traveled the furthest to the National Convention. It is based on the furthest chapter from the National Convention site that has a delegate from that chapter present.

## **Chapter Distance Award**

This award is given to the chapter who has members that traveled the furthest to get to the National Convention. It is determined by multiplying the number of Active members at Convention by the distance of their home chapter to the National Convention site.

## **Chapter Participation Award**

This award is given to the chapter who has the greatest percentage of Active members attending the National Convention. It is based on the total number of Active members attending the National Convention divided by the total number of Active members in the chapter.

#### J. Lee Burke Trophy for Best Chapter Display

This award is presented by both organizations to the school that has the best chapter display at National Convention. Selection for this award is done by judges at the convention.

#### **District Awards**

Each individual District has their own set of awards. All Districts have some form of an award that honors the most outstanding Chapter in their District over the previous year, and many Districts have other awards ranging from recognition for the most improved Chapter to awards that honor individual outstanding Brothers. Please reach out to your District Officers and District Governors to learn more about any that you or your Chapter may be eligible for.

#### Letter of Recommendation Tips

As stated in the table above, many awards require that letters of recommendations be submitted on behalf of the person who is being nominated. Here are a few tips on how to make sure you're soliciting the best letters on the best timeline:

- Letters should be requested at least 1-2 months in advance of award deadline; this gives the writer plenty of time to consider what they will be saying.
- 2. Include in the request to the letter writer relevant details on what the award or recognition is
- 3. Send your resume or the resume of the person who is being nominated to the letter writer so that they can refresh their memory on who it is they're writing for
- 4. Be aware of the commitments that the letter writer may have; this is why asking as far ahead as possible is so important
- 5. Without telling the person you're asking what to write, you may suggest to them the story you're trying to tell about the person, whether it's you or someone else
- 6. Follow up with the letter writer, but be reasonable with the follow up. If you haven't heard from the letter writer in at least two weeks, it is reasonable to gently remind them or ask them about the status of the letter
- 7. Make sure the letter writer is someone who is relevant to the person. This can be someone who has worked with the individual is a supervisory position or, if it's a professional award, as a peer

## **Online Application**

The online application contains the following elements:

- 1. Name, Address, Phone, and Employer
- 2. Nominees status or lack thereof with Kappa Kappa Psi and/or Tau Beta Sigma
- 3. Information on colleges/universities attended, degrees received (if applicable), positions held, associations and membership, and professional awards and achievements
- 4. Nominating letter

This application is going to be how the National Council learns about the individual that you're nominating. To give them the best possible view of them, you can follow these tips:

- Be thorough with the details you're providing; the more relevant information the Council has about this person, the better our decision making process will be
- For professional awards, particularly if they are band directors, a lot of information can be found on university websites, which can help you with your application
- If you have any questions about the fraternal experience of a potential nominee, ask the VPP; much of this information will be available in the OMRS, and they can find that information for you and help you with the application'

## **Appendix B: Chapter Elections Guide**

## **Chapter Election Best Practices**

As Brothers, we want our Chapters to be successful, which is why the election of Chapter officers is so important. We are told that "to shirk is to betray a trust", and, if we do not do a good job of respecting our Brothers when we ask them for our support, we betray their trust. So, in this guide, you'll find tips on how to conduct your elections in an efficient and respectful manner and provide the best possible officer corps to your Chapter.

#### When Should You Conduct Your Chapter Elections?

There are two primary term ranges that Chapters choose to have their officers serve in:

- Academic Year (Elections held in March/April, with the term covering the full next academic year)
- Calendar Year (Elections held in November/December, with the term covering the full next calendar year)

Neither of these approaches are inherently better or worse than the other, but both come with their advantages and disadvantages:

- Chapter operations tend to follow an academic year, so there is a flow to having officers serve throughout a full academic year. However, this can result in graduating chapter officers not having much time to transition their materials and experiences to their successors
- Having officers serve a calendar year term can result in better transition between officers, as many of the existing officers may still be around to counsel. Plus, it may allow people who have spring obligations like student teaching to better serve. However, this can result in a transition for Chapter members which, if not properly prepared, can be awkward.

Whenever you choose to do your Chapter elections, make sure that you're taking into account the respective pros and cons and, after they are conducted, fill out the Chapter Personnel Update form to inform HQ of the new officers.

## How Do I Prepare My Chapter Members To Become Chapter Officers?

There are several ways to make sure that your Chapter members are prepared to become officers:

- Have them go through the materials in <u>The Founders'</u> <u>Circle</u> to learn how to become a better Fraternal leader
- Attend virtual District and National events to learn more about how Kappa Kappa Psi works as an organization and gain experiences from other Brothers
- Start an "officer shadowing" program where interested Brothers can learn more what it means to be a Chapter officer. This doesn't have to just happen around election time: it can be year round!
- Develop and publish your officer training guides, so that Brothers can know what they're getting into and what deadlines may apply. This way, they can best see what is

being done and bring their own creativity to the office!

# Should I Limit Who In My Chapter Can Run For Chapter Office?

While there may be specific and situational exceptions based on the counsel of your Chapter Sponsor or Director of Bands, such as not allowing Brothers who are student teaching to run for Chapter Office, in general, limiting who can run for a particular Chapter office isn't a good idea. Even your newest Brothers may have enthusiasm and ideas that can serve them well as a Chapter officer, and it doesn't do your Chapter any good to limit them. Remember: you take an oath to support your Chapter officers, so you'll always be there to support them through any blind spots they may have.

## How Should We Discuss The Individuals Who Run For Chapter Office?

First, ask yourself the following questions:

- Is our discussion of the candidates designed primarily to persuade other Brothers to support the candidate of our choice?
- Is our discussion of the candidates designed primarily around personal issues or failings that we perceive the candidates to have?
- Is our discussion of the candidates designed primarily around their vision for the office and how the candidate will achieve it?
- Does our discussion of the candidates contribute more to determining the best candidate and vision than does asking the candidate clear and defined questions around their vision?

If your discussions are primarily around the first two questions, then it is best not to discuss candidates at all: these discussions contribute primarily to discord and hurt feelings that are best avoided. Even if your discussion is around the third question, you have to be sure that the discussion is clearly and specifically focused: while it is fully appropriate to have intentional discussions around the future of your Chapter, it is not appropriate if these discussions become vehicles for character assassination. So, rather than engaging in back and forth conversation amongst yourselves, it may be best to just give your candidates appropriate time to respond to respectful questions about what they want to do with their office.

#### If We're Discussing Candidates For Chapter Office, Should We Have Them Leave The Room?

First, ask yourself these questions:

- Is this discussion going to be personally hurtful to the candidate?
- Is the discussion designed to talk about things that the candidate may find overly personal and that, if it were us, we wouldn't want shared about ourselves?
- Is the discussion going to feature words from individuals that those individuals wouldn't say to the candidate themselves?

If the answer to any of these questions is "yes", then consider why this discussion is taking place and whether it should take place at all. If the answer to these questions is "no", then consider if the candidates need to be absent at all.

#### What Are Some Respectful Questions To Ask Of Individuals Running For Chapter Office?

It can be difficult to find the correct words to use without seeming combative. Here are a few suggested ways to frame your questions of your officer candidates:

- Why do you feel the idea or goal that you have proposed is important?
- What does success in this office look like to you?
- What experiences do you have that will allow you to be successful in this office?
- Why does this office interest you?
- What changes in approach will you bring to this office?

#### How Long Should My Chapter Elections Take?

Elections are vitally important and, depending on how many offices and officer candidates you may have, they may be lengthy. However, we want to make sure that we're making the best possible use of the time of our Brothers so that they are not stuck in meetings that take the better part of a day. So, consider the following tips on how to make sure your elections are efficient:

- Set clear and reasonable limits on candidates speeches and Q&A sessions
  - o You can also have candidates record their speeches so that they don't take up meeting time and can be watched at leisure.
- Have sessions outside of your election meeting where Chapter members can interact with and ask 1:1 questions of the candidates
- Have candidates share their vision and goals to Chapter members ahead of time so that they can be informed of what their Brothers wish to accomplish.
- Solicit candidate questions ahead of time and provide them to the candidates, so that redundant questions can be combined and candidates can be prepared
- If you are going to have Chapter discussion on your candidates at all, give it clear guidelines (as stated above) and time limits
- If you're spending time collecting ballots, consider using electronic balloting
- If you're using electronic balloting, you may also consider ranked choice voting to cut down on the number of runoffs that may occur
  - o Please note that, if you choose this direction, you may need to change your Chapter constitution to accommodate it.

## How Should We Treat Individuals Who Lose Chapter Office? Like. *Brothers*.

Running for any kind of office or position can be immensely stressful; these are individuals who are putting themselves "out there" to be voted up on by their peers while knowing they may have to put up with the pain of losing. While, in many instances, there may be an individual who loses a Chapter office, that person is no less valuable and no less your Brother. If we're treating our Brothers with respect and dignity throughout the process, losing may hurt less, but it may still hurt. Check on your Brothers and provide the care to them that is appropriate to their needs and personality.

## Appendix E: District Officer Election Guidelines Document

#### **Operating Assumptions**

- The National Chapter has some interest in establishing common standards on how District Officers are elected, appointed, and removed due to
  - o Their importance to the organization as a whole
  - o A desire to maintain a strong supply of District leaders
  - o A desire to promote equity in how these leaders are chosen
- At present, each District has its own unique process on how it selects District Officers which varies quite widely between Districts, processes which may serve to undermine the interests of the National Chapter stated above.
  - o Please see <u>HERE</u> for a sheet outlining the various and varied processes that Districts currently use.
- For many years, many, if not all, Districts have struggled to elect a full slate of District Officers at their District Conventions. The reasons for this may include, but are not limited to:
  - o A lack of candidates to fill all positions
  - o A quantity of candidates to fill all positions, but processes that choose not to elect them
  - o Election procedures that may dissuade candidates from running for office or cause them distress if they choose to run but are not elected
  - o A lack of knowledge on the role of District Officers
- Our perpetual issues with not filling District Officer roles at District Conventions creates organizational issues, as substantial time needs to be spent filling vacancies, which inhibits District operations
- While removal of District Officers has thankfully been

a rarity, we wish to be prepared for instances in which it happens and have it happen in a way that lifts the burden from students having to evaluate their peers.

• While any election or selection process will have winners and losers, it is fundamental to our values as Brothers that we devise processes that grant our Brothers as much respect and dignity as possible.

#### **Scope of Recommendations**

- These recommendations will primarily be focused on structural improvements in the following areas:
  - o How Districts solicit materials for District office
  - o The materials that Districts solicit
  - o The methods by which they conduct officer elections and selections
  - o The deadlines they set

## Areas for Future and Further Discussion

- Given the declared scope, these recommendations cannot deal with all scenarios. Areas for future discussion include, but are not limited to:
  - Evaluating how to weigh academic or life circumstances that students may face during a potential term in officer selection. This includes, but is not limited to:
    - § Student teaching during a term
    - § Internship during a term
    - § Study abroad/special study during a term
  - o Evaluating standardizing situations under which a student would be removed from office, including, but not limited to:
    - § Academic integrity violations
    - § Student code of conduct
    - § General issues with policies in which a student plays an active role

- o Promotion of running for District Office
- o While an important element in ensuring a full and diverse pool of individuals running for office, the method of doing this can be more dependent on local factors, so may be an area better dealt with by respective District leadership
- o The necessity for a slating process at all
  - § While this document treats as given the existence of a slating process and seeks to improve it, there is a conversation to be had on whether or not a slating process is needed at all outside of ensuring eligibility to run for a District Office.
  - § Does the stated aim of a slating process (i.e.,providing a recommendation on the best group of candidates to forward the business of the District) outweigh the time spent on the process and the perceptions that it serves more to "put a thumb on the scale" in an election process, in addition to the additional stress that it may create for candidates.

#### Recommendation #1: Set As A Best Practice That We Will Not Move To Elect The Slate Unless There Are Fewer Candidates Than There Are Offices Available

- While it can be tempting to save on time and move straight to electing a slate, it can be counter productive in these instances because:
  - o It is more likely to fail, given the additional candidates, which then wastes time with an added vote
  - o Even if it does succeed, it causes unneeded distress to un-slated candidates in that they never even got a shot at a vote
- While this is mainly a best practice rather than a structural change, there are some District constitutions that include language regarding how a vote for a slate must be unanimous and, as a matter of process, this should be changed, because it is not needed.

#### Recommendation #2: Set As A Best Practice That Candidates Be Informed of the Slate and the Reasons for It Before It Is Revealed to the District

- While it can be painful to learn that you have not been selected for any position, the pain may be enhanced by having to learn about it in front of all of your peers. In addition, it can cause hurt if you do not know why the decision has been made.
- As such, having these conversations with candidates ahead of time can help ease these anxieties as much as they can be eased and prevent potential problems, in addition to being decent to our Brothers
- It is best that these conversations be conducted by the District Governor(s), as they would be able to approach it with the appropriate sensitivity.

## Recommendation #3: Specify That Eligibility To Be A District Officer Is Covered By 5.302 and 5.303 of the National Constitution

- The National Constitution stipulates that a District Officer must be an active or associate member and full time student for their full term (5.302) and that, if the Officer cannot remain a full time student, that they may remain so upon approval of the District Governors and National President in consultation with the respective District Council (5.303)
- However, language in several constitutions either restates, muddles, or contradicts this language.
- Tying language in District Constitutions back to the National Constitution resolves these discrepancies and restatements and ensures that, if this language in the National Constitution ultimately changes, it is automatically covered in the respective District Constitution.

#### Recommendation #4: Have The One and Only Submission Requirement to Run For District Office Be Submission of Materials to District President and Governors Two Weeks Before District Convention

- Districts currently range in their approach to submission from having some materials due 45 days before District Convention to having a preferred deadline for materials before District Convention, but the final due date being District Convention itself to multiple deadlines
- While there is compelling District interest in setting the due date to be before District Convention, to allow for the Nominations committee to complete interviews, review, and deliberation before District Convention, there is also compelling interest in allowing District Leadership a maximum amount of time in promoting applications for District Council and allow potential candidates a maximum amount of time to submit
  - o A deadline of two weeks before District Convention should serve to balance these competing interests
- In addition, having a single deadline instead of multiple should allow for clearer messaging from Districts on what is required and when.
  - It would also allow for easier collaboration with the National Communications Committee in helping to promote the idea of running for District Office, as it would allow for a single procedure regardless of District.

#### Recommendation #5: Build Out Procedural Provisions To Allow For Extending Deadlines for District Officer Material Submission

- Several Districts currently account for the possibility of extending deadlines for District Officer packets based on potential lack of candidates
- Making this universal would allow for flexibility and the greatest possible chance of leaving a District Convention

#### with a full District Council

o While there is a compelling interest in having Nominations work done before District Convention, which accepting "late" applications would potentially prevent, it seems like that interest would be outweighed by allowing for the possibility of leaving with a full District Council

#### Recommendation #6: Require The Submission Only of a Resume, Platform and Goals, and Sponsor Letter To Run For District Office

- Depending on the District, requirements for District
   Officer packets include a variety of items, some of which may be limited in their efficacy of evaluating a candidate and constitute an unneeded hurdle for candidates to jump over. Below, see a list of all materials that are included in various District requirements and why this recommendation leans towards requiring only a resume, platform and goals and sponsor letter:
  - o Letter of Recommendation: DOB/Sponsor/Director of Athletic Bands
    - § Districts vary on whether only one of these or a letter from both the sponsor and DOB (if different people) are included
    - § The value of such a letter is to a) give the Nominations committee an idea of who the candidate is and b) verify that the individual has the ability to contribute on a District level, taking into account Chapter factors that would be best known by someone at that college or university
    - § A letter from the sponsor accomplishes both of these aims and minimizes the number of letters that a candidate needs to obtain
    - § It is why it is recommended that this be a required element of the application.
  - o Letter of Recommendation: Chapter
    - § The value of such a letter seems like it would be redundant of a sponsor letter and thus would primarily serve to be an additional hoop for the candidate to jump through. It is why it is not recommended that it be a required element of an application
  - o Transcript
    - § The value that this brings in terms of shedding light on the candidate is questionable and thus would primarily serve to be an additional hoop for the candidate to jump through. It is why it is not recommended that it be a required element of an application
  - o Platform/Goals
    - § It is completely reasonable that we ask a candidate what they would wish to do in office, which would also serve to help the Nominations Committee

ascertain the candidate's understanding of the office. It is why it is recommended that this be a required element of the application

- o Cover Sheet
  - S The value that this brings in terms of shedding light on the candidate is questionable and thus would primarily serve to be an additional hoop for the candidate to jump through. It is why it is not recommended that it be a required element of an application
- o Cover Letter
  - S The information that would be included here seems like it would be redundant of and included in a candidate's resume and platform/goals. It being redundant, it would primarily serve to be an additional hoop for the candidate to jump through. It is why it is not recommended that it be a required element of an application
- o Resume
  - § It is entirely reasonable to judge a candidate by what qualifications they have, both in terms of judging their fitness for office and getting to know the candidate's skills. It is why it is recommended that this be a required element of the application
- In addition to making submitting materials for District office simpler, it also brings efficiencies, including:
  - o Streamlining the amount of material that Nominations Committees have to review
  - As stated above in Recommendation #4, it allows for the National Communications Committee to aid in publicity efforts

## Recommendation #7: Move The Responsibility for Removal of District Officers to District Governors Only

- Current policies on the removal of District Officers range from having District Officers removed by District Council and District Governors to only District Governors to having Chapters of a District vote to ratify removal decisions
- Policies that directly include student votes can create awkwardness in students in having to discipline their peers
- Shifting this responsibility to be the sole domain of the District Governors helps students in not having to have these difficult conversations that they may or may not be equipped to have.

#### Recommendation #8: Develop and Publish Campaign Guidelines for District Office

- Several District already have established campaign guidelines or a process by which they will be disseminated
- It would be worthwhile for Districts to collaborate mutually on what these are, both for the purpose of

information sharing and because the need to give student's guidance on what is and is not appropriate in terms of conducting their campaigns is an issue that transcends District boundaries.

Recommendation #9: In the Event of a Vacancy Left At a District Convention, Have the Materials Stated in Recommendation #6 Be Due From Individuals 30 Days Post District Convention to the District President and Governors with Decision To Fill Vacancy Done by The District Council and District Governors

- The responsibility for filling a District Officer vacancy varies between having the District President have sole power to shared responsibilities between District Council and Governors to having the District themselves ratify a choice
  - o Bringing consistency to this ensures that the appointment process looks the same in each District
- Some Districts do not have a clear process for filling a District Officer vacancy
  - Making it consistent across the board allows District Governors to announce at District Convention when the deadline will be and what is required and potentially have conversations with students at District Convention

## **Recommendation #10: Standardize Delegate Education**

- In many instances, students may lack the knowledge of voting procedures and what they mean. While this knowledge gap may have always existed, it has been exacerbated by the pandemic years in which we did not have in person District Conventions. Therefore, the following educational items should be hit as a standard before going into elections, potentially prior to District Convention, and using this standardized language, potentially in a hand out provided at a District Convention or before District Convention.:
  - o "Chair": The "chair" is the person who is leading the meeting or presiding over the convention. Typically, this is the District President or, if the District President is either not present or unable to preside due to conflicts of interest, the District Vice President. In these instances, they may use the phrase "I yield the chair to...", indicating that, during that time period, another person is the presiding officer of the convention. While the "chair" does not vote (except in very limited circumstances described below), they lead the meeting and guide the delegates through whatever business they have determined the District should examine.
  - "Motion": A "motion" is essentially a request for the delegation to agree to a certain course of action.
     Typically, any delegate can make this request by raising their placard or hand, being "recognized" or called on by the "chair" and preceding their request with the words "I move". Typical motions in the

context of a District Convention include:

- o "I move to open the floor for nominations"
- o "I move to close the floor for nominations"
- o "I move to adjourn the meeting"
- o "I move to accept the budget"
- o "I move to adopt the recommended amendments to the constitution"
- o "I move that a five minute caucus be granted"
  - § Some of these motions may be "entertained" or requested by the "chair"
- "Entertain a motion": The "chair" may say "I entertain a motion to....". This means that they wish for a delegate to make a particular motion. While there is no requirement that a delegate do as the "chair" asks, refusing to do so may hold up the item of business the "chair" wishes to forward. This motion, whatever it may be, will still be voted upon after it has been moved (and, if relevant, seconded), so the "chair" "entertaining a motion" does not mean that the item of business will be accepted in the fashion the "chair" has asked.
- o "Recognize": This may have two related meetings:
- o The "chair" may elect to "recognize" an individual. This means that they acknowledge them and wish them to speak.
- o The "chair" may elect to not "recognize" a motion. This means that, in the opinion of the "chair", the motion that has been made is either inappropriate or goes against the way the "chair" is choosing to run the meeting.
  - § For example, if a delegate says "I move to hold a 20 minute caucus", the "chair" can elect to say "I do not recognize the motion because a 20 minute caucus will put us severely behind schedule. However, I will grant delegates a 5 minute caucus."
- "Eligible candidate": An "eligible candidate" is any Brother who submitted complete materials to the Nominations Committee by the appropriate deadline. Any one of these Brothers can be nominated for and elected to District office.
- "Slate": "Slated candidates" are the eligible candidates who the Nominations Committee thought best suited for District Offices after reviewing the materials of all candidates and interviewing all candidates. These candidates are automatically nominated for the office. The group of "slated candidates" is often referred to as a "slate", as in "This is the slate that the Nominations Committee has agreed on".
- o "Electing the slate": "Electing the slate" means that you are accepting the recommendations of the Nominations Committee without alteration. You will not be able to nominate or elect any eligible

candidates who were not slated by the Nominations Committee

- "Opening the floor for nominations": Once the floor for nominations is open, any eligible candidate can be nominated for any office. A delegate can do so by raising their placard or hand, and, upon being recognized or called upon by the chair, say "I nominate Brother A" That candidate would then have the opportunity to accept or decline the nomination. If they accept, they will be a candidate that can be voted upon for the office. If they decline, they will not be.
- o "Closing the floor for nominations": This means that, once this motion passes, no further candidates can be nominated for the particular office.
- "Voting" or "Voting by secret ballot": Unless an alternate motion is made, elections will be conducted by secret ballot. The circumstances where an alternate motion may be made will be described below. If there is more than one candidate running for an office, no alternate motion will be recognized. This may be a written ballot, where you write down the name of the candidate of your choice, or an electronic ballot, where you utilize your phone or computer to cast your ballot. Regardless, your options on the ballot will be:
- o The names of however many candidates were nominated and accepted their nominations
  - § This includes "slated" candidates, as being "slated" functions as an automatic nomination
- o No
  - § This indicates you have no confidence in any of the nominated candidates
- o Abstain
  - § This indicates that you believe you have a conflict of interest that prevents you from casting a vote in good conscience. This vote will not be counted in the total
  - § For example, pretend there is an election with two and only two candidates and there are 14 voters
  - § Brother A is running against Brother B and Brother A gets 6 votes, Brother B gets 5 votes, and there are 3 absententions
  - § Brother A will win this election in this scenario because, while Brother A did not win 8 votes (the majority of the 14 total voters), since three voters abstained, their votes do not factor in the total, so Brother A did win a majority of the non-abstention votes (6 out of the 11).
- o A candidate must win a majority (50% plus 1) of votes, not a mere plurality (the "greatest" number of votes) If there are more than two candidates and no candidate wins a majority, the candidate with the

lowest number of votes will be dropped from the ballot and the remaining candidates will be voted upon again. This will continue until there are two candidates and one of them has achieved a majority

- § For example, pretend there is an election with four candidates and 20 voters
- § Brother A receives 5 votes, Brother B receives 5 votes, Brother C receives 6 votes, and Brother D receives 4 votes
- § Brother C has won a plurality (greatest number of votes, with 6), but not a majority (11) So, Brother D will be dropped from the ballot, as they had the fewest number of votes, and delegates will then vote again.
- § During the second vote, Brother A receives 7 votes, Brother B receives 7 votes, and Brother C receives 6 votes.
- § No candidate has achieved a majority, so Brother C will be dropped from the ballot, as they had the fewest number of votes, and delegates will then vote again
- § If, during the third vote, Brother A receives 11 votes and Brother B receives 9, Brother A will win because they have won a majority of votes
- § If, during the third vote, Brother A and Brother B both have 10 votes, the District President will vote to break the tie, and the winner will be whoever the District President selects. This is the only scenario where the District President will vote
- § If, during the third vote, Brother A wins 9 votes, Brother B wins 9 votes, and there are two "no" votes, no candidate would win, because neither has achieved a majority
- § It is within the Chair's discretion to request candidates vote again to allow for the election of a candidate by the delegates of the District rather than have an officer appointed without the say of the District
- § If the chair does not choose to do this or if they do, but the result is the same again, the position will be left vacant and be filled by your District's procedures for filling a District Officer vacancy.
- "Voting by acclamation" or "move to elect by acclamation": This may be used in situations where only one candidate for an office has been nominated once the floor for nominations is closed. However, its use is discouraged because a motion to elect by acclamation must be unanimous, thus is less likely to pass.
- "Voting by placard": If there is only one candidate for an office, an option would be to make a motion to "vote by placard". This means that, instead of a secret ballot, the election would be conducted the way that

other business at a District Convention is conducted, which is by raising their placard or their hand. This motion does not have to be unanimous. What will happen in this instance is the following:

- o A delegate will say "I move to elect (person) by placard."
- o If the motion is seconded, that motion will come to a vote
- o If that motion passes, or gets more than 50% of the vote, the candidate will be elected to the office
- "Voting on as a block": At a District Convention, there may be several amendments to the District Constitution that are recommended. If many of those amendments are either related or perceived as being uncontroversial, the recommendation made by the Jurisdiction Committee (the committee that is charged with reviewing the District Constitution and making recommendations on its changes) may elect to present their recommendations in one or several "blocks"
- If a motion is made to accept one of these "blocks", it means that every change within that "block" is being voted on at the same time. A vote to adopt these "block" changes means that every change within the block will be adopted. A vote to reject these "block" changes means that every change within the block will be rejected.
- o If changes are presented as a "block" AND a motion to accept changes as a block is rejected, then the individual recommended changes will be voted on on an amendment by amendment basis
  - § This will continue until all of the individual changes have been voted upon and either rejected or accepted.

#### Recommendation #11: Develop Standard Procedures to Allow For Remote Participation in Election Activities

- While Districts have understandable reasons for preferring candidates for office be in attendance at District Conventions, there may be reasons why candidates are not able to attend some or all of an event due to any number of reasons. In order to make this process as accessible to them as possible, we recommend that Districts develop standard procedures by which candidates can participate in any candidate speech, Q&A, or other activities at your District Convention and to publicize this ahead of time.
  - o This procedure should include recommendations for candidates participating as well, including, but not limited to:
    - § It is preferred that candidates participating remotely be in a quiet location to minimize background noise
    - § It is preferred that candidates participating

remotely utilize headphones or earbuds to improve their audio quality

 Districts may also consider holding these events prior to District Convention, both to save time during their in person event and to keep all candidates on an even playing field.

#### Recommendation #12: As Part of Planning for District Convention, Communicate to the VPP If You Wish To Have Electronic Balloting For Your Convention

- While Districts are not required to conduct their elections using electronic ballots, it is an option that some may choose to pursue in order to save time during their Conventions
- If you choose to exercise this option, please let the VPP know no less than two weeks before your District Convention so that the infrastructure for the election can be built
- If you choose to exercise this option, please also provide this information to the VPP as soon as it becomes available:
  - o Names of all eligible candidates
  - o Details on if specific candidates have stated they will decline nominations to specific offices
  - o The e-mail addresses of all seated delegates

## Recommendation 13: Survey Students About Their Feelings on District Office

- What is your knowledge of what DO's do?
- Have you ever thought about running for DO?
- If yes, why did you choose not to?
- If no, what would make you do it?

## Appendix F: District Convention Resources

#### Pre-Convention: Committee Reports and Meeting Practices

**Running District Convention Committee Meetings** 

- We strongly urge that all District Convention Committee meetings happen in advance of District Convention, as this frees up time for Brothers to participate in Convention and space for more Convention activities.
- Ideally, District Convention committees, committee chairs, and committee advisors would be designated at least two months before the start of your Convention
- This allows your committee to coordinate their meeting schedule and start meeting by no later than a month before District Convention (unless there are District specific deadlines that prevent you meeting on this schedule).
- For a further resource on running a committee meeting, please <u>go here for a document developed</u> by SWD Governor Lizzi Pineiro

#### **General Structure of Committee Reports**

While each committee report is slightly different, most follow a fairly standard format which you can utilize when writing up your committee's report:

- 1. Introduction
  - o A brief 2-3 line overview of the work of the committee would be appropriate.
- 2. Charges to This Year's Committee
  - o These will have been given to you by the previous year's committee and/or charges given to you by the District President.
- 3. Meeting Details
  - o How many times did the committee meet?
  - o What did the committee do?
  - o How did they address their charges?
- 4. What Is The Committee Recommending/What Are The Outcomes?
  - o Depending on the committee, this may include: constitutional amendments, final budget, nominations slate, or awards winners
- 5. Next Year's Charges
  - o These would be charges to the next year's committee and, if relevant, to the next District Council
- 6. Thanks
  - o This would include your committee members, your committee advisors, and, if relevant, other people who have helped with the work of the committee.
- 7. Conclusion
  - o Respectfully/Fraternally Submitted, (name), Chair (Year) (Committee)

## **Nominations Committee Report Best Practices**

The Nominations Committee has an extremely important role at District Convention, but one that has a lot of potential to create hurt feelings. While a competitive election will always have people who leave disappointed, here are a few recommendations to make sure that our candidates are treated with a maximum of respect while still fulfilling this committee's vital role:

- Focus your report on people who are slated, not those who aren't
  - o Doing so makes it so that the focus is a positive one and correctly directed towards those the committee has found qualified for office.
  - o If there are people who are not eligible due to not meeting requirements, it is advised not to mention these people by name to be respectful of whatever their situation may be.
    - § For example, if you have seven people who have submitted packets to run for District Office

and two of those people have not met the requirements for the office (i.e., they are missing a letter of recommendation), then it would be appropriate to say "We received seven packets and, of those, five met the requirements set forth in the District Constitution." No further information is necessary, as this indicates you fulfilled your role as a committee.

- If you decide not to slate anyone for an office or multiple offices, frame your decision in a way that makes clear why you have come to that decision, but still respects the efforts put in by candidates. Examples of how to frame this may include:
  - o "We believed that the candidate(s) did not address specific components of the role, such as.....
  - "We believed that the candidate(s) understanding of the role was incomplete based on our conversations with the current office holder and/or District Governors."
    - § While we want to make sure that we are electing good candidates to our District Offices, we also want to make sure that we do not potentially dissuade people from running due to fear of how they may be presented to the delegation.

#### **Preparation of Committee Reports**

Unless there are extenuating circumstances, all committee reports should be sent to the District Governors and committee advisors prior to being read at Convention. Doing so prepares these individuals for what will be said and how it will be presented.

## Pre-Convention: Determining AV Needs

Many of your speakers or sessions may require projectors or sound systems for their work at a District Convention. To ensure that set up of these items is as efficient as possible, speakers needs are met, and we are being as judicious with funds as possible, we would recommend the following:

- At least one month prior to District Convention, ensure that all speakers have been contacted to confirm whether or not they need AV equipment for their presentation
- For those that do require AV equipment, try to concentrate these sessions into as few rooms as possible
  - o This ensures that HQ can set up equipment once and not have to move it to different locations
- If you require more AV equipment than HQ has available, confirm with other leadership representatives what they may or may not be bringing in terms of AV equipment

## Pre-Convention: Nametags

Ensuring that participants in our convention feel appropriately recognized with appropriate nametags is a small, but vital part of District Convention. Here are some questions that should be addressed with your host Chapter or host team prior to District Convention:

• Who is printing and stuffing the name tags for attendees?

- Is your host Chapter/host team using the most up-todate list of registrants?
  - o If you are in doubt on what the most up-to-date list is, please contact events@kkytbs.org
- Do you have extra nametags to make for people who don't have one pre-made due to late or on site registration?

## **Convention: Care For District Council Members**

Being a member of the District Council can be incredibly stressful and we want to make sure that that stress is not exacerbated by hunger. So, the National Leadership Team, if possible, should try to coordinate meals for students servinging on the District Council, such as dinner on the Friday night of District Convention and lunch on the Saturday afternoon of District Convention.

#### Convention Business: Introductions, Delegate Seating, Reports, and Handling Constitutional Amendments/ Budget:

## Introducing District and National Leadership and Headquarters Staff

It is entirely appropriate and necessary to introduce members of the leadership and staff who are in attendance at your Convention. Individuals given an introduction may include:

- District Council
- District Governors
- National Council members
- Board of Trustees members
- Alumni Association Board of Directors members
- National Headquarters Staff
- Past National Presidents or Other Past Fraternity leaders

If you are conducting these introductions in your opening joint session, it is not necessary to repeat them in your opening separate session.

## **Delegate Seating Sheet**

We would recommend that you use <u>THIS</u> sheet to track your delegates for your Convention. You can use the following instructions to utilize it to the best advantage:

- 1. Make a copy of this sheet
- 2. Filter all tabs of the sheet for your District
- 3. Make sure you double check that it takes into account any new Chapters that may have been installed or Chapters that may have been closed.
- 4. If, at any point, you need to re-sort your sheet and need to return it to being in Greek alphabetical order, you can short "Column A" from smallest to largest to do so.
- 5. Update the "Proxy Sheet" with the proxy Chapters that a

Chapter has selected to sit for them in the event of their absence.

- 6. When you sit delegates in your respective sessions, make sure that you update column G, M, and Q with the name of the Chapter who is seated for a Chapter. For example, if Alpha is not present at your opening session, but Delta is the proxy for Alpha, make sure that "Delta" is entered into the respective cell in Column G.
  - 1. Doing so in this manner will help automatically update columns J, N, and R with the number of times that members of a Chapter have been seated as delegates. When three members of a Chapter have been seated as delegates, the cell will automatically turn red, which will signal you that the Chapter should not receive any further delegates
- 7. Please make sure that you re-check your list of Chapters in your delegation approximately three days before District Convention to account for any changes in Chapter statuses that may have occurred before Convention and which may impact what Chapters should be seated at your Convention.

## **Delegate Seating**

- Delegates only need to be seated in sessions where voting on business items will be occurring. These include:
  - o Accepting the minutes
  - o Accepting the budget
  - o Accepting constitutional revisions
  - o Elections
- If possible, after your first seating of the delegates, try to see if you can have them vote on multiple items of non-controversial business. This means that we can best utilize the effort expended in seating delegates and, hopefully, save time later in Convention. Things you can vote on during your first seating of delegates may include the minutes or actions prompted by committee reports.
- For the first session during which you are seating delegates, you would ask the following:
  - o "Is the delegate from Omega Omega here?"
    - § If they are, they will be seated for their Chapter
  - o "Is there a Life Member from Omega Omega here?"
    - § If there is, they will be seated for their Chapter
    - § Life Members can only sit for their own Chapter, not as a proxy for any other Chapter.
  - o If the Chapter has submitted a proxy form, you would say "Is there a Brother from Omega Psi present to sit for Omega Omega"
    - § If there is, they will be seated for that Chapter as a proxy.
  - o If the Chapter either has not submitted a proxy form

or all proxies for that Chapter are unavailable, you would say "As there are no members, Life Members, or proxies for the Chapter in attendance, we will seat a delegate for the Chapter through rotational seating" At this point, you would ask "Is there a Brother from Omega Phi available to sit for Omega Omega"

- § This will continue until there is a Brother available to sit for the Chapter
- § The "rotation" should be set based on where the previous District Convention left off. For example, if, at your previous District Convention, Omega Alpha was the last Chapter to be seated as a delegate through rotational seating, then Omega Beta would be the first Chapter you would call upon to sit as a delegate
- If separate sessions will be in the same room for the entire Convention, we would recommend instructing the Chapters to leave their placards on the table/chair in which they are seated, as that will make re-seating the delegates later on easier
- For any subsequent re-seating of the delegates, you can do the following:
  - o Ask "Can all delegates that were seated for their own Chapter in the previous session please take their seats in the delegation. This means that, if you're a part of Omega Omega, you were the delegate for Omega Omega."
  - o Starting with the first Chapter that does not have a seated delegate, ask "Has the delegate from "Omega Alpha" arrived?"
    - § If they have, they should be seated for their Chapter
    - § If they have not, the delegate who was seated for that Chapter during the previous session should continue to sit for that Chapter.

## **Voting on Committee Reports**

There is no need to vote to accept a report of a committee, as the report is simply a record of what the committee worked on and discussed. There may be a need to vote on specific items that come out of a committee, such as a budget or constitutional amendments, but these should be voted upon separately from the report itself.

Voting on District Officer/Governor Reports

As with the above note on Committee Reports, there is no need to vote to accept the reports of District Officers or Governors.

## **Committee Chair Motion Abilities**

If there are items that come out of a committee report that need action by the delegation, the chair of the relevant committee can make that motion. At that point, the President (or whoever is serving as the "chair" of the Convention) can solicit a second for the motion. At that point, discussion can be held, moderated by the District President and, at the conclusion of the discussion, a vote can be held.

#### **Approval of Constitutional Amendments**

- If possible/relevant, these should a) be e-mailed to or posted online for delegates prior to the delivery of the Jurisdiction report AND/OR b) displayed on a projector screen that delegates will be able to see during the period they would be voting on them. This ensures maximum knowledge on the part of delegates regarding what they are voting on.
- In addition, it is recommended that any changes to constitutional amendments be "tracked" using the "track changes" functionality in Google Docs or Microsoft Word. This ensures that delegates can see both the "old" verbiage in place and the proposed "new" verbiage easily.
- There may be several amendments to the District Constitution that are recommended. If many of those amendments are either related or perceived as being uncontroversial, the recommendation made by the Jurisdiction Committee may elect to present their recommendations in one or several "blocks"
  - If a motion is made to accept one of these "blocks", it means that every change within that "block" is being voted on at the same time. A vote to adopt these "block" changes means that every change within the block will be adopted. A vote to reject these "block" changes means that every change within the block will be rejected.
  - If changes are presented as a "block" AND a motion to accept changes as a block is rejected, then the individual recommended changes will be voted on on an amendment by amendment basis

## Approval of Budget

Similar to the comments on constitutional amendments above, this should be sent to delegates and/or projected in the meeting room so that the delegation has maximum visibility into what they are voting on.

## **District Convention Elections**

## **District Officer Elections: Terms**

In many instances, delegates may lack the knowledge of voting procedures and what they mean. The following are resources on how to educate the delegation if questions arise and how to deal with non-standard situations.

o "Chair": The "chair" is the person who is leading the meeting or presiding over the convention. Typically, this is the District President or, if the District President is either not present or unable to preside due to conflicts of interest, the District Vice President. In these instances, they may use the phrase "I yield the chair to...", indicating that, during that time period, another person is the presiding officer of the convention. While the "chair" does not vote (except in very limited circumstances described below), they

lead the meeting and guide the delegates through whatever business they have determined the District should examine.

- "Motion": A "motion" is essentially a request for the delegation to agree to a certain course of action.
   Typically, any delegate can make this request by raising their placard or hand, being "recognized" or called on by the "chair" and preceding their request with the words "I move". Typical motions in the context of a District Convention include:
- o "I move to open the floor for nominations"
- o "I move to close the floor for nominations"
- o "I move to adjourn the meeting"
- o "I move to accept the budget"
- o "I move to adopt the recommended amendments to the constitution"
- o "I move that a five minute caucus be granted"

§ Some of these motions may be "entertained" or requested by the "chair"

- o "Entertain a motion": The "chair" may say "I entertain a motion to....". This means that they wish for a delegate to make a particular motion. While there is no requirement that a delegate do as the "chair" asks, refusing to do so may hold up the item of business the "chair" wishes to forward. This motion, whatever it may be, will still be voted upon after it has been moved (and, if relevant, seconded), so the "chair" "entertaining a motion" does not mean that the item of business will be accepted in the fashion the "chair" has asked.
- o "Recognize": This may have two related meetings:
- o The "chair" may elect to "recognize" an individual. This means that they acknowledge them and wish them to speak.
- o The "chair" may elect to not "recognize" a motion. This means that, in the opinion of the "chair", the motion that has been made is either inappropriate or goes against the way the "chair" is choosing to run the meeting.
  - § For example, if a delegate says "I move to hold a 20 minute caucus", the "chair" can elect to say "I do not recognize the motion because a 20 minute caucus will put us severely behind schedule. However, I will grant delegates a 5 minute caucus."
- "Eligible candidate": An "eligible candidate" is any Brother who submitted complete materials to the Nominations Committee by the appropriate deadline. Any one of these Brothers can be nominated for and elected to any District office.
- o "Slate": "Slated candidates" are the eligible candidates who the Nominations Committee thought best suited for District Offices after reviewing the materials

of all candidates and interviewing all candidates. These candidates are automatically nominated for the office. The group of "slated candidates" is often referred to as a "slate", as in "This is the slate that the Nominations Committee has agreed on".

- o "Electing the slate": "Electing the slate" means that you are accepting the recommendations of the Nominations Committee without alteration. You will not be able to nominate or elect any eligible candidates who were not slated by the Nominations Committee
- "Opening the floor for nominations": Once the floor for nominations is open, any eligible candidate can be nominated for any office (again, an eligible candidate is anyone who the Nominations Committee has verified meets the qualifications for the office.). A delegate can do so by raising their placard or hand, and, upon being recognized or called upon by the chair, say "I nominate Brother A" That candidate would then have the opportunity to accept or decline the nomination. If they accept, they will be a candidate that can be voted upon for the office. If they decline, they will not be.
- o "Closing the floor for nominations": This means that, once this motion passes, no further candidates can be nominated for the particular office.
- "Voting" or "Voting by secret ballot": Unless an alternate motion is made, elections will be conducted by secret ballot. The circumstances where an alternate motion may be made will be described below. If there is more than one candidate running for an office, no alternate motion will be recognized. This may be a written ballot, where you write down the name of the candidate of your choice, or an electronic ballot, where you utilize your phone or computer to cast your ballot. Regardless, your options on the ballot will be:
- o The names of however many candidates were nominated and accepted their nominations
  - § This includes "slated" candidates, as being "slated" functions as an automatic nomination, though the slated candidate does still need to be asked by the Chair if they accept the slate.
- o No
  - § This indicates you have no confidence in any of the nominated candidates
- o Abstain
  - § This indicates that you believe you have a conflict of interest that prevents you from casting a vote in good conscience. This vote will not be counted in the total
  - § For example, pretend there is an election with two and only two candidates and there are 14 voters

- § Brother A is running against Brother B and Brother A gets 6 votes, Brother B gets 5 votes, and there are 3 absententions
- § Brother A will win this election in this scenario because, while Brother A did not win 8 votes (the majority of the 14 total voters), since three voters abstained, their votes do not factor in the total, so Brother A did win a majority of the non-abstention votes (6 out of the 11).
- § Abstain is NOT an option if there is only one candidate running for an office. In that situation, the only options for the delegate will be "Brother A" and "No."
- A candidate must win a majority (50% plus 1) of votes, not a mere plurality (the "greatest" number of votes) If there are more than two candidates and no candidate wins a majority, the candidate with the lowest number of votes will be dropped from the ballot and the remaining candidates will be voted upon again. This will continue until there are two candidates and one of them has achieved a majority
  - § For example, pretend there is an election with four candidates and 20 voters
  - § Brother A receives 5 votes, Brother B receives 5 votes, Brother C receives 6 votes, and Brother D receives 4 votes
  - § Brother C has won a plurality (greatest number of votes, with 6), but not a majority (11) So, Brother D will be dropped from the ballot, as they had the fewest number of votes, and delegates will then vote again.
  - § During the second vote, Brother A receives 7 votes, Brother B receives 7 votes, and Brother C receives 6 votes.
  - § No candidate has achieved a majority, so Brother C will be dropped from the ballot, as they had the fewest number of votes, and delegates will then vote again
  - § If, during the third vote, Brother A receives 11 votes and Brother B receives 9, Brother A will win because they have won a majority of votes
  - § If, during the third vote, Brother A and Brother B both have 10 votes, the District President will vote to break the tie, and the winner will be whoever the District President selects. This is the only scenario where the District President will vote
  - § If, during the third vote, Brother A wins 9 votes, Brother B wins 9 votes, and there are two "no" votes, no candidate would win, because neither has achieved a majority
  - § It is within the Chair's discretion to request candidates vote again to allow for the election of a candidate by the delegates of the District rather

than have an officer appointed without the say of the District

- § If the chair does not choose to do this or if they do, but the result is the same again, the position will be left vacant and be filled by your District's procedures for filling a District Officer vacancy.
- "Voting by acclamation" or "move to elect by acclamation": This may be used in situations where only one candidate for an office has been nominated once the floor for nominations is closed. However, its use is discouraged because a motion to elect by acclamation must be unanimous, thus is less likely to pass.
- "Voting by placard": If there is only one candidate for an office, an option would be to make a motion to "vote by placard". This means that, instead of a secret ballot, the election would be conducted the way that other business at a District Convention is conducted, which is by raising their placard or their hand. This motion does not have to be unanimous. What will happen in this instance is the following:
- o A delegate will say "I move to elect (person) by placard."
- o If the motion is seconded, that motion will come to a vote
- o If that motion passes, or gets more than 50% of the vote, the candidate will be elected to the office

## **District Officer Elections: Process**

- o While, depending on the number of candidates who are running for an office, it may be advisable to grant delegates a caucus to discuss their options with their Chapter, having open discussion on candidates as a delegation is discouraged.
- o It is discouraged as there is great potential for discord and unintended personal comments to come out in these discussions, and we wish to make sure that our elections are conducted in as respectful a manner as possible
- If there are questions around the rationale for why individuals were or were not slated for a particular office, they should be referred to the District Governors. It may be appropriate to announce this publicly so that students feel that their concerns are able to be heard.
- If you are conducting a question and answer session with your candidates, it may be best to collect questions from delegates ahead of time, perhaps by Google Form. This allows for better questions and for a more efficient use of time.
- o In the event that you have candidates running for office that are not able to be at District Convention, make sure that you are coordinating with those candidates on their availability for virtual Q&A

sessions or speeches (if relevant) and that you are set with both a Zoom for the candidates to participate in and AV capabilities to show the candidates' comments to the delegation.

- o In the event that a District President is running for re-election, the responsibility of "chairing" the Convention should be passed to the highest ranking officer on the District Council who is not standing for election.
- o If the District President wins re-election, they can resume the responsibility of chairing the Convention once their election has concluded. If they do not, the highest ranking officer should continue to chair the Convention as the District President would still be eligible to be nominated for other offices.
- o When delegates are instructed to fill out their secret ballot, they should be informed that the ONLY words that should be on the ballot are either "Candidate Name", "No" or, if relevant, "Abstain". Any other words on a ballot may risk invalidating it if the intent of the vote is unclear. So, delegates should not write things like:
- o "Candidate Name: No."
- o "Candidate Name: No Confidence"
- o "Candidate Name: Abstain"
- Ballots should only be distributed AFTER all nominations, discussion, and/or candidate comments have concluded
- o Ballots will be distributed by and collected by members of the National Leadership Team or the Headquarters Staff
- o Ballots will then be tabulated by National Council or Board of Trustees members in attendance
- o The result of the election will then be communicated to the District Governors, and they will inform the District President of the result
- o If there are one or multiple vacancies on the District Council at the conclusion of the election process, the District Governors will come up to speak about the process for filling these vacancies.

## **District Convention Activities**

#### **Ritual Preparation Tips**

- We strongly recommend that you hold a Ritual rehearsal prior to the performance of the Ritual at your District Convention. This can be either virtual or in person (though, even if you do a virtual Ritual rehearsal, we still recommend that you leave enough time in your schedule to do an in person walk through so that Ritual movement is appropriately coordinated.)
- Make sure that you leave sufficient time before the Ritual to appropriately set up the room.
  - o If you are utilizing recorded music in the Ritual, this is

particularly important to ensure that you have audio equipment appropriately set up in advance of the ceremony.

- Make sure that you designate ahead of time who will be pinning the individuals who are going through the Ritual.
- The use of electric candles is strongly recommended due to potential issues with potential hotel/conference center policies on open flames. However, if you are using an open flame during the Ritual, please make sure that the material you use to "catch" wax is not paper, as this could potentially catch fire. Items like <u>THIS</u> would be appropriate.
- Verify that the room space you have for the Ritual is sufficient, both in terms of being able to comfortably hold all participants and in terms of their being reasonable space for participants in the Ritual to navigate through without causing potential injury.
- If an ASL interpreter is part of the Ritual, make sure that they are positioned in such a way that they will be viewable by the spectators or participants that require their services.
- Make sure that you have identified and communicated with any individuals who will be admitting spectators into the Ritual room.
- Make sure you designate and reserve seating for all speakers engaged in the Ritual.
- Make sure you have a) designated space for membership candidates to congregate during your District Ritual and b) that you have designated a member of the National Leadership or Staff to spend time with membership candidates during your District Ritual. This can be as formal as a workshop and as informal as a "get to know you" session.
- Don't forget to make announcements instructing Brothers attending the Ritual to shut off their phones and all relevant alarms and to not take pictures of anything occurring in the room until after all Ritual materials have been put away.
- Make sure that you have a plan for putting away Ritual materials before any pictures are taken.
- Make sure you have people assigned to specific Ritual speaking parts or Ritual activities prior to the Ritual
- If the room you will be in has the capacity for you to use microphones, make sure that you have a plan on how to utilize them.

#### **Hymn Singing**

One of the most powerful parts of any Convention is the singing of the Fraternity Hymn, and we want to empower Districts to do this at any relevant juncture in the Convention. To maximize the amount of time we have to engage in singing, we would recommend that, instead of having Brothers "circle up" around the room, have Brothers gather in lines or around tables to sing the Hymn. The physical shape we're singing in doesn't matter; the emotional shape that singing puts us in is what matters.

#### **Music Hour Personnel**

Please make sure you coordinate with whoever is running your Music Hour activities ahead of time to make sure that they have the information they need to successfully run the activity. Ideally, this would happen at least a month ahead of time.

#### Back Up Plans For Spending Time During District Convention Business Sessions

It is always a pleasant surprise when we finish District Convention business in less time than we expect. While there is nothing wrong with giving students free time to enjoy the space the convention is in, there may be circumstances where, due to other sessions going on, we want to make sure students remain engaged in communal activities during District Convention. So, having a defined back up plan on how to spend extra time is advised. Activities to fill time may include, but are not limited to:

- Mini-workshops that leadership representatives in attendance can present
- Mini-sessions on Fraternity history that leadership representatives in attendance can present
- Icebreaker or team building activities that can engage the attention of students. Examples include:
  - o Bingo games designed to get people to meet each

other

- o Communal games like a rock, paper, scissors tournament
- o Activities that encourage students to show gratitude to other students

If needed, please coordinate with relevant National Leadership Team individuals to provide or facilitate back-up programming.

## **Banquet Running Order**

Please share your banquet script and running order with the National Council members who will be in attendance at your District Convention. They don't need to review or approve it, but it will be helpful to them in knowing when in the evening the awards presented by the National Council members of both organizations will be carried out.

## Appendix G: Resource for Leading a District Convention Committee

#### Meetings

- General Tips On Running a Committee Meeting
  - o Remember that your role as chair is to educate Brothers and facilitate conversation
    - § Take time to explain concepts to the committee that they may not understand and, if you don't understand them either, ask your committee advisor(s)

- § Explaining concepts ahead of time will help save you time addressing committee confusion.
- § With facilitating conversation, make sure that you're giving space for Brothers to speak, but keeping an eye on the conversation to make sure it doesn't get too far off topic or out of hand.
- § Your advisor(s) will also be able to help you with that, so utilize them!
- § If you don't know the answer, ask your advisor(s)! If they don't know either, say to the committee that you'll follow up with the information at a later date
- § It is never a good idea to give information that you're not sure is correct.
- Role of Your Committee advisor(s)
  - o Provide informational context if the committee doesn't have it
  - o Assist the Chair in making sure that committee conversation stays on track
- Before Meeting as a Committee
  - o Coordinate with your committee advisor(s) either via e-mail or via virtual meeting on the following:
    - § Expectations and goals for the committee
    - § Structuring of meeting agendas
  - o Introduce yourself to your committee members via e-mail, outlining the committee's work, and send out a Doodle poll to find a time to meet as a committee.

## **Meeting Timeline**

- Meeting #1
  - o Timeline: 4 Weeks before Convention
  - o Topics to Cover
  - o Introductions
  - o Review charges
  - o Communicate expectations
  - o Address any questions from committee members
  - o HOMEWORK: Send next two weeks' availability via Doodle Poll via minutes
  - o HOMEWORK: (this will depend on the committee) Review any relevant documents or applications
  - o CHAIR HOMEWORK: If your committee involves hearing presentations from other Chapters or candidates (i.e., Nominations or Awards), work with your advisor(s) on a plan to contact those Chapters or candidates for their availability and next steps
  - o CHAIR HOMEWORK: Contact eligible Chapters or candidates to gather availability via Doodle Poll
- Meeting #2
  - o Timeline: 3 Weeks before Convention

- o Topics to Cover
- o Discuss the outcome of the "homework" from the previous meeting
- o Follow up with any answers to questions from the previous meeting
- o If your committee work involves hearing presentations from other Chapters or candidates, finalize your schedule for these presentations
- o CHAIR HOMEWORK (If applicable): Communicate the presentation schedules with all committee members, advisors, and individuals giving presentation
- o CHAIR HOMEWORK: If you have finished discussing or fulfilling your charges for the committee, discuss charges for the next year's committee
- If your work may impact other committees, like Jurisdiction, discuss what may need to be sent over to those committees and coordinate with your advisor(s) to make sure that information is sent to the relevant people
- o If your work is completed:
- o Review final decision

#### My fellow brothers of Kappa Kappa Psi,

What follows is what I anticipate being my last report to the National Fraternity after more than two decades of leadership. There's always that temptation to focus on thank yous or to rattle off pages of charges or to settle some scores, but I am going to challenge myself to be brief (good luck with that) and to hope that I've thanked the people who have earned it in person, challenged generations of brothers to be better, and given the necessary people a piece of my mind. Instead, let me talk about where we've been and where we need to go and how we can support the Brotherhood as we figure out how.

The role of the IPP can be a difficult one because it is so different. You are no longer National President, so you go from being in the center of every conversation to the outside again. You are an advisor on the National Council, but you do your best work when you stay out of the way and let the current generation lead. It's no fun to go from the person who everyone asks to the person who waits to be asked - but that is the ultimate sign of respect and honor to the individuals in leadership. It may seem like you are shirking your duty by not being busy or taking invitations, but your duty is as the Council's cheerleader and guide, not trying to relive your time as a voting member. And that can be painful, I know it was for me. As a voting member of the Board of Trustees, you bring experience as the most knowledge person in the Fraternity at the end of your time in office about all aspects of the corporation. Getting everyone to respect your experience isn't easy, but the IPP must be confident that no one truly knows our organization inside and out as well as the person who just

#### finished leading it.

One major challenge in our organization that I faced as IPP is how we can be more welcoming of different opinions and folks with changing lives. When someone was heavily involved and then has new priorities, and therefore reduces their involvement, we act like they "quit" or "didn't live up" to expectations. That's toxic, but not unique to Kappa Kappa Psi. I see it in the corporate world all the time. We must be better at recognizing that involvement will change, Kappa Kappa Psi is not always top priority, and that someone who "fails" in a responsibility should lead us to one question "What's going on with them right now and where do they need help or support?". When someone pulls back, it is always connected to something else.

To be more welcoming is to recognize that right now we are an extrovert's fraternity, a "burn yourself out and take more on" fraternity, and an organization driven by personalities moreso than by good ideas. And we can do better at this by slowing down, listening to each other, and making contact; not by making assumptions, abandoning people who don't meet our immediate expectations, or talking behind backs and communicating passive aggressively. Unfortunately this is not unique to our chapters, it happens among the leadership too. The worst pain I feel as a Brother comes from memories of Brothers that chose to talk negatively about me to a large group or with me not in the room, but never once said the same things to my face. That was betraying our oath, but it was also a pain that never fully heals because it shows that you don't trust me and you don't know me, and that means I can't trust you and I don't want to know you. Candor needs to be personal before it is public and needs to be empathetic before it is direct. That's what makes us a Fraternity and not just some club or organization. We care about each other, or at least we took an oath to do so.

Communication is not just a buzz word; we honestly need to work on it every single day. Our communication as a Fraternity is focused on ourselves and not informed by what others want to hear. Are we posting online for our chapter or for a band member who isn't part of Kappa Kappa Psi? Are we considering how we look to an alum who wants to get involved again? To our director who wants to support us, but only sees a social organization that has nothing to do with bands online? When I talked with Brothers this biennium about our national Fraternity, I heard a lot of positivity about the individuals in our leadership, their hobbies and lives, and their individual work. But when I ask what is missing, brothers talk about where are the posts from our leaders talking about the work of other leaders, where's the celebration of our programs, and where is the reason I should stay involved or join Kappa Kappa Psi that is compelling and personal. These aren't hard messages, but they do require a shift in how we do our work. This biennium on the Board of Trustees, I saw this challenge start to be addressed by our Board Chair, Eric Morson, who worked hard to promote his fellow Trustees. He made sure every report included highlights from the lives of the other members of the Board of Trustees. I want to thank him for helping to guide us on this and on so much during this biennium.

As I close, I want to recognize four initiatives that I was a part of during my time in national leadership because I think they reflect the best of Kappa Kappa Psi and the challenges in the years ahead. As Alumni Association Board Chair, I submitted a proposal anonymously to create the status of "membership advisement" to recognize that chapters with perpetually low membership numbers need a different level of support and probably different resources, without being punished for that fact. Six years later we have a proposal to revise this status to "observation" and to address many of the errors in that first proposal, while also designing a program that is a better fit for the post-lockdown fraternity. That original proposal came from listening to brothers and trying to find a structural way to solve their problems. It wasn't perfect, but I didn't give up trying to fix it. We must always be iterating and fixing our work, taking risks, and doing what's right - even and especially if it means not taking credit.

As National VPCM, I took on the role of implementing the Road to Wisdom as our National Curriculum. I spent long hours figuring out how we do curriculum reviews, evaluate calendars, get an entire fraternity to change how it educates, and create a curriculum that is constantly improving and growing, not staying static. There are so many who should take a bow as we hit the six-year anniversary of its adoption and I hope we take time in the future to recognize the scope of the work that's been done and the incredible people who got us here. With the latest adoption of two new lessons and continued revisions to our materials, that vision of a "living" curriculum is still alive. I was honored to have our incoming President, Bang Co, reach out to me to talk about the early decisions we made with the curriculum and how we could continue to improve our process and make it easier for students in the future. I can't wait to see his leadership on this and many other aspects of our organization.

As National President, I made the hard call to hold off on implementation of the Founder's Circle because the developed online education materials were simply not ready for the Brotherhood. A series of PDFs and screenshots was insufficient for the virtual component of level 1 of the Founder's Circle. That was the level that we wanted every Brother to participate in, particularly since most of our Brothers will never see an in-person district or national convention. That decision did not make me any friends, but between COVID and getting the virtual component right and worthy of our brothers, it was the right call. I want to thank Mike Napolitano and Edward Savoy who have spent four years getting the Founder's Circle truly ready for the Fraternity. They will never get the credit they deserve for all the work they put in to make this happen for us, but they will always have my respect and gratitude. As an organization, I know this delay was frustrating, but ultimately worth it. Rather than choosing to publicly throw people under the bus for the original submission, we just worked the problem behind the scenes and ignored the insistence that a quick product release was better than an excellent one. The long efforts paid off and the Founder's Circle really is ready for you.

Finally, I have made our relationship with Tau Beta Sigma a

cornerstone of my time in office. Tau Beta Sigma is our peer, our equal. They deserve respect and honor for their work and sometimes that means Tau Beta Sigma comes before Kappa Kappa Psi. That's not failing in our duties as brothers, it is elevating what's best for Bands above what we think is best for ourselves. With our Sisters, we are best. I hope we continue to keep that in mind in the coming years. I thank my counterpart and confidant, Adrienne Rall, for all of her support and love and I thank the sisters of the Eta Gamma chapter of Tau Beta Sigma who will always be my home chapter along with Nu in Kappa Kappa Psi.

I head into a life without a Fraternal title with a lot of excitement. I have a dissertation to finish and a new home (our first as a couple) to buy and move into. I have a husband and a family who deserves more of my time and attention and a father who will finally get to see his son on his birthday for the first time in a decade. I have new hobbies to pursue: I'm making glass sculptures and artwork and writing and presenting publicly about being an employee-centered manager that embraces remote employees. I can finally make myself a priority. My mental health journey has brought me to a place where losing the focus on Kappa Kappa Psi means I have more bandwidth for learning to love myself and invest in my happiness. I love the mission of Kappa Kappa Psi and I love the work we do for the College Band Movement. I am never far and always available for a phone call or zoom because the fraternity will always be in my heart. Thank you for the support and love throughout my journey and for all you do, each and every one of you, for Kappa Kappa Psi.

## APPENDIX 34 – REPORT OF THE KK¥ BOARD OF TRUSTEES

#### Brothers,

The 2021-23 biennium began quietly for the Board, a welcome change from the hectic pace we faced during the COVID-19 pandemic. National President Jessica Lee's initiative to "Recharge The Brotherhood" was the guiding force behind our commitment to moving us back to a semblance of pre-COVID normalcy while defining our strategic path forward as an organization. Much of our focus centered on financial stability and how to guide us toward the perpetual financial strength that underpins our ability to serve our mission. We remain keenly aware of our responsibility to maximizing every dollar of dues and donations we receive.

The Board's activity included:

- Appointed Brother Tar-Shae' Odom to serve as National VPSA for the 2021-23 biennium, filling the vacancy left at the close of our 2021 National Convention.
- Voted unanimously to keep the National Shrine in its current location, rejecting OSU's proposal to move it to the Greenwood School of Music.
- Donated \$2,500 to the Melvin & Cathy Miles Endowed Fund, in recognition of Dr. Miles'"five decades of service to bands and his indelible impact on Kappa Kappa Psi."
- Appeals Received:
  - o Andrew Brown (Indefinite Suspension question)
    - § Referred issue back to National Council resulting in Andrew Brown and nine others being moved to Suspended status, then to Alumni status 6/1/22 with certain conditions.
  - o Lambda Eta Chapter
  - o Virgil Goodwine
  - o Samuel Bunch
- Appeals Process:
  - o Referred question of "Indefinite Suspension" language and its alignment with our National Constitution
    - § National Council concluded it does not align.
  - Addressed procedures for handling expulsion/ suspension appeals of actions taken prior to the institution of our appeals process
    - § Precedent set with this decision: We will hear appeals of National Council disciplinary decisions prior to the institution of our 2011 Appeals Process.
- Engaged in the strategic planning initiative with our National Leadership Team, led by President Lee.
- Jointly selected with TBS Board of Trustees the 2023 Hugh McMillen Society honoree:
  - o The Kappa Kappa Psi Alumni Association for their creation and advancement of the Max Mitchell NIB Grant Program
- 2021 National Convention Charges:
  - o Explore the idea of expanding of the Board of Trustees
    - § Unanimous decision not to expand size of the Board
    - § Unanimous decision to create an advisory committee for areas of expertise as needed to enhance and inform our work.
  - o Explore the idea of expanding/restructuring the National Council
    - § Unanimous decision to not expand or otherwise

change the National Council structure given current financial positions and concerns.

- We discussed the question: Should Band Directors be able to dictate which band classes students enroll in as a condition of various membership statuses?
  - o The Board concluded that Band Directors do have the authority to decide.
- Mu Kappa Epsilon @ University of Pittsburgh
  - o We concluded that members of both MKE and KKPsi must choose one or the other, as we are sworn to never join another college band fraternity.
  - o We further recommend adding language to new membership materials highlighting this point
  - o The Board will address copyright infringement if necessary
- Discussed Board actions that move our long-term vision forward
- Large dollar capital initiative with TBS will continue.
- Unanimously confirmed Brother Marina Peña Guiot as AABOD Chair for the 2023-25 biennium
- Chair Morson and Trustee James approached Atlanta Battle of the Bands
  - o We engaged with them about sponsoring the premier event in Atlanta.
  - o They are excited about partnering with us and look to start in 2024.
  - o Discussions will continue after National Convention.
- Appointed Vice Chair Lee to partner with TBS Trustee Adrienne Rall to oversee and direct the task of bringing our financial reporting up to date, explore the engagement of outside services, and evaluate personnel concerns.
  - o Hired CBEW to help bring all books current and coordinated with TBS.
  - o Engaged FSW&B to perform our financial review.

## Appendix A – Proposed Amendments to Alumni Association Constitution

• Recommendation: Amend Section 1.115 with the language below

Current: 1.115. This Constitution, as revised and amended, shall be reprinted following each regularly called National Convention of the Fraternity and shall supersede all previous Constitutions.

Amend: 1.115. This Constitution, as revised and amended, shall be reprinted following each regularly called National Convention of the Fraternity and shall supersede all previous Constitutions. The AABOD may, by unanimous consent, correct scrivener's errors, numbering, and formatting without requiring approval from the full membership.

• Recommendation: Amend Section 2.110 and Replace Section 2.111 with the following:

2.110 Each member of the AABOD shall serve for two four years, with each member's terms starting and ending at regularly called National Conventions of Kappa Kappa Psi. Any member of the AABOD may be reelected by members of KKΨAA for additional terms of service on the AABOD without limitation.

Strike: 2.111 If an incoming AABOD retains no members who served on the outgoing AABOD, the outgoing BOD will vote to select one of its members to serve as a non-voting advisor of the incoming AABOD throughout its term of service and to offer guidance to that AABOD in order to maintain continuity of leadership for KKΨAA.

Replace: 2.111 The four-year terms shall be staggered with half of the Board of Directors up for election each biennium. The position

of Chair and the duties and responsibilities for each member shall be assigned prior to the beginning of each biennium.

- AABOD.
- Recommendation: Define Roles for AABOD by amending Section 2.115

Current: 2.115. The Chair of the AABOD shall assign each member of the AABOD with specific duties and responsibilities for their term.

Amend: 2.115. The Chair of the AABOD shall assign each member of the AABOD with specific duties and responsibilities for their term. Such positions may include Finance Director, LAA Director, Membership Director, Communications Director, Programs/Professional Development Director, Awards Director, Outreach Director. At least one such director shall also serve as Vice-Chair.

• Recommendation: Replace 4.103 with the following:

Strike: 4.103 KKWAA provides a free period of provisional nonvoting membership to brothers upon their achievement of alumni membership in Kappa Kappa Psi, through graduation from their colleges and universities, as determined through appropriate reporting on the relevant Graduating Seniors Report and its commemoration on the Online Membership Reporting System ("OMRS"). The terms and period of such provisional non-voting membership in KKWAA is determined by the AABOD. Upon submission of required annual dues and/ or documentation, such provisional non-voting members of KKWAA shall become full voting members of KKWAA.

Replace: 4.103 KKWAA provides a free period of provisional non-voting membership to brothers upon their achievement of alumni membership in Kappa Kappa Psi, *as determined through appropriate reporting to National Headquarters*. The terms and period of such provisional non-voting membership in KKWAA is determined by the AABOD. Upon submission of required annual dues and/or documentation, such provisional nonvoting members of KKWAA shall become full voting members of KKWAA.

• Recommendation: Add New Article IX Language Below:

## IX Committees

9.101 There shall be five standing committees of the Kappa Kappa Psi Alumni Association. These shall be the committees on: Awards, Communications, Membership, Programs and Professional Development, and Revenue and Fundraising.

9.102 The Chair of the AABOD may, at their discretion, create ad hoc committees and appoint such members as necessary.

• Recommendation: Amend Section 2.102 to state:

Current: 2.102 The AABOD shall consist of eight (8) voting members. A member of the Kappa Kappa Psi Board of Trustees will serve as liaison to the AABOD and as an ex officio, nonvoting member of the AABOD.

Amend: 2.102 The AABOD shall consist of eight (8) voting members. A member of the Kappa Kappa Psi Board of Trustees will serve as liaison to the AABOD and as an ex officio, nonvoting member of the AABOD. *The National President, or their designee, shall also be an ex officio, non-voting member of the* 

# Appendix B – Proposed Amendments to National Constitution

### 1. Proposed Language

2.104: The National Chapter and all registered Life Members not otherwise represented under section 3.505, assembled in convention, shall elect as many at large members as required to fill expiring terms or vacancies on the Board of Trustees. The Chairperson of the Board and Vice Chairperson of the Board shall be elected by the voting members of the Board.

2.108 Each member of the Board of Trustees shall have one (1) vote at all meetings of the Board.

## Rationale on Proposal

Priority Proposal #1 from Kappa Kappa Psi Alumni Association Board of Directors

Precedent for Life Members to vote at a National Chapter meeting has already been given in 3.505.

Life Members of the organization have made a lifelong commitment to Kappa Kappa Psi. They believe in the ideal and purposes of the organization and want to see the Fraternity grow for another 100+ years. However, Life Members have very little say in fraternal business either in its programing or oversight. Currently, Life Members are only allowed to serve in limited capacity as a proxy for their home chapter at a district or national convention.

The Board of Trustees (BOT) are the governing body of Kappa Kappa Psi. As stated in 2.101 in the National Constitution, "...The Corporation shall represent all component parts of the Fraternity through its Board of Trustees. The Board of Trustees shall consider all issues of national policy, alumni, public relations, legal matters, and internal problems of the Fraternity, which are referred to it by the National Council or the Kappa Kappa Psi Alumni Association Board of Directors (in its administrative role over the Kappa Kappa Psi Alumni Association)....". The BOT are responsible for the long-term sustainability of the entire Fraternity but currently only a portion of the entire organization that they govern is able to elect these leaders.

Tau Beta Sigma has already instituted something similar with giving life members a vote in their Board of Trustees section 2.105 of their constitution: "2.105 Six members of the Board of Trustees shall be elected by the Life members of the Sorority prior to National Conventions to serve four (4) year terms. The terms shall be staggered so that the terms of three elected members expire in one biennium and the terms of the other three elected members expire in the following biennium."

We still believe that active members should have a vote in the Board of Trustees and therefore we are differing from TBS in that we want both Life Members and The National Chapter to have a vote in these elections.

We used the term "Registered Life Members" as we want to require these brothers to be registered and physically present

at conventions in order to be able to vote. Those not able to attend in person will be unable to vote. We want the voting Life Members to be actively engaged with the fraternity at the time of the elections and also encourage alumni brothers to attend national conventions and become a Life Member.

For section 2.108 - not sure why this is spelled out this way. We suggest removing part of it to prevent confusion for life members serving on the board of trustees on their ability to vote in Board of Trustee elections if the changes to 2.104 are passed.

#### 2. Proposed Language

6.513 Former active or associate members who are enrolled in school but do not pay member dues shall be classified as inactive members. Inactive members have no privileges of Fraternity membership. Inactive members may not participate in any Fraternity business, projects, or activities.

6.514 To obtain privileges of membership as an active or associate member, said member must request, in writing, reinstatement by the chapter at which they are requesting to become an active or associate member. Upon review of the inactive member's written request, the inactive member must receive a favorable vote of seventy-five (75) percent of the eligible voting membership, the approval of the chapter sponsor, and payment of all financial obligations to both the chapter and the Fraternity in order to be granted privileges of membership.

6.515 To obtain privileges of membership as an alumni member, said member must request, in writing, reinstatement by the Kappa Kappa Psi Alumni Association Board of Directors. Upon review of the inactive member's written request, the inactive member must receive a favorable vote of seventy-five (75) percent of the Kappa Kappa Psi Alumni Association Board of Directors and payment of all financial obligations to the Fraternity in order to be granted privileges of membership.

(Note: 6.514 and 6.515 proposed as additional text, not to overwrite. Current 6.514, et. seq. would be renumbered as needed)

#### Rationale on Proposal

Priority Proposal #2 from Kappa Kappa Psi Alumni Association Board of Directors

We want to update and separate this process for inactives based on the membership type they are looking to obtain.

For going inactive to active or associate, we want to leave that decision up to the active chapter that the member is looking to be involved with again rather than the chapter that they may have become inactive with. This helps possible transfer situations or leaves of absence from school situations.

From the alumni perspective, we would like to move the process from inactive to alumni to the AABOD and away from the active members. Some alumni seeking these changes in membership are well past graduation and have no personal connections with the active chapter and therefore they should not be the ones making those decisions.

Some members in the past have mistakenly been marked as inactive due to a lack of awareness/education of how to correctly fill out end of year forms to national headquarters. We have seen many instances where brothers were marked as inactive rather than alumni upon graduation.

These brothers are looking to get involved in with the National Alumni Association or a Local Alumni Association and therefore this type of membership change should be determined by alumni, not actives.

#### 3. Proposed Language

2.102. The Corporation shall be represented in all matters by a Board of Trustees comprised of six (6) voting members; five (5) members at large, and the Immediate Past National President. The current National President and the current Chairperson of the Alumni Association Board of Directors are ex officio, nonvoting, members of the Board of Trustees.

#### Rationale on Proposal

Priority Proposal #3 from Kappa Kappa Psi Alumni Association Board of Directors

Gives the Alumni Association more visibility within the organization as well as a voice to provide insight from the alumni association perspective to the board of trustees as they discuss matters association with the organization.

The Board of Trustees oversees both National Council and the AABOD with an ex officio non-voting member on each respectively. The National Council has the National President as an ex officio and non-voting member on the Board of Trustees and we are looking to make it the same from the AABOD as well.

Specifically for the AABOD, this insight allows the AA to help coordinate development activities, such as fundraising and giving drives, with the Board of Trustees. While this is their area of expertise, the AA has the outreach network to help the BOT implement such efforts among the alumni base of the fraternity.

#### 4. Proposed Language

3.102 The administrative body of the Fraternity between regularly called conventions shall be the National Council. The National Council consists of all National Officers, the Immediate Past National President (ex officio, non-voting), and the Chairperson, Board of Trustees (ex officio, non-voting), and the Chairperson, Kappa Kappa Psi Alumni Association Board of Directors and shall be absolute in power between conventions except as noted in Section 3.103.

3.210 The Chairperson of the Kappa Kappa Psi Alumni Association Board of Directors (AABOD) shall be selected by the AABOD and confirmed by a majority vote of the Board of Trustees. The AABOD Chairperson shall serve a term of two (2) years.

#### Rationale on Proposal

Priority Proposal #4 from Kappa Kappa Psi Alumni Association Board of Directors Many alumni have advocated for a greater voice of the Alumni Association in the business of the Fraternity. The "easiest" way to do this would be to give the Chair a vote on National Council.

Many votes of the National Council are directly related to areas where the AA has an interest. These can include disciplinary votes for alumni, awards to alumni brothers, and decisions regarding the management of the organization at HQ.

## Kappa Kappa Psi Alumni Association Brand:

Over the Summer Council meetings, the 2021-2023 AABOD set to work on defining a brand for the Kappa Kappa Psi Alumni Association. The branding effort was focused on building upon the vision/mission statements developed last biennium, with the goal of having a more "digestible" purpose that could more easily be marketed throughout the Brotherhood as a means of growing our membership. Additional information on the process can be found in Appendix I. The new KKWAA brand is:

## Connecting and Developing All Brothers for a Lifetime of Service

## Two-Year Goals for AABOD:

Each of the officers of the Alumni Association Board of Directors set forth goals for the upcoming biennium. The goals for each officer and charges for committees are included in Appendix II. The projected budget for the biennium was also developed, and is included in Appendix III. In the months ahead, the AABOD will select its eighth board member and will develop more refined action items to aid in meeting the described goals. Overall, priorities of the AABOD include expanding membership and fundraising while continuing to provide a high level of quality programming for alumni Brothers. Substantive new programs to launch include a Jazz Competition (similar in standing to the Biennial Solo Competition) and expansion of the Building Bridges, Building Brothers professional development program.

## Constitutional Amendments:

The AABOD also completed amendments to the Alumni Association constitution. These were mainly formed by current practice, and were also the result of approved amendments to the Kappa Kappa Psi Constitution. The AABOD is very thankful for the work of the National Chapter to ensure that the Kappa Kappa Psi Alumni Association and our component Local Alumni Associations were recognized in the National Constitution. A full description of the approved amendments can be found in Appendix IV.

## Approval of New LAAs:

Since the 2021 National Convention, three new LAAs have been approved. These include:

- Zeta Nu Alumni Association (Southern University)
- Eta Kappa Alumni Association (Albany State University)
- Greater Houston Area (Joint) Alumni Association

No LAAs have been deactivated since the 2021 National Convention. As of the 2022 Winter Council Meeting, there are 43 total LAAs, of which 6 are our District LAAs. A total of 9 LAAs, including 4 District LAAs are operated jointly between Kappa Kappa Psi and Tau Beta Sigma.

## Ongoing Activities: Alumni Forum, Fire-Psi-de Chat, and Awards:

Throughout the fall semester of 2021, the AABOD also continued its regular activities. These included solicitation of award nominees, hosting of a virtual alumni forum, and holding the first Fire-Psi-de Chat of the biennium. The Fire-Psi-de Chat focused on the impact that alumni have on Kappa Kappa Psi. Furthermore, several applications are now pending in the Awards Committee, and will be awarded in the upcoming quarter.

#### 2022 Membership Renewals:

Membership renewals have now occurred for the 2022 membership year. A table tracking membership numbers throughout the biennium is included below.

As of the 2022 Winter Council Meeting, renewals are lower than over the past summer, but are expected to increase. LAA roster reviews are underway at this time, which frequently drives renewals. The return of in-person district conventions should also aid renewals later this spring.

A push for late renewals will actively continue through January with plans for a February survey of those who did not renew their membership.

#### Quarter 2 Preview:

Looking ahead to the next quarter the AABOD aims to:

- Welcome an 8th Director to the Board of Directors, with a focus on alumni-centric outreach and philanthropic efforts
- Hold monthly Fire-Psi-de Chats from February through June, and hold our second virtual Alumni Forum of the biennium
- Work through our Kappa Kappa Psi Alumni Association committees to begin evaluating constitutional changes for the elections process, refining a formal proposal for a Jazz Competition, and continue fostering growth in membership and financial stewardship
- Complete the annual LAA renewals and review rosters in a timely manner
- Continue meeting director goals as stated in our two year goals
- Attend district conventions. support DAAs in convention programming, and promote the Brand of the Kappa Kappa Psi Alumni Association (see assignments in Appendix V)
- Convene at Summer Council as a whole AABOD, update two year plans as necessary, and present on accomplishments
- Continue to partner with our Sisters of the Tau Beta Sigma Alumni Association, particularly in regard to Conventions and LAAs

- Continuation of rolling awards, grants, and Fire-Psi-de Chats.
- Development of initial plans for a national alumni service event.
- Identification of opportunity to complete a Lesson 8 RTW update.

Membership renewals have now occurred for the 2022 membership year. A table tracking membership numbers throughout the biennium is included below.

As of the 2022 Summer Council Meetings and NLC Meetings, paid KKWAA Membership renewals are at a similar level to the 2021 NatCon membership numbers. The opportunity certainly exists to push this number higher, as our initial goal was to reach 300 full paying members this biennium. Excitedly though, our number of Life Members in the KKWAA has increased significantly–putting us on track to hit the goal of 700 Life Members in the KKWAA within this biennium.

## Membership Climate Notes:

Our Vice-Chair for Membership and the Membership Committee worked on developing a general climate survey for AA members. A total of 44 responses were received. Generally, responses were reflective of the composition of members, although respondents were likely among the more involved persons. Some programs and projects suffered from a lack of knowledge–making them a prime opportunity for further discussion. In general, our biggest feedback centered around the lack of a consistent and regular messaging strategy.

As part of a response to this, the AABOD hosted another regular forum, which we branded as a "Quarter Note Forum" to happen quarterly. This discussion was geared toward graduating seniors with a focus on ways to remain involved in the fraternity, and panelists of involved participants from across the AA were included. There may be more opportunities to coordinate this with the National Council going forward as it pertains to communicating volunteer opportunities. <u>This is a</u> <u>recommended point of collaboration for the 2023-2025 AABOD</u> <u>Chair and the 2023-2025 National President.</u>

## Changes in LAAs:

Since the 2022 Winter Council Meeting, one new LAA was approved:

 Delta Psi Alumni Association (Prairie View A & M University)

Three LAAs were deactivated due to insufficient membership numbers. These LAAs include:

- Lambda Alumni Association (University of Arkansas)
- Kappa Beta Alumni Association (Clemson University)
- Gamma Omega Alumni Association (Texas Southern

## University)

As of the 2022 Summer Council Meetings, there are 41 total LAAs, of which 6 are our District LAAs. A total of 9 LAAs, including 4 District LAAs are operated jointly between Kappa Kappa Psi and Tau Beta Sigma.

## Notes from District Conventions:

Alumni participation was strong throughout the six district conventions held this spring. Generally, life and alumni members accounted for around 20 percent of all brothers in attendance, making them an important presence at conventions. With that said, conventions were sometimes a bit bumpy for alumni members. Undoubtedly, this is due in part to the relative "newness" of district conventions after a lengthy hiatus. Below are some additional notes from the alumni that will help improve the experience for alumni and active students alike.

- **General Scheduling:** Alumni typically build our schedule off of the Active's schedule and once their schedule is complete. Typically, alumni will try to avoid scheduling against the music hour, lunch breaks, rituals, etc... If active schedules are significantly later than their deadline, this causes a domino effect for alumni. Solidifying times early (especially for large and joint blocks of convention) will make our lives easier while hopefully also improving convention for students too.
- **Room Scheduling:** As has previously been the case, there is an expectation that alumni have a room in which to meet during convention. This should be properly prioritized behind the needs of the students, but it is still quite important for us. Ideally, this room is the same room for most of the convention (or at least longer uninterrupted blocks), as our timeline doesn't always align perfectly with the track for active members. Internet access and A/V access will almost always be required for Alumni. If we need to bring this ourselves, we just need to know about a week in advance so that we can do it.
- Alumni-Led Activities: If the District Council or Governors want the Alumni to lead part of convention, it is ESSENTIAL that alumni be told of their expected involvement prior to the convention weekend. Simply put, when alumni are put on the spot to do something unexpected, students receive a subpar convention

experience while alumni volunteers are subjected to additional stress.

• **Pre-Convention Correspondence:** As correspondence goes out to active members of a district prior to registration for convention opening, it should also be made available to alumni members. The AABOD can assist with this as needed. Of particular importance for alumni is making hotel reservations; and with enough lead time, Alumni can help make sure that we're meeting any required minimum expenditures.

#### Regular Business for Spring 2022:

Throughout the spring semester of 2022, the AABOD also continued its regular activities. These included solicitation of award nominees, selection of two additional professional development grant recipients, and continued Fire-Psi-de chats of the biennium. Topics of the chats included a Women's History Month forum of band directors and a recognition of previous fraternal award recipients. Looking forward, a new professional development committee will benefit the AABOD in scheduling unique topics and managing the mentorship program. The Program Evaluation committee completed its review of the old mentorship program this biennium and has transmitted recommendations to the Professional Development Director to aid in its future growth and management.

The opportunity also exists for work that will expand the Building Bridges, Building Brothers program to leadership development more broadly and to fraternal leadership in the organization. Over the Summer Council Meetings, it is a hope that this can be further discussed, so that we can more effectively deliver quality programming to our members.

#### Preview for Quarter 3:

Looking ahead to the next quarter the AABOD aims to:

- Hold monthly Fire-Psi-de Chats from September through December, and hold another Quarter Note Forum during the Fall 2022 semester.
- Continue working through our committees to propose constitutional changes for the elections process by the 2023 Winter Council Meeting.
- Publicize the timeline and process for 2023 AABOD elections.
- Implement the proposed Jazz Competition, pending approval.
- Begin planning for events and activities surrounding the 2023 National Convention.
- Through our Programs Evaluation Committee, continue work that evaluates the general effectiveness of current programming, including especially the reflections of diversity, equity, and inclusion in our work.
- Improve efforts to work through our Communications Task Force, Revenue and Fundraising Committee, and the new Professional Development Committee.
- Continue to partner with our Sisters of the Tau Beta

Sigma Alumni Association, particularly in regard to Conventions and LAAs

- Support the broader strategic planning efforts of the National Council, National Chapter, and Corporation of Kappa Kappa Psi
- Continue fostering growth in membership and financial stewardship.

#### Requested Actions for Summer Council Meetings:

The AABOD looks forward to meeting with members of the National Council and Board of Trustees at the 2022 Summer Council Meetings. Specifically, the AABOD is requesting action on several proposals:

For the Board of Trustees:

 Approval of the proposed Jazz Composition Competition to occur at the 2023 National Convention in Orlando, FL (see Appendix A).

For the National Council:

- Approval for the AABOD to work with the Curriculum Committee on rewrites to Lesson 8 of the Road to Wisdom. (see Appendix B)
- Approval for the AABOD to work with the National Council to develop a national service project for Alumni Brothers, and possibly also with Active Brothers.

#### <u>Conclusion</u>

As we move into the second half of this biennium, I remain shocked at how quickly time has moved thus far. Our alumni have remained increasingly involved in the Fraternity over the past year, and I believe prospects for continued alumni participation are strong. It continues to be an honor to serve the membership of our fraternity, and the AABOD remains fully committed to supporting the work of the National Council, National Chapter, and Corporation of Kappa Kappa Psi.

- Award of 18 Max Mitchell Grants for NIB participants

Additional information about the ongoing activities of the AABOD can be seen in the following sections of the report.

## 2023 Membership Renewals:

As of the end of the biennium, paid KKWAA Membership have ended at the same level as during the 2021 National Convention cycle. As a result, our membership numbers have fallen below our goals, which is somewhat disappointing. With that said, our success continued to be adding new Life Members to the KKWAA. In total, Life Membership was more than 23 percent higher this biennium, demonstrating an increasing commitment to the ideals and purposes of the Fraternity. As our final financial numbers come in for the biennium, it appears that this commitment will be obvious in terms of our financial health, even as Life Members are not required to pay annual dues. So long as this continues, the AA may be able to keep membership free for Life Members. A table tracking membership numbers during the biennium is included below:

## Changes in LAAs:

Since the 2023 Winter Council Meeting, no LAAs have been deactivated, and one new LAA has been approved:

• Eta lota LAA (Bethune Cookman University)

As of the 2023 NLC Meetings, there are 42 total LAAs, of which 6 are our District LAAs. A total of 9 LAAs, including 4 District LAAs are operated jointly between Kappa Kappa Psi and Tau Beta Sigma. This represents a fairly even level of activity in LAAs, and would hopefully be indicative of strengthening local groups. It is our hope that future LAA Directors can work more on growing our LAAs and less on OMRS issues, making the upcoming launch of OPUS quite exciting for us all.

## Preview of National Constitution Proposals:

The KKWAA is proposing several changes to the National Constitution. It is our hope that these will be heard by the Jurisdiction Committee and evaluated by the membership. These include:

- Life Member Vote for Board of Trustees
- Streamlining of Inactive Member Reinstatement
- AABOD Chair as Ex Officio on Board of Trustees
- Vote for AABOD Chair on National Council

Requested Actions for Summer 2023 NLC Meeting:

The AABOD looks forward to meeting with members of the National Council and Board of Trustees at the 2023 National Convention in Orlando! As we reach the end of the biennium, we have only one formal request before the biennium ends, but several more recommendations that may be helpful for the continued efforts of the organization.

Regarding specific approvals for the Board of Trustees and National Council:

 Request approval to move forward with promotion of a Jazz Composition Competition to be held at the 2025 National Convention in a similar manner to the Biennial Solo Competition. (This is to supplement, not replace the Solo Competition) collaboration will include:

- Coordinate volunteer recruitment between the 2025-2027 AABOD Chair and 2025-2027 National President to ensure that members are aware of all committee service opportunities and so that no individual volunteers are overcommitted.
- Continue to move forward with implementation of updates to Lesson 8 in the Road to Wisdom, focusing on a Lifelong Commitment. The failure to complete this this year is one of my biggest regrets, and I hope we can find ways to move this forward.
- Ensure close partnership between the National Council, Board of Trustees, and Alumni Association Board of Directors regarding the development of Alumni Leadership Development programs. This is a revolutionary way to develop a pipeline of leaders, but it will take a solid team dedicated to the project.
- Partner on the continued roll out of OPUS so that additional value adds can be implemented to serve both our alumni and broader organizational needs.
- Continue working with the Board of Trustees to better coordinate fundraising and outreach efforts across the Fraternity.

#### Conclusion

I am quite grateful for the opportunity to work with all of you over the past two years. We have continued opportunities for growth and development, and I believe we will be successful in this regard. It has been an honor to serve the membership of our fraternity, and the AABOD remains fully committed to supporting the work of the National Council, National Chapter, and Corporation of Kappa Kappa Psi. # Appendix H – Final Report of the Program Evaluation and Development Committee

Brothers of Kappa Kappa Psi,

This past biennium the Programs Committee were charged with the following:

- Review existing KKWAA programs for effectiveness
- Provide recommendations on ways to enhance existing programs
- Review existing KKWAA activities for representation of fraternal diversity
- Evaluate proposals for new alumni programming
- Suggest topics of interest for professional development and conventions
- Study potential constitution changes to the election process for the AABOD. Specifically:
  - Should the AABOD institute a Nominations
     Committee for elections / Should other
     improvements be made to the process of getting to
     know the candidates?
  - Should the AABOD Chair be identified prior to the Election? / Should Chair candidates run separately? Alternatively - are there other recommended changes that will aid in continuity between biennia?

Our committee agreed that over the the biennium it would be most beneficial to break down each charge and focus on them individually. At times, our committee separated into sub committees to help delegate the workload evenly among the brothers.

## Charge 1: Review existing KKΨAA programs for effectiveness

The programs committee was charged with reviewing the current AA programming for the effectiveness of each program. To review the programs, we focused on the following programs with a committee discussion:

Scale on evaluation:

  - 1. Building Bridges Building Brothers Professional development 2

    - § Some of the awards feel like they're for older alumni, not more recent
    - § Highlight more than just when it's NatCon season
  - o Professional Achievement Award (ROLLING)- (2's and 1's, one 3)
    - § This is the one for the Encore
  - o Brent Cannon Music Ed Achievement Award (ROLLING) - (mix, around 2)
- o Feedback
  - o Younger alumni not as invested because process is difficult and more geared towards older alumni
  - o Like having to get a resume for someone that you want to nominate
  - o Are nomination letters sufficient or do you NEED a resume
    - § Ex: Brent Cannon Award
    - § Can't get a recommendation letter from an administrator for someone retired and/or deceased
  - o Try to figure out better ways to nominate people without having to jump through extraneous hoops
- 3. Service Grants/Programs
  - o Biennial Solo Competition (mix, around 2)
    - § Administered by AA but geared towards actives
  - o NEW Jazz Composition Competition
  - o Max MItchell NIB Grant Program (mostly 2's and 3's)
  - o Matching Grants Program (mostly 2's and 3's)
  - o Kappa Kappa Psi Giving Program (mostly 3's)

Overall, effectiveness of Programs are mid-range. Programs would highly benefit from minor enhancements. One issue the committee addressed is the necessity for a more effective organization of programming. Knowing which individual director/committee are directly in charge of these programs will be extremely helpful with maintaining and enhancing these programs.

## Charge 2: Provide recommendations on ways to enhance existing programs

The following is a list of the enhancements we recommend.

- 1. Building Bridges Building Brothers/Professional Development
  - 1. We recommend marketing the BB/BB Program as the official Professional Development Program of the National Alumni Association.
  - 2. The Committee developed a new and improved mentorship program this biennium. Until it runs, we do not have any recommendations at this time.
  - 3. The **Fire Psi-de Chats** Program is a program that we think has great potential to grow. Our recommendations are:
    - 1. Creating a form for ideas/topics for alumni members to submit.
    - 2. Increasing presence/consistency by:
      - 1. Advertise for Fire-Pside-Chat starting at least one month prior.
      - 2. Schedule monthly chats.
      - 3. Having a planned out calendar 2-3 months in advance.
      - 4. Bringing in new/different voices and different topics.
  - 4. This program should be open to both active and newer alumni.
  - 5. Making these chats available to the public through:
    - 1. Creation of a library of past chats.
    - 2. Availability on AABoD website.
  - 6. These would make these chats more accessible to newer alumni and/or alumni who were not able to go to the originally scheduled chat.
- 2. Service Grants/Programs
  - For the **Solo Competition**, we recommend increasing advertisement and information about the program. Beyond this, we have no enhancements to the program itself to recommend at this time.
  - 2. For the **Max Mitchell National Intercollegiate Band Grant**, we recommend the following:
    - 1. Enhancement of the marketing of the grant.
      - 1. This involves reaching out to the Directors of Bands and Sponsors, even to colleges and universities without KKPsi or TBS chapters.
      - 2. This can be done in part by utilizing the DoB/

Sponsor Task Force to reach out to directors, as well as the alumni Communication Task Force.

- 3. Simplifying the application process.
  - 1. Currently, the application involves writing several essays. This can be a turn off to students when submitting their applications.
  - 2. We recommend changing these essays to be less formalized, allowing for bullet point submissions.
- 4. Making sure people know NIB is free to participate.
  - 1. We also recommend re-evaluating the program after 3 more NIB cycles, allowing for the grant to reach more people and have more feedback.
- 5. For the Matching Grant Program, we recommend the following:
  - 1. Clarifying the website, making it easier to find information.
  - 2. Fixing the application process to be more streamlined.
  - 3. flow charts/Youtube tutorialClarify website, making it easier to find information
  - 4. Fixing process to be more streamlined.
  - 5. Creating flow charts or a YouTube tutorial to assist those interested in applying.
    - 1. This could also come in the form of a handbook, describing what criteria makes for a successful application.
  - 6. The option for reimbursement, as many brothers are not aware of this grant and often find out after the fact.
- 6. For the **Kappa Kappa Psi Giving Program**, formerly the Alumni Giving Program, we recommend the following:
  - 1. Better advertisement.
    - 1. Utilize Giving Tuesday and late December giving (last week of the year).
    - 2. Giving Tuesday involves reaching out to the TBSAA to collaborate appropriately, as Giving Tuesday is their idea.
    - 3. Use multiple advertising platforms.
  - 2. Improvement with involvement.
    - 1. Add ways to give on a mobile platform, as many brothers use their phones more than a physical computer.
      - 1. This can also increase donating from younger brothers.
      - 2. Generation of QR codes to fill out on phones.
      - 3. Highlight Stories: Why do brothers give?
  - 3. People who have received life membership

through giving program

- 1. This can create content for YouTube page as well!
- 7. For **Professional Development Grants**, we recommend the following:
  - 1. Fixing discrepancies in word counts throughout the application.
    - 1. Agree on one word count
  - 2. Effectively communicating with the applicants
    - 1. Creating more efficient timelines, increasing communication between the applicants and the evaluators.
      - 1. Allowing for applicants to know where in the process their applications stand
  - 3. Feature Past Grant Winners
    - 1. Show benefits from grants
  - 4. Increase Engagement
    - 1. Clarify these grants can be utilized by non music majors/ professions.
    - 2. Highlight on social media/Encore
  - 5. Discrepancy on name
    - Online, this grant is referred to as Professional Development Grant and Building Brothers Building Bridges.
      - 1. Clarity on name, recommend Professional Development Grant.
      - 2. Building Bridges Building Brothers as name for Professional Development Programming
    - 2. Will make it easier to find information about if under one name

## Charge 3: Review existing KKΨAA activities for representation of fraternal diversity

The EC of the programs committee held a discussion with Donald Lee. A big take away from this discussion that the DEIA Task Force does not focus on alumni but rather actives. After our discussion, we agreed we will form a small group within our committee of DEIA trained individuals that will pre screen any program proposals. Then the entire committee will discuss the proposal.

Evaluate program proposal- proposals come in anonymous, Chris and team with pre filter to help eliminate possible implicate bias. When ready they will push to whole committee to be evaluated.

Otherwise constantly reviewing for diversity, opens question for DEIA task force to either a) open to alumni programming b) KKWAA having a chair perform DEIA tasks, c) Programs committee become appropriately trained for DEIA discussions

## Charge 5: Suggest topics of interest for professional development and conventions

Throughout the 2021-2023 biennium, our committee was eager to help with programming for both District and National Conventions. This programming included both professional development, social activities, and developing workshops. Below is a summary of the committee's notes and discussions.

#### 1. District Conventions

When it comes to District Convention Planning, we advise the AABOD to allow for the respective DAA to take lead in planning programming and workshops. If the DAA councils request help with programming, workshops, or funds, we advise the AABOD to offer appropriate guidance, through communication of the LAA chair. We also advise that for District Conventions, the AABOD be allotted at least one workshop as well as a business session/townhall. This workshop can be utilized throughout all six District Conventions for that year if need be.

#### 2. National Convention

In contrast when it comes to National Convention Planning, we advise the AABOD to take lead in planning programming, workshops, and social activities for the Kappa Kappa Psi Alumni. With proper communication with the Board of Trustees, and National Council, we believe the AABOD will continue to foster a positive convention experience for our alumni brothers.

#### 3. Alumni Feedback

The committee consists of a handful of diverse, dedicated, and committed brothers from our fraternity. However, we agree and understand that our voices are only a small portion of our Alumni Association. We encourage the AABOD to send out requests for feedback on programing and workshops the alumni association are interested in. Over the last two biennium the committee has been developing a Program Proposal System. This will allow brothers of the Alumni Association to suggest and request programming. The committee will be prepared to review the proposals and approve/create or deny said programming.

#### 4. National Convention Suggested Programming

## Charge 6: Study potential constitution changes to the election process for the AABOD.

#### Should the AABOD institute a Nominations Committee for elections / Should other improvements be made to the process of getting to know the candidates?

Should there be a Nominations Committee, we advise that it reflects the diversity of the Association in all aspects. Examples of representation to consider include but are not limited to LAAs (chapter and region), DAAs, Life members, committee involvement, Association experience, recent alumni, geography, personal identity. Consider the structure and operation of the Fraternity's Nominations committee.

Process of getting to know candidates

- Interviews (virtual) for specific chairs that are running
  - o We recommend that candidates declare a chair position(s) for interest
  - o Structure interviews according to those interests
  - o Provide recordings to be posted to
- Candidate Forum(s) prior to election
  - o Virtual calls or async posts/comments facilitated/ moderated by the Association
  - o Do these after the interview recordings are posted and have been available for a reasonable period of time
  - o Avoid covering platforms here; do that in the interviews
- Aim to be similar to the Fraternity
- Establish these methods as explicit requirements for the Nominations committee to implement
- 1. Should the AABOD Chair be identified prior to the Election? / Should Chair candidates run separately? Alternatively - are there other recommended changes that will aid in continuity between biennia?

The Programs Committee agreed that the AABOD would benefit from establishing declared positions on the Alumni Board. Having these established director's positions will help with transitions between the bienna. The committee also proposes that the AABOD mimic the Chair position to National Leadership, in that the Vice Chair (if elected/slated from the membership) will be promoted to Chair similarly to the VPME and National President.

- Vice Chair elevated to Chair by membership vote. Remaining positions (including Vice Chair) have open candidacy.
  - o If Vice Chair is not elected from membership vote, allow for election for chair
- Candidates declare interest in particular Chair position(s) (not restricted to what they declare, just focused on qualifications)
- Stagger six Board positions: half up for election at one time to maintain continuity. Process to begin the rotation and which positions are first are up for determination
- Vice Chair up for election every rotation (since Chair only serves once; see below)
- Consider restricting Vice Chair candidacy to previous Board members or other similar experience

## Appendix I – Final Report of the Vice-Chair for Member Engagement

Brothers of the Alumni Association,

It has been an incredible honor serving as your 2021-2023 Vice Chair for Member Engagement. I have enjoyed working alongside and learning from some of the most passionate leaders and brothers. Above all, I appreciate that this role allowed me the opportunities to engage with and listen to the many voices of our alumni brothers from districts beyond my Southeast District home. Those voices were heard in our monthly Board of Directors meetings where we all took our members' feedback seriously by often having important conversation to implement some necessary improvements.

For the Month of Musicianship in November 2021, I wanted to use the opportunity to engage our members on the KKPsiAA Slack channel while collaborating with our Communications Director. With music being a common factor that ties us all together as brothers, I posed the following question on our Slack channel: How have you remained involved with music as an alumni brother? This prompted some engagement in the form direct responses that also led to further conversations in and out of the publication thread. Responses were then spotlighted across our KKPsiAA social media platforms. Not only did this bring some engagement to our Slack channel, but we also saw involvement from different brothers who have no previously participated as frequently as others. While this engagement activity did not drastically improve engagement on Slack, it still provided a new avenue for a different group of alumni brothers to remain engaged in their own way.

Throughout the 2021 National Convention, I heard many questions from both active and alumni brothers regarding alumni status and the KKPsi Alumni Association - particularly about membership. This observation led to a "Kappa Kappa Psi Alumni Association Membership FAQ" social media series that also served as membership renewal reminders throughout renewal season in December 2021. Questions included: "I graduating in Spring 2021. Do I need to renew my Alumni Association membership right now, too?", "How do I get provisional complimentary Alumni Association membership after I graduate?", "What are my options if I'd like to ontinue staying involved but on a more local level?", "How do I find out if there's a Local Alumni Association nearby?", "I'm a Life Member. Do I need to renew my Alumni Association membership?", and "What are some of the benefits of having Alumni Association membership?" The questions were selected based on questions I heard most often at the previous National Convention and throughout the membership renewal season.

One of my biggest biennium goals was to create opportunities for our members to be able to voice their opinions and have constructive conversations. Before this biennium, alumni brothers usually had to wait for a district or national convention town hall type of meeting to have conversations on topics that are important to them. That led to the creation of the Quarter Note Forums, where the format could sometimes include panelists, but the sole purpose was to create a safe space to have those necessary conversations with our members. Additionally, it provided more opportunities for the KKPsiAA Board of Directors to interact with our membership outside of convention season.

The Quarter Note Forum would not have been possible without the hard work of our Membership Committee - one of our newest committees of the biennium. The committee members were committed to creating a good foundation of programming and providing recommendations to the Board of Directors based on membership feedback plus their own personal experiences. In addition to the Quarter Note Forums, the committee and I worked to also provide the following programming: New Year, New Bros, climate surveys, Brothers at the Ballpark, and a NatCon Hype Challenge. While I found it important to receive feedback from our general alumni membership twice this biennium, I also created a climate survey specifically for our committee volunteers to complete at the end of this biennium. The work our committee volunteers do is vital to the success of our organization, so it was important to me that we included their feedback in our National Leadership Conference meetings in Orlando. I also often shared the most up to date membership data covering the various membership tiers with the committee so that we could discuss any noticeable trends throughout the biennium and recommendations for the Board of Directors.

Having the opportunity to travel and serve as a representative of the Board of Directors was an experience that I did not take for granted. In 2022, I traveled to San Antonio, Texas as a representative for our Fraternity and the Board of Directors at the Texas Music Educators Association. It was my first time being at a major conference within the Southwest District and one of the biggest highlights of the biennium. Becoming acquainted with music education in the southwest while getting to meet many Kappa Kappa Psi active, soon to be graduating seniors, and alumni brothers was a very eye opening experience. For the first time, I was able to attend two district conventions outside of the Southeast District: the Western District Convention in 2022 and the Northeast District Convention in 2023. Both the Western and Northeast District Alumni Associations were incredibly welcoming and had excellent district convention programming programmed for their membership. Thank you so much to all the brothers and sisters who welcomed me to their district and were willing to share their personal and fraternal stories with me. I hear you and will continue to serve you all to the best of my ability.

To Miranda Cook, I am so excited that you are returning to the AABOD for the 2023- 2025 biennium as a Director and my incoming Vice Chair of Membership. You have such an unswerving dedication to our alumni brothers and your vision for this role excites me. ## Appendix J – Final Report of the Membership Committee

Brothers of Kappa Kappa Psi,

I am pleased to present to you the 2021-2023 Membership Committee Report. The Membership Committee was a brand new committee formed during the Fall of 2021 after the KKPsiAA Committee Volunteer application had closed. Our Vice Chair for Member Engagement, Marina Peña Guiot, put out the call for volunteers to join this committee and several brothers excitedly answered the call soon after the application was made public. Our first Membership Committee meeting occurred shortly before the busy membership renewal season, all members used this time to get to know each other, brainstorm ideas for our collective vision for the committee, and had necessary conversations with regards to the climate of many alumni experiences.

To increase meeting productivity, the committee later agreed to have general committee meetings every other month and have subcommittee meetings during the months in between. Members were divided into two subcommittees: Networking and Recruitment and Retention. The role of the Networking Subcommittee was to focus on the Quarter Note Forum programming and implementing virtual and possible in-person social and networking events. Quarter Note Forum programming included proposing topics, possible panelists depending on the topic, formatting Quarter Note forum questions, and the session format. The following brothers served on the Networking Subcommittee: Marina Peña Guiot (Chair), Steven McIntyre, Nicklaus Lavagnilio, Chad Moore, and Ben Tuttle. The role of the Recruitment and Retention Subcommittee was to provide recommendations to improve the membership renewal process, format and review annual climate surveys, and provide programming and communication recommendations for increasing alumni outreach. The following brothers served on the Recruitment and Retention Subcommittee: Abraham Anthony (Chair), Laura Pike Borzellieri, Austin Coker, Miranda Cook, Nicole Gage, and Elissa Travis.

The toughest obstacle with serving on a brand new committee ended up being what bonded us all together: creating brand new membership focused programming. In its first biennium of existence, we implemented the following programming: Quarter Note Forum, New Year, New Bros, climate surveys, Brothers at the Ballpark, and a NatCon Hype Challenge. All programming was implemented based on the responses received from the two climate surveys that were shared with the general Alumni Association membership. Both climate surveys provided the committee with excellent feedback that allowed us to identify district involvement, communication concerns, programming awareness, and much more. While providing virtual and in person social events for our membership was one of our original goals, the feedback we received from the 2022 Climate Survey showed that our members preferred having virtual events more so than in person meet ups. Members noted the difficulty of being able to meet up in person whereas virtual events made it more likely to network with brothers from various districts.

The Quarter Note Forums were implemented from Vice Chair Marina's platform goal of providing alumni brothers opportunities to voice their opinions and have constructive conversations with at least one member of the KKPsi AABOD present. The committee selected the following Quarter Note Forum topics to provide for our membership: "Welcome [back] to the KKPsiAA!", "What does Your Ideal Convention Look Like?", 2023 Climate Survey Review, and "Welcome to your KKPsiAA home." The New Year, New Bros program was initiated both in

December 2021 and December 2022. This initiative gave members the opportunity to send either an e-card or a physical New Year card to another brother and start the new year on a high note. Ideally, participants were paired up with a member from a different district that they didn't know.

Throughout the summer of 2023, the committee created Brothers at the Ballpark in which all Local Alumni Associations (LAAs) were invited to participate by agreeing to lead a local sport outing to create a sense of fellowship during a National Convention summer. The final programming, NatCon Hype Challenge, was designed to provide even alumni brothers who wouldn't be able to attend National Convention an opportunity to share current and old photographs to be spotlighted in the last few days leading up to National Convention. Brothers were encouraged to submit a picture for as many of the available themes. The committee selected the following photograph themes: favorite KKPsi letters, something you would wear in Florida during the middle of July, favorite National Convention/ KKPsi memory, favorite ensemble performance or a picture in your band/ensemble uniform, and something that represents where you are/would be traveling from if attending National Convention.

The 2021-2023 membership committee encourages Brothers to apply to serve on committees for

the next biennium. With that said the committee leaves the following charges for the 2023-2025 membership committee:

- Continue to develop new and interesting ways to keep recruitment and retention up.
- Use the climate survey results to guide your conversations when planning programming for members.
- Develop topics for the Quarter Note Forum that will encourage constructive conversations between members.

I would like to thank the Membership Committee members for their willingness to have necessary conversations and dedication to creating a strong foundation for this brand new Kappa Kappa Psi Alumni Association committee. 



# Appendix S – Fall 2021 Amendments Adopted to AA Constitution:

Organization & Syntax:

#### Reorganize Chapter 2 (BOD).

Move Sections 2.109 - 2.111 and 2.113 - 2.116 to Chapter 5 (Meetings). These sections refer to meetings of the AABOD and KKΨAA as a whole, respectively.

Sections 2.103 and 2.106 both have multiple different paragraphs within it. Each covers a slightly different topic. The proposal is to split those paragraphs into distinct sections.

## Clarity in Section 6.107

*6.107* adds "*National Council of*" before "Kappa Kappa Psi" to indicate which entity handles disciplinary actions for members.

#### Electronic Voting:

Strike 1.114 and first clause of 1.115. (i.e. electronic voting)

1.114 If the favorable vote on a proposed amendment is less than three-fourths (3/4), yet there is a majority vote, the proposed amendment shall be tabled until the next regularly called Convention of the Fraternity. During the interim between Conventions, each such proposed amendment shall be presented by the AABOD to KKWAA members in a report titled "Proposed Amendments to the Constitution." This report shall be distributed to KKWAA members within four weeks of the close of the Convention at which the initial vote was taken. 1.115 Under extraordinary circumstances between regularly called Conventions ... proposed amendment(s) to this Constitution may be submitted in written form

## Match Current Practice:

Add following clauses for AABOD:

2.112 At any time, the Kappa Kappa Psi Board of Trustees may remove any member of the AABOD (or the previously described advisor to the AABOD) from the AABOD through a two-thirds (2/3) favorable vote. Additionally, the AABOD may vote to recommend to the Kappa Kappa Psi Board of Trustees that a director be removed through a two-thirds (2/3) favorable vote.

2.114 Each member of the AABOD, with the exception of Kappa Kappa Psi Board of Trustees liaison to the AABOD, shall have one (1) vote at all meetings of the AABOD. *The Chair of the AABOD shall only vote on AABOD business in the case of tie.* 

## Types of LAAs:

(Replace in their entirety to match new language elsewhere)

6.102 The AABOD maintains supervisory and approval authority over all LAAs of Kappa Kappa Psi. Each LAA is equal in standing to all other LAAs. The AABOD has the authority to designate one LAA per district as the District LAA (sometimes referred to as a DAA). Unlike the district councils of our active fraternity, District LAAs do not have any authority over other LAAs within their respective districts.

6.103 LAAs of Kappa Kappa Psi include (i) district alumni associations (with operations and membership focused on a single district of Kappa Kappa Psi), (ii) regional alumni associations (with operations and membership focused on a specific geographic region), and (iii) chapter alumni associations (with operations and membership focused on a single chapter of Kappa Kappa Psi).

Replace 6.103 LAAs may cover any particular geographic area, and/or may be affiliated with one or several chapters or universities. However, no LAA shall be larger in scope than a single District of the Fraternity, nor shall any LAA supplant the national scope of the KKYAA

6.106 District alumni associations and regional alumni associations may elect to serve as joint alumni associations that include members of both Kappa Kappa Psi and Tau Beta Sigma. Such joint alumni associations must meet all requirements set forward by, and obtain the approval of, both KKΨAA and the Tau Beta Sigma Alumni Association. Replace 6.106: LAAs of the KK $\Psi$ AA may be established and maintained jointly between alumni of KK $\Psi$  and sisters of TB $\Sigma$ . However, these LAAs must simultaneously meet all requirements of the TB $\Sigma$ AA and KK $\Psi$ AA to remain active in good standing.

# Elections:

Update 2.103 to match current practice and provide sufficient time for elections.

2.103 Each election to select members of the AABOD will occur on May 15 *between May 1 and May 15* preceding the relevant National Convention and may be conducted through in-person or electronic voting through a process and format determined by the current AABOD.

Update Chair selection to provide clarity and match current practice.

2.106 The incoming AABOD's first order of business at its first meeting following each National Convention will be its selection of its recommended candidate for Chair. If the position of Chair becomes vacated between National Conventions, then, at the first meeting after this vacancy occurs, the remaining AABOD members shall make its first order of business the selection of its recommended candidate for Chair.

A dedicated email address such as <u>jazz@kkpsi.org</u> with the website will create a system of direct contact to the chair and committee members to maintain a system of communication, organization, and a sound logistical plan.

# APPENDIX 36 - REPORT OF THE KKY Chapter Field Representatives

Authors: Jacob January, Alpha and Kennedy Struck, Mu Nu Submitted but not presented: July 14, 2023

The 2021-2023 biennium presented a unique set of challenges for the Chapter Field Representative program. The CFR's had to handle the fallout of the pandemic and navigate the everchanging landscape of COVID 19-restrictions. Additionally, the CFR's had to handle the new challenges chapters encountered while navigating the "new normal". We had extensive conversations with chapters about: Recruitment, Retention, Brotherhood, Service, and general chapter operations.

Over the past biennium, 174 chapters were visited by the CFR's, almost all of which were in-person visits. The COVID-19 pandemic had thrown off the 2-3 year gap most chapters have between chapter visits, so we sought to visit everyone to get their timeline back on track. We also got insight from District Governors regarding priority chapters, or chapter's that needed the assistance first. Our goal for the 2023-2024 academic year is to clean up the remaining chapters and further our visits on priority chapters, as we have signed on to complete one more year of work.

Over the summer terms for 2022, and 2023, we held Summer Office Hours to encourage strategic planning, officer training, and goal setting for chapters throughout the fraternity. We have given workshops at nearly every district convention, as well as the 2022 and 2023 National Leadership Conference for district officers and governors. We attended the Hazing Prevention Conference in Columbus, Ohio in 2022. We attended Pepsi Battle of the Bands in 2021 and DCI Finals in 2022. We have attended Texas Music Educators Association in San Antonio, and The Midwest Band Clinic in Chicago to engage with students of the fraternity and positively represent the national organizations as a whole.

Suggestions for the future:

 Increased communication and information sharing between the District Leadership Teams and CFRs. Since it is next to impossible to keep personal relationships with our over two hundred chapters, the next CFRs should keep close contact with the District Governors and utilize their information about specific chapters on visits.

- Revamp the structure of a visit. The typical CFR Visit structure has largely stayed the same over the past 30 years. It would be beneficial to explore other visit structures like a 2 day visit, strategic planning, workshop day ect... to better address the needs of specific chapters.
- More purpose behind chapter visits. Some chapters don't need frequent visits and others would benefit from more frequent visits. The program should continue to work with District and National leadership to provide tangible data as to who needs to be visited when and for what specifically. The goal is to do less visits in a semester, however those visits are potentially longer and more specific to the needs of the chapter.
- Create a follow up system with chapters that help with reassessing the action items discussed during the CFR visit. It is difficult for CFR's to touch base with every chapter they visited in a timely manner, since we are constantly on the move and preparing for the next visit. Creating a Follow up system that works with District and National leadership to help follow up with chapters post-visit would help with retaining information and providing further support to those chapters.

The search for new CFR's will begin in Spring 2024. If you or someone you know is interested in the position, we will be holding numerous information sessions and workshops over the fall 2023 semester to garner interest and dispel myths associated with the program, everyday life, and duties associated with the position. We are excited for the next pair to start their visits and eager to see what they will bring to the CFR Program.

We have thoroughly enjoyed our time serving as CFRs and are proud to be heading into our third year as Chapter Field Representatives. We would like to thank the National Leadership Team as well as the National Headquarters Staff for allowing us to continue in our roles for a third year. We would like to thank the National Council, Board of Trustees, Alumni Association Board of Directors, and the District Governors for their continued support throughout our time as CFRs. We would like to thank Steve, Di, Debbie, Nicole, Aaron, Robert, TJ, and Lisa for supporting us throughout the biennium at National Headquarters. Thank you to Bang, who has been our constant support system for our last two years as CFRs. Thank you to the brothers who requested CFR visits, participated in CFR Summer Office Hours, and were patient as we worked through the uncertain times of resuming CFR visits while safely navigating the Covid-19 pandemic.

# Programming

<u>Reach for the Stars</u>: This initiative showcases the district's chapters who Strive for the Highest and Reach for the Stars! Each star represents a task that a chapter must complete to earn. At district convention, chapters who reach all five stars will be presented with the Stellar Chapter Award and will be featured on the website for 1 year.

Statewide-A-Thon (SWAT): is a component of the Reach for

the Stars program that encourages chapters across the district to showcase how their chapters exhibit our pillars through their work. SWAT occurs over 4 months during the school year (October, November, February, and March) with each month focusing on a different pillar.

<u>FocuSED Connections - RepurpoSED:</u> FocuSED Connections is a pen-pal-like program that pairs chapters in the SED to facilitate communication across the district. Bro-2-Bro is an extension of FocuSED Connections which paired individual brothers across the district for an extended period of time. During the 2022-2023 year, we combined the original FocuSED Connections program with the Bro-2-Bro program to create a new hybrid program called FocuSED Connections - RepurpoSED.

<u>The Eighth Note:</u> The Eighth Note is the Southeast District Publication. Brothers and Chapter's across the district are encouraged to submit articles and pictures focusing on their thoughts and experiences within this fraternity. This past year, we changed gears from a more traditional style publication to a blog-style instagram.

<u>Charter Day Shoutouts</u>: This year, we began to post every chapter on their charter days to serve as a shoutout to them and make them feel acknowledged by the council and district.

<u>District Discord Server</u>: The 2022-2023 council launched a Discord server to better communicate with the district. The following council's have faced the challenge of getting as many people in the server as possible, which is still occurring! We encourage every individual in the district, whether active or alumni, to join the server to hear announcements from the council and have more conversations with fellow brothers.
